Andrew Bird – Noble Beast

(FAT POSSUM)

Always an excellent musician and singer, *Noble Beast* finds those skills married to Bird's most consistent set of songs. The result is an album that is distinctly modern but wouldn't sound out of place alongside progressive '70s folkies like John Martyn, Kevin Ayers, or singer-songwriters Paul Simon and Nick Drake.

Lissom – Nest of Iterations

(DRAGON'S EYE)

Fennesz's *Black Sea* is an excellent return to form, and Lissom is the perfect companion. Sheets of hazy electronics form beautiful, mysterious soundscapes whose shifting textures and layers reveal bell-like melodies and grainy, crackling space.

The Moore Brothers – Aptos

(AMERICAN DUST)

The continuing maturation of the The Moore Brothers as singers and songwriters is a treat to experience. The glorious harmonies and winding, impressionistic songwriting are intact, framed with excellent help from Kelley Stoltz and others. The comparisons to Robyn Hitchcock, Martin Carthy, Felt, and Simon & Garfunkel remain, but The Moore Brothers are truly themselves now.

Fight On, Your Time Ain't Long; I Don't Feel at Home in This World Anymore; I Woke Up One Morning in May; Life is a Problem; Oh Graveyard, You Can't Hold Me Always; Last Kind Words –

Various Artists (MISSISSIPPI)

Something about the stark graphic design, lack of liner notes, and vinyl-only status helps make these

collections of old time blues, folk, country and more a real music-centric experience. Instead of a history lesson, collector fetishist box-checking, or Luddite grumpiness we can drop the needle and have the magical, mysterious sounds of the past revealed to us as living expression.

Punk Rock Reissues – Flipper / Zero Boys / Blatz & Filth

(WATER/SECRETLY CANADIAN/LIFE IS ABUSE)

Water Records finally reissues all the old Flipper albums at once. One of the most creative bands of the original San Francisco punk explosion, Flipper's brutally redundant "sound" is both oppressive in its heaviness and liberating in its originality. Start with *Generic*, a classic in the art-punk canon, then experience *Public Flipper Limited* for a pulverizing dose of Flipper live.

In a fit of Midwestern pride, Secretly Canadian reissues the Zero Boys' *Vicious Circle*. When you talk about Reagan-era hardcore, this band is at the top of the list. While most of their peers slavishly perfected the loud fast rules that turned hardcore into one of the most boring and clichéd musical genres ever, Indiana's Zero Boys upped the ante by adding incisive lyrics and hooks that stick in your head for days.

What? *The Shit Split* is back in print? It's about time. Pick a side to root for (since no one seems to like both sides). Either way, this is the kind of sloppy dirty punk rock that put the East Bay on the map.

Dutchess & the Duke – She's the Dutchess, He's the Duke (HARDLY ART)

"I thought that if you had an acoustic guitar, then it meant that you were a protest singer." Usually indie kids playing at folk makes me want to stick icepicks in my ears. But these two ex-garage rockers (their pedigree includes The Flying Dutchmen and The Intelligence among others) are still flying the flannel despite going (mostly) acoustic. Melancholic songs about ugly situations, desperate times, and occasional redemption are arranged around uncomplicated but interesting melodies, which, despite the acoustic guitars, maintain a sharp rock'n'roll edginess.

Thee Oh Sees – The Master's Bedroom is Worth Spending a Night In (TOMLAB)

Even John Dwyer's most puerile projects (anyone remember Ziegenbock Kopf?) have not been without a certain element of mad genius. But the latest direction for his deconstructed folk-cum-neo-garage project, Thee Oh Sees, is perhaps Dwyer's most fully realized. The production is drenched in *de rigueur* reverb and the tell tale sound of his tinny telephone receiver mic is still there, but everything really falls into place on this one. Perhaps it's the mellowing of age, or maybe it's just the development of real craft. Whatever, just do like Thee Oh Sees say and spend some time in their bedroom.

Encounters At the End of the World – Directed by Werner Herzog

After a chance viewing of some underwater footage shot in Antarctica by musician and scuba diver Henry Kaiser, filmmaker Werner Herzog decided to make the ultimate trip down under and ended up producing this doc that explores life on, over, and under the polar ice cap via a number of the residents who populate some of the most extreme terrain on earth. This is no standard "nature" documentary, as Herzog seems as fascinated by the researchers and their stories as the actual wildlife and landscape. As Herzog dryly states early on in his narration, "this film will have no fluffy penguins."

It does, however, have an eclectic collection of people, otherworldly locales, and wildlife that goes from mammoth to microscopic. Amongst the researchers and staff that Herzog encounters during his visit are seal scientists, undersea biologists, vulcanologists, and neutrino hunters, as well as the guy who runs the Frosty-Boy soft-serve ice cream machine at the main Antarctica settlement. Herzog also captures the extremes of the polar environments, from sub-polar ice tunnels where the temperature drops to 70 below to an active volcano that still has a pool of molten magma churning in it. Some of the most amazing footage here was shot under the polar ice by Kaiser and more often than not captures images that would not be out of place in a sci-fi movie. Likewise, a segment on a group of seals includes some of their underwater calls, which sound like a fat-sounding analog synthesizer being randomly triggered-off.

Extra features on the two-disc set include an interview of Herzog by fellow director Jonathan Demme; a commentary track by Herzog, Kaiser, and cinematographer Peter Zeitlinger; extra footage shot both

above and below the ice; and a South Pole "exorcism." The latter feature also includes some of the free-form psychedelic guitar, of Kaiser who, along with multi-instrumentalist David Lindley, scored the original music for the film.

Ry Cooder – The UFO Has Landed (WARNER/RHINO)

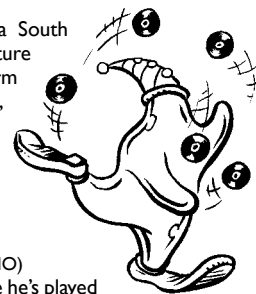
Over 40 years into a career where he's played everything from quirky Asian pop to foot-stomping zydeco, *The UFO Has Landed* collects some of the best of Ry Cooder's solo efforts and film soundtrack work onto a two-disc, 34-track collection. Selected and sequenced by Cooder's son Joachim, the set leans a little heavier on Cooder's first five albums, where his basic M.O. was to re-imagine forgotten or overlooked songs past and present and put them in new musical settings, drawing on a variety of roots music traditions for jumping off points. Often pigeon-holed as a blues player for his deft and nuanced slide playing, Cooder effortlessly weaves influences as diverse as Tex-Mex, Gospel, Hawaiian, and R&B into his music, making it into a seamless whole. Also getting a fair amount of disc space here are selections from Cooder's numerous albums of soundtrack work, including the somber title piece from *Paris, Texas*. A previously unreleased workout on Wilbert Harrison's *Let's Work Together* as well as comments on each song from Cooder, make this a must have for fans and not a bad place to start for the uninitiated. Now if they'd only follow this up with a collection of some of his more notable session work, i.e. the Stones, Captain Beefheart, Van Morrison, Shoukichi Kina, etc., etc., etc.

Juke Joint Boogie: Country and Rockabilly Classics, Snatch & Grab It: 33 2/3 Edition Rhythm & Blues Classics, Country Boy's Dream: Country, Western, Bluegrass & Instrumental Classics – Various Artists (BEAR FAMILY)

To celebrate their 33rd anniversary reissue specialists Bear Family have released these three ultra-cheap (\$6.98 + tax), ultra-tasty (vintage country, bluegrass, rockabilly and rhythm & blues,) and ultra filling (33 tracks on each album) collections culled from their extensive catalog. The only downside is that you'll probably want to get full-length albums by many of these artists once you get a listen to these sets.

DR. Boogie Presents Ethnic Authentic Electric: SHIM SHAM SHIMMY – Various Artists (SUB ROSA)

Fantastic 30-track compilation of some of the best post-WWII blues, boogie and jump by a lot of artists



you might have heard of and even more of you probably haven't. If you're a fan of early Chess or Sun Records pre-Elvis output this should be in your collection.

20 Years History - The Very Best of Syllart Productions – Various Artists (SYLLART)

Another amazing deal! This time a five CD set of African music from the Syllart record label for less than five bucks a disc. There's one CD each for Senegal, Congo, Mali, West African Dance, and a disc simply titled Roots. There's a wide range of artist and styles here, so while you might not like everything, it's hard to imagine a better collection of African music for the money.

purchasing it from our store.

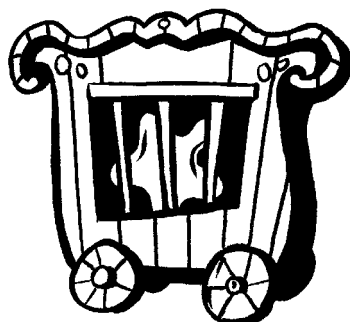
MGMT – Oracular Spectacular

dances!! The fine Norton folks have unearthed a
potpourri of some of the wildest examples and
are sharing them with us now in three equally great
volumes available on LP or CD. I swear, "Gismo" is
the greatest song of all time (with tongue planted
firmly in cheek!!) This is the stuff the Cramps listen
to. Weird, wild stuff.

**Jimmy Hughes – Best of Jimmy
Hughes** (FAME)

The inaugural release from the reactivated FAME
label in Muscle Shoals, AL is this 18-track overview
of Jimmy Hughes's '60s output that originally saw
the light of day on the Guyden, Vee Jay, Atco, and
Atlantic labels. FAME is legendary in the deep South-
ern soul circles, and this comp will demonstrate
why. Emotion runs high throughout Jimmy's music,
with "Steal Away," "I Worship the Ground You Walk
On," and "Why Not Tonight" stealing the show for
me. I've cherished his Vee Jay and Atco LPs for years
and always wondered why there's never been a
CD reissue of this material. Well, lucky for us, Rick
Hall has opened the vaults and made this music
available again. Thank you!! Also, make sure to check
out Kent's wonderful 3-CD box set *Take Me to the
River: A Southern Soul Story 1961-1977*, which contains
75 tracks of the finest Southern soul you'll ever hear,
from the obvious to the obscure.

**The Ettes – Look At Life Again
Soon** (TAKE ROOT)

I've been listening to this fine NYC garage trio quite
a bit lately. This album, their second, was, like their

music. This CD has three pieces: 1) "Music For
Tinguely 1963;" 2) "Appearance 1967," and 3) "Music
For Living Space 1969." This whole series is a must
for all fans of academic electronic music, but this
one stands out because of the compositional skill
of Ichihyanagi.

Acid Birds – Acid Birds (QBICO)

Part of the new batch of Qbico LPs focusing on American performers. A trio of Andrew Barker (drums, percussion, jaw harp), Jaime Fennelly (electronics, harmonium) and Charles Waters (alto sax, clarinet, bass clarinet). Like most of the Qbico improv records I like the most, electronics take the music to new realms of enjoyment. The drone of the harmonium also adds new dimensions to an already solid improv session. The vinyl is a black and yellow splash design for optimum tripping.

Svarte Greiner - Man Bird Dress

(SMTG LIMITED)

Svarte Greiner is the group name used by Norwegian Erik K. Skodvin. He produces beautiful and haunting atmospheric landscapes. Also check out his previous album *Knife* on Type Records.

Fred Hersch Pocket Orchestra – Live at the Jazz Standard

(SUNNYSIDE)

New York jazz pianist-composer Fred Hersch's Pocket Orchestra recorded live last year at the NYC jazz club as just a quartet (trumpeter Ralph Alessi, percussionist Richie Barshay, and the amazing young vocal improviser Jo Lawry) playing Hersch originals, all of them full of melodic brilliance and joy. One hopes that we were put on Earth to feel as happy as this music sounds.

Pete Seeger – At 89 (APPLESEED)

Even the folk legend's oldest fans were probably surprised to find Seeger on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial at Barack Obama's Jan. 18 "We Are One" celebration, encouraging a "choir" of 400,000 to sing

along to all the verses of "This Land Is Your Land," accompanied by Bruce Springsteen and grandson, Tao Rodriguez. On his new CD, Seeger is sometimes solo, and other times accompanied by a changing cast of musicians, with a few spoken intros on mostly new songs, including one inspired by Berkeley's Zero Waste Commission.

Los Cenzontles with David Hidalgo – Songs of Wood & Steel

(LOS CENZONTLES)

San Pablo's young band Los Cenzontles has issued a series of regional folkloric albums over the past decade, but this one is something new as the group teams with Los Lobos guitarist David Hidalgo to create modern Latin folk and rock drenched in West Coast culture and tradition. They combine old elements and songs in new ways, including several extended rock guitar jams (accompanied by banda horns). Linda Ronstadt adds some vocal harmonies, but it is Los Cenzontles and Hidalgo that are blazing territory Los Lobos never got to.

Franco & Le T.P.O.K. Jazz – Francophonic

(STERNS)

Amidst a cornucopia of recent new CDs and reissues of great African music, none is more significant than this 2-CD set. The first "Best of" Congo's great Franco to cover his entire recording career (1953-1989), beginning with his first recording when he was 15, with just acoustic guitar and a bit of percussion. As his T.P.O.K. Jazz band grew, he added horns, and his rumba-based rhythms and hypnotic electric guitar playing developed. He became one of the biggest influences on African music. This one's essential!

Will Bernard – Blue Plate Special

(PALMETTO)

The Berkeley-reared electric guitarist has issued a number of East Bay jazz-funk albums, some heavily groove-oriented. This one emphasizes tunes and his inventive electric guitar playing. It doesn't hurt that he's playing in a dream band with John Medeski on keyboards, Andy Hess on bass, and Stanton Moore on drums. Today's jazz doesn't get much tighter.

MATT BOB

Q-Tip – The Renaissance

(UNIVERSAL MOTOWN)

It's Tip...

DJ Revolution – King Of The Decks

(DUCK DOWN)

One of the best scratch DJs ever. A song with Tash and Sean Price is almost worth the whole album.

Sukiyaki Western Django – Directed by Takashi Miike

OK I'm breaking the rules a bit for this one, as it came out last year, but it was new to me and I thought it was great. It's like a Samurai western thing. Goes good with the volume way up.

Burn After Reading – Directed by the Coen brothers

I feel like this is a given, so...words words words.

Ludacris – Theater Of The Mind

(DEF JAM)

Ludacris has always been an exception in my otherwise harsh opinion of mainstream rap music. *Theater Of The Mind* keeps that same pace. And, although a typical statement in my case, the 9th Wonder and Premier tracks are worth the price on their own.

Eagle Nebula – Cosmic Headphones

(EPISTROPHIK PEACH SOUND)

Super good production, crazy rhymes. I liked it.

MICHAEL

Jazz guy and CD pricer, inheritor of the pop vocal section... I also love world music, psychedelia, experimental soundscapes, and lots of other stuff. Lately I've been listening to a ton of experimental/electronic/ambient/drone type of stuff, so this list is kinda heavy on that sort of thing...

Fennesz – Black Sea

(TOUCH)

A richly textured ambient haze of deep and incandescent beauty . . . subtle yet powerful stuff from this laptop maestro. Feels a bit like the winter companion piece to the equally excellent *Endless Summer* and every bit as good if not even better!

Aidan Baker & Tim Hecker –

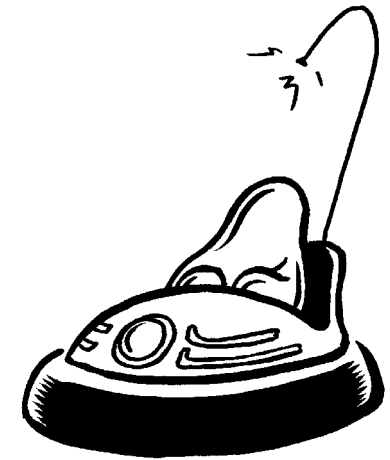
Fantasma Parastasia (ALIEN8)

Speaking of "kind of heavy" . . . this head-to-head collaboration between these two distinctly accomplished musicians yields some excellent heavy ambient dronescapes.

Mountains – Mountains

Mountains Mountains (CATSUP PLATE)

More lovely ambience from this NYC duo who sculpt fine art out of using only guitar, keyboards, and some electronics. This one is a little more edgy than their previous work, but still wonderfully warm and shimmering. Limited to 500 copies on LP only and



now out of print, but look for their new full-length to drop on Thrill Jockey sometime in February. It's definitely going to be solid... can't wait to hear it!

Philip Jeck – Suite : Live in Liverpool

(TOUCH)

This UK-based manipulator of turntables has made another fine record of dreamy soundscapes using old records and some electronics. Recorded live, this one shows how adept he is at doing this stuff without the aid of studio trickery. Masterful technique and otherworldly results. Sounds a bit like a haunted wooden ship traveling across an ocean of steam and smoke.

Emeralds – What Happened

(NO FUN PRODUCTIONS)

This Ohio trio has been making some of the nicest ambient/electronic/drone music around for the last couple of years. They've mostly slipped under the radar due to releasing most of their stuff on CD-Rs and cassettes in minute quantities (generally less than 100 copies of each!), but they get a proper CD release here on Carlos Giffoni's No Fun label. Their music is very reminiscent of early Kosmische music à la Tangerine Dream, Cluster/Harmonia, Manuel Gottsching/Ash Ra Tempel, and Popol Vuh. Each of the three members all have various solo and collaborative projects too, which makes it nearly impossible to track down everything they've done. Start with this one (perhaps their best based on what I've heard of their immense catalog) and let the magical power in these glittering green stones show you the way from there.

Yui Onodera – Suisei

(AND/OAR)

Blissful washes of minimalist drone from this skilled Japanese soundcrafter. Simple, lovely, and limited to 300 copies... get it while it lasts!

Tricorn & Queue –

Hidden Entrances (STUNNED)

The cassette is coming back! Seriously, there are tons of small labels releasing limited runs of amazing music on this supposedly “outdated” format. This gem (on the always excellent Stunned label out of Long Beach, CA) is an incredibly warm blueish green lagoon of mellow, blissed-out tropical vibrations ...

Xiphiidae – Used Parts Galaxy

(HOUSECRAFT)

Yet another fine label (Housecraft) that has put out a consistently amazing string of releases on cassette and CD-R. This one is indeed a galaxy, an entire interstellar spacecape filled with glistening molecules of delicate wonder. Xiphiidae is the project of Jeff Astin, the head of the Housecraft label, and also one of the two gentlemen responsible for the Tricorn & Queue stuff. I can't get enough of the lovely synthesizer tones he summons and the gentle moods that pervade his material, making each of the several titles in his growing discography something special ...

Wave and Particle – Wave and Particle

(SMOKE & MIRRORS)

Two different CD-R releases from this local Oakland duo. Both contain some of the most amazing futuristic electronic music I've heard. Sounds unlike anything else out there, while still remaining somehow accessible. Totally fascinating, and especially nice with headphones.

The Present – World I See

(LOAF)

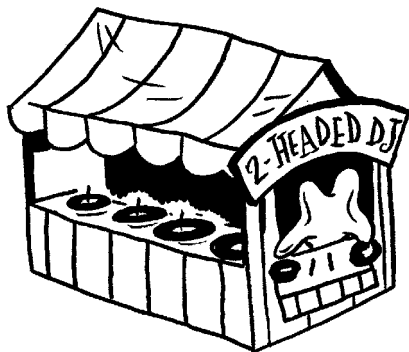
NYC trio based around producer Rusty Santos, who has worked with Panda Bear, among others. Nice long jams that blend diverse instrumentation and eclectic stylistic elements together into a cohesive whole. Seriously epic and soulful in a post modern kind of way.

Anything and everything put out by Mississippi Records – Yeah, all of them!

Mississippi Records is a small record store from Portland, Oregon which has been releasing a growing catalog of collections featuring early blues and gospel music, classic African pop music, and other random goodies (old soul music, Temple Orchestras from Thailand, etc). These are wonderful gems, lovingly compiled into coherent artifacts which are well worth investigating ... here's to their continued success and a long-running series of amazing archival material!

Epic production of a mid-period Flaming Lips scale. Great way for these kids to go out. You will be missed. Like to see somebody try to top this'n in 2009. Eat your teeth ...

Pieces – Directed by Juan Piquer

Simón (GRINDHOUSE RELEASING)

The label that gave you *I Drink Your Blood* and *Make Them Die Slowly* pull another bad-ass maneuver with this sick puppy. Christopher George is on the hunt for a madman on campus who's building a life-size rag doll out of lady parts. Actual chainsaw hits to the flesh, again and again. Kung-Fu for no reason. Gratuitous leg warmers and garden tool deaths. The guy who played Pluto in Altman's *Popeye!* It's never looked so good. Or worse. Awesome trash. "You don't have to go to Texas..."

Lee Moses – Time & Place

(CASTLE)

Holy Grail? Some say...I don't know about that, but it was my fave soul score since the Baby Huey & Betty Davis re-ishes a while back. All the singles & the LP in one place. One of two CDs I paid for this year (vinyl, on the other hand, can cause bankruptcy...) "Bad Girl" is in my top ten songs, so it's nice to have a physical copy in possession. There's an LP version out there? Greasy.

In The Folds Of The Flesh –

Directed by Sergio Bergonzelli

(SEVERIN DVD)

A garbage can of Euro-sleaze delights. Even for a Giallo, it makes little sense...but who cares with this much incest, decapitations, Nazisploitation, and garish color caked on. A deliriously good time. Nice to finally chuck that "import" copy I've had on VHS for ten odd years.

Death Raid – Death Raid (UNREST)

14 song gatefold LP. Blistering crust that features ex-members of (and sounds like) Disrupt, State of Fear, Consume, Shitlist, etc. They destroyed at Burnt Ramen and gave me a week long bangover.

Nachtmystium – Assassins: Black

Meddle Part I (CENTURY MEDIA)

This album makes a departure from their more traditional black metal assault and mixes in some experimental and psychedelic sounds.

Disrupt – Disrupt (UNREST)

Seven songs from old recording sessions that never saw the light of day till now. Gatefold cover with color vinyl.

Abrupt – Abrupt (INSPIRED BY ANGST)

Ripping Bay Area hardcore with female vocals. Features members of Born/Dead, Desolation, and Scurvy Dogs. "Hey Beltloops, where's the Kool Aid?"

Nux Vomica / Wake Up On Fire

(split) (ABORTED SOCIETY)

An awesome 12" release by these two metal edged epicrust bands.

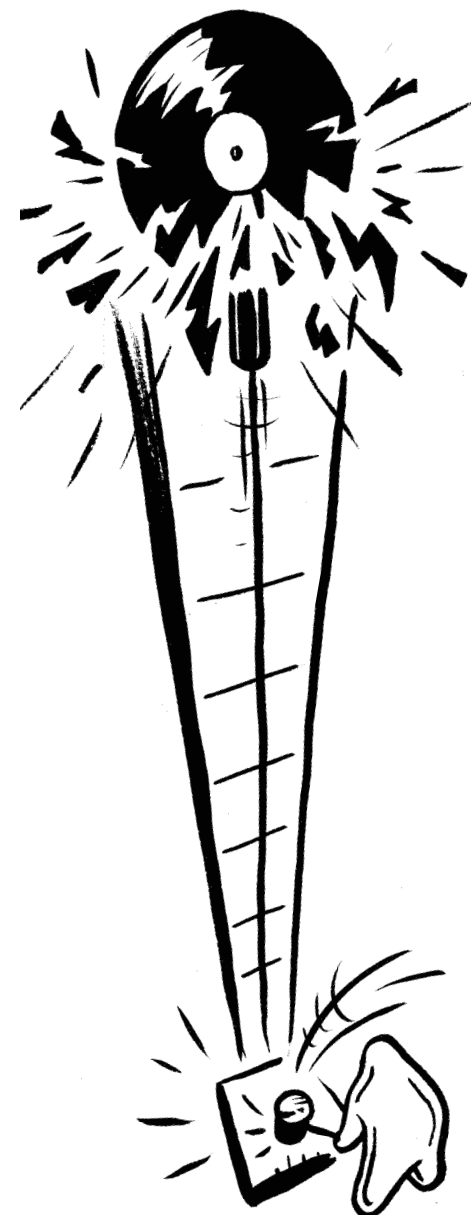
Jacaszek – Treny (MIASMA)
Polish composer Michal Jacaszek creates an electro-acoustic sound using live strings (violin and cello) and wordless female vocals manipulated through his laptop. Jacaszek adds in and takes out layer after layer of samples and noise from bass tones played backwards to tape hiss and electronic clicks and blips. Modern classical, electronica or experimental, whatever you want to call it; the end result is pretty fucking deep and I can't stop coming back to it.

Alps – III (TYPE)
S.F.'s Alps take you on a meditative psychedelic journey you do not want to end. The album starts out with a repetitive Steve Reich like chiming and adds in swooping guitar distortion with Eastern influences. Psychedelia permeates the whole album and is often held in place with a simplistic repeated bass line and a krautrock locked groove as a backbone. Each track is pretty epic whether it's a more acoustic jam song, or a psychedelic noise freak-out. Features member(s) of Tarentel but expect a more focused and bright sound.

Jessica Lea Mayfield – With Blasphemy So Heartfelt (POLYMER)
I first heard Jessica Lea Mayfield when I went to see Lucero at Bottom of the Hill a few months back. Her dark country folk songs were good enough for me to look her up online when I got home. It was shocking to find out she was just 18 years old because there's certainly an old soul singing these heartbroken songs. She's going through those emotionally tough teenage years but with wisdom beyond her years. Fellow Ohioan Dan Auerbach of the Black Keys held production duties and joined in on guitar on a few tracks.

Pig Heart Transplant – Nature b/w Nurture (DEER HEALER)
In a genre where collaborations are few and far between, it's great to see a new approach. Pig Heart Transplant is Jon Kortland's (Iron Lung, Gob) new-ish project where he teams up with a different grouping of members from bands such as Spazz, Lords of Light, Walls, Unpersons, Brain Oil, Lana Dagales, Artimus Pyle, Blue Sabbath Black Cheer for each track/release. On this two-song 7" Kortland et al. bulldoze through the muck at a slow, repetitive rate. This is dark, heavy, and absolutely frightening music. In other words, it's awesome. PHT's releases are very limited but new releases come out every few months.

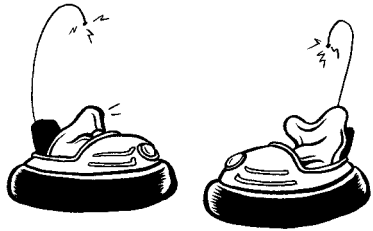
Menahan Street Band – Make the Road by Walking (DUNHAM)
A fun album of authentic sounding soul music mixed with Afro-Latin rhythms and jazz stylings very much like Mulatu Astatke's recordings on *Ethiopianes Vol 4*. Coming from members of Antibalas and the Dap-Kings, you know it is done right.

Deerhunter – Microcastle (KRANKY)
Great stuff. If you dug the other albums, you'll love this one. I don't know why these guys aren't huge. (Check out Atlas Sound if you're craving more). Find this awesome record in rock.

Deadmau5 – Random Album Title (UHRA)
Abrasive, aggressive, repetitive, poppy dance music. Most people would find that statement pretty universal for all dance music, so I definitely would say this album is not for everyone. I can't explain it, but I loved it. Find it in electronica.

Alias – Resurgam (ANTICON)
I've yet to decide what to label this album as... Trip-hop? Who cares? Its good. Find it in the Hip Hop section.

Animal Collective – Merriweather Post Pavilion (DOMINO)
The latest and probably most "casual listener" friendly album from Animal Collective. While I wouldn't call this my favorite Animal Collective release, I do thoroughly enjoy it. Poppy, but not without a touch of their old scream-ridden style. Find it in rock.

The Crooked Jades – Shining Darkness (JADE NOTE MUSIC)
One of the best country/folk albums I've ever heard. It contains a diverse series of haunting and upbeat instrumentals as well as beautifully written Appalachian ballads that cut you to the core. Find it in folk.

Tip:
Every genre of music has something to offer. Just dig deep.

The Cairo Gang – Twyxt Wyrđ (DISNEYLAND REFORM PARTY)

Twyxt Wyrđ is the second album by The Cairo Gang. The Cairo Gang is the solo project of Emmett Kelly, whose name may sound familiar to some, as Kelly is an accomplished accompanist (he has toured as a guitarist for Baby Dee, recorded with Edith Frost, and is a guitar & vocal mainstay in the Bonnie "Prince" Billy band). The music on this album, however, is a whole new craft. Though Kelly's music brings many references (from jazz to folk to experimental) to mind, it is altogether forward looking; and for that reason features some of the finest songwriting I have heard in a long time. Indeed, Twyxt Wyrđ seems more like a second debut rather than a successor to The Cairo Gang's first album. Released on his own label, Disneyland Reform Party, the eight tracks on Twyxt Wyrđ were recorded live on all acoustic instruments — IN ONLY FOUR HOURS — on a winter day in Chicago. The result is a personal, soulful, and well-engineered snapshot of The Cairo Gang just as Kelly intended it to be. The recording (credited to drummer Noritaka Tanaka) is open and clear, allowing Kelly's delicate and nuanced vocals to soar over his deceptively simple finger-style guitar. Featuring heavy-hitter Joshua Abrams on upright bass and a handful of guest appearances by other exceptional Chicago musicians, this album is solid to its core. LIMITED TO 500 copies.

Lady Genius – Lady Genius (GOLD ROBOT)

What we have here is the debut 10" EP from local musicians, Lady Genius, on the local label Gold Robot records. Contained therein are six memorable & almost-over-the-top intelligent pop songs. If you like the Magnetic Fields, the New Pornographers, or music from the Elephant 6 collective (e.g., Olivia Tremor Control & Neutral Milk Hotel) then you should definitely check this out and give it a careful listen. Keeping with the times, the record also comes with a free digital download of the album. LIMITED TO 500 COPIES.

Davy Graham – Folk, Blues and Beyond . . . (STAMFORD AUDIO/LES COUSINS)

Before there was Bert Jansch, John Renbourn, Richard Thompson, John Martyn, Nick Drake, Jimmy Page, and Ray Davies... there was Davy Graham. Arguably the most influential guitarist of the 1960s British folk revival — often cited as a major influence to all the artists listed above — Davy Graham pushed

the envelope with his all-encompassing finger-style guitar mastery. This groundbreaking live album runs the gamut of musical styles, incorporating American blues and jazz, Moroccan and Indian influences, and even a Dylan cover seamlessly. *Folk, Blues and Beyond* was released within a year of his collaboration with Shirley Collins, Folk Roots, New Routes, in which his non-traditional playing scandalized upright British folksters about as much as an electrified Dylan shook-up Pete Seeger's America. As a bonus, this LP includes the often-covered non-album track "Anji" (check out Simon and Garfunkel and Pentangle's excellent covers), for which he is most famous. Available on vinyl for the first time since its initial release, this issue is pressed on high-quality 180-gram vinyl. LIMITED TO 500 hand-numbered copies.

Mississippi Records and Sublime Frequencies

Continuing in the vein of limited releases . . . here are two great labels that have been releasing amazing compilations of otherwise difficult-to-come-by music: Mississippi Records & Sublime Frequencies. The two labels are commonly thrown around in the same conversation and I have even heard people confuse releases between the two. I will not go into depth on the overall greatness of either of these labels — as there is much to say — however, here is a brief description of each.

Sublime Frequencies: Incredible recordings of amazing music from far-away lands. Their releases are diverse, obscure, and consistently interesting to say the least. Some excellent examples include: nomadic guitar virtuosos from the Sahara; field recordings of radio and short wave transmissions from Java; ethnic minority music from Vietnam; and the otherworldly sounds of dragonflies exploding from irrepressible lust and heartbreak. You will not find these sounds anywhere else.

Mississippi Records: Incredible compilations of hard to find music running the gamut between African palm wine music to American blues and Gospel. You may find some of these tracks in their original form on eBay, but you will not find them in such great company as on these carefully-curated and well-loved compilations. The label's motto is "Gold over money," so chances are you will be able to afford them too. Mississippi also has many non-compilation reissues under their belt and some new releases from local Portland artists — see: The Rats — *The Rats*, Irma Thomas — *Irma Thomas Sings*, and Philip Cohran — *The Malcolm X Memorial* for some excellent examples.

Robert Wyatt – Comicopera (DOMINO)

Do you ever wonder how much amazing-music-that-you-never-heard is sitting right under your nose?

More specifically, do you ever wonder how many amazing critically acclaimed artists that were part of a highly influential and also critically acclaimed band are releasing critically acclaimed albums right under your nose? Well... here is where I make the shameful admission that I had never heard any of Robert Wyatt's solo records until a couple weeks ago, when a friend put *Comicopera* on. In short, this album is amazing, beautiful, and worth many careful listens. *Comicopera* is divided into three acts, each as varied, musically interesting, and profound as the next. Wyatt wrote this album deeply displeased with the direction in which western civilization was headed, and the acts touch somewhat anachronistically upon difficult topics (e.g., politics, religion, and war) without compromising his poeticism or its beautiful musical backdrop. Perhaps the most apt description of Wyatt I have read came from an Amazon review in which he was described as "synonymous with uncompromising poignancy." This album received excellent ratings across the board and Ranked #1 in *The Wire's* "Top Ten Records of the Year 2007." For the Radiohead fans out there... *Comicopera* comes highly recommended from Thom Yorke who admittedly could not bring himself to listen past the first track, as it was "so beautiful." Wyatt is joined on this album by long-time collaborators and close friends — Brian Eno, Paul Weller, and Phil Manzanera along with many other great musicians.

Barn Owl – The Conjurer (ROOT STRATA)

Since I am doing a little delving in the past here, I will also touch upon the future. Local droners Barn Owl will be releasing a new LP/CD this spring on the local label Root Strata. Self-described as their "most fully realized recording to date," this album — featuring Chad Collins (Flying Canyon) on drums —



will surely be one not to miss. It should come as no surprise if you haven't heard one of Barn Owl's previous recordings, as most of their releases to-date have been extremely limited and are now out of print. So, check out how much soul these guys put into their music at one of their highly recommended live shows. Notably, their last album, *From Our Mouths A Perpetual Light*, was selected by Julian Cope for vinyl of the month. If you are still not convinced . . . perhaps the list of artists these young droners have been asked to play with will stir some interest, including: Earth, Jesse Sykes, Sir Richard Bishop, & Illusion of Safety among many others. Note: if you are reading this, then the record is probably already on our shelves.

Prizehog – Prizehog (Alive and Well) (SELF RELEASED)

BOOOOOOOOOOOOOOOOOOOOM!!!!!!!!!!!!!!
The debut CD-R from San Francisco's latest doom-drone-stoner-experimental-sludge metal trio. If you like Earth, Sunn 0))), Boris, Melvins, Buzzov*en, Weedeater... etc. then you will love this. Epic! Self-recorded, illustrated, packaged, and released... this record is LIMITED to however many they are willing to put together, so get it now!

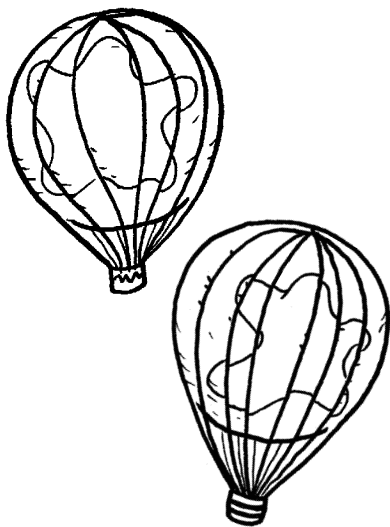

My Bloody Valentine (reissue) – Directed by George Mihalka

Besides being in 3D (which was awesome) the remake was an atrocity, but it did give the original an excuse to be reissued. I'm a bit of a horrorhead but I'll admit that I initially only watched this one because one of my favorite bands is its namesake. I was, however, pleasantly surprised that there was a damn cool movie behind the name. A slasher before that genre was done to death (that wasn't a pun), cool gore and twists, and the real mine location makes Crystal Lake look like a pleasant meadow. Oh, and the reissue features a bunch more gore that was cut from the original.

Deerhunter – Microcastle

(KRANKY)

I'll admit I wasn't really a huge fan of their previous release, *Cryptograms*, despite their interesting sound and the fact that they had, at least, a delay pedal on every instrument. It just seemed like more went into the sound than went into the song on that release. But after one listen to this one you can tell that they nailed it this time around. Amazing pop songs that are both upbeat and somber at the same time and always full of atmosphere. And since Bradford Cox can't stop writing songs, so much so that he accidentally leaks upcoming full albums on the internet, this album includes a bonus full length!

Loop – Heaven's End / Fade Out (reissues)

(REACTOR)

Reissues of their 1987 and 1988 releases. These guys live in a weird grey area where shoegaze stops and psych rock starts...or vice versa, whatever. Lots of pedals, swirling guitars and cool hooks mixed with an interesting rhythm section and full on jam freakouts. If you like neo-psych bands like the Black Angels then you will love these guys. Like riding a gunboat down the Mekong River delta while popping codeine and sipping poppy pod tea. Well...maybe not that cool.

Teenage Filmstars – Star (reissue) (CREATION)

Kind of sounds like the lost tapes of 'Loveless.'

Aidan Baker / Tim Hecker – Fantasma Parastasia

(ALIEN8 RECORDINGS)

If you are at all a fan of Tim Hecker or Aidan Baker (and/or his work in Nadja) you have a pretty good idea of what you're getting yourself into with this release. If you're not at all familiar with either of these guys then do yourself a favor and pick this up. Hecker processes guitars to the point that the instrument is unrecognizable and what is left are waves of white noise wrapped around beautiful melodies. Baker accentuates Hecker's melodic sensibilities with his low end doom and deep tones. At many points it's hard to see where one artist stops and the other begins...but you're not really thinking about that when you're being barraged by a lush wall of sound.

Tip:
If you're in town check your local listings for the follow bands; Prizehog, And If Your Hands Were Metal That Would Mean Something, Ozmadawn. They all make a splendid noise not heard since Sousa.

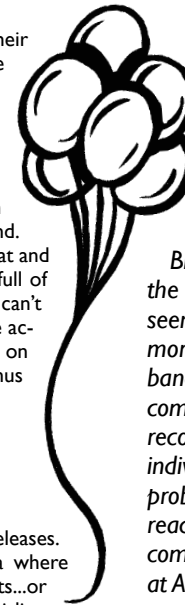
Judy Garland – Love Songs

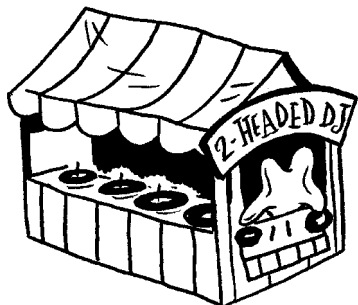

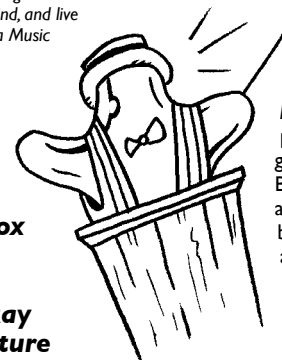
Vermillion Lies –

This 2008 release of *What's in the Box?* has indeed cured my bluest, shady days with bright, vermilion fervor. Cleverly and wittily written lyrics paired with fascinating and, at times, hilarious instruments earn this album a special place in my heart right next to the band members themselves, sisters Kim and Zoe Boekbinder. Aside from potentially charming your shirt off with their guitar and accordion prowess, they serenade any idle feet within earshot into motion with gasoline cans, BBQ grills, pots and pans, tin cans, typewriters and other sundries. Among a hodgepodge of other rad instruments, this album also contains piano...and toy piano too! It will get you there with style. If rockabilly isn't the first genre choice on your list, just leave your inhibitions behind for this swingin' treat!

Thelonious Monk – Thelonious Himself (RIVERSIDE/OJC)

If there's one man I'm ever going home to, it's Thelonious. Uncork the wine, lay out the paints, set up the canvas... next thing you know, it's "Round Midnight," and I'm "All Alone," but "Monks Mood" is the place to be!

The Velvet Underground & Nico – The Velvet Underground & Nico (POLYDOR)

This album has mysteriously permeated my psyche with such nostalgic wonders, time and time again. The light and cheery and the dark and eerie are here folded into one immaculately spellbinding musical prism. Before I was but a twinkle in my mother's eye, some of my favorite artists featured on this album came together to do justice to a now bygone era of transpiration and beauty. Like the ghost of a dear, departed friend, *The Velvet Underground & Nico* pensively echoes on and on, but not without bringing a newfound sense of meaning, no matter where it finds me.

Gang Gang Dance – Saint Dymphna (THE SOCIAL REGISTRY/WARP)

Gang Gang Dance is a group of New York art kids and this is their fourth album and, so it would seem, a pop crossover attempt. It's a mix of tribal sounds and techno beats with a singer who sounds A LOT like Kate Bush when she wants to. Of all the bands on this list, these guys are the real innovators. Music for the future?

Crystal Stilts – Aight of Night (SLUMBERLAND RECORDS)

Friends with Vivian Girls, Crystal Stilts shares some similarities, but are spookier, janglier, more atmospheric. I like the singer's bored, kind of flat singing. Lyrically, it's a little dark — with songs about shutting yourself in your room and being scared of the city. They also throw in a surf riff. Oh, and they're obviously Jesus and Mary Chain fans. I had to say it.

Lykke Li – Youth Novels

(LL RECORDINGS)

This one really appeals to the teenage girl in me. Infectious, catchy, feel-good pop from a 22-year-old Swedish former fly girl (watch the videos). Danceable, with heavy use of a wood block. Adorable, yet sassy. Yay!

Wild Combination: A Portrait of Arthur Russell – Directed by Matt Wolf

A sweet, sad portrait of avant garde cellist Arthur Russell, who died of AIDS in 1992. For those unfamiliar with his music, check out the album *World of Echo*. His songs are mostly wispy, pretty, echoey ballads and are truly unique. The most memorable scenes in this documentary are the wonderful interviews with his parents and boyfriend.

You can still travel the world on your hi-fi with Sublime Frequencies radio and field recordings of earth, they have released thirty four compact discs, five l.p.'s and eight dvd's from all over the world, so far. these are sounds that you have never heard before. i play these all the time. also buy something by the Sun City Girls. you'll be glad you did.

Sharon Jones – How Long 7"

(DAPTONE)

this is the sharon jones vocal with reworked music by tickla. it is a killer rock steady track that takes the song to a new level. priceless. buy this any anything else on daptone records. sharon jones has three lp's out that are essential and they just put out a gospel collection from mississippi. they put out l.p.'s as well as c.d.'s and press almost everything on 45 to boot. modern classics!

Polk Miller – Polk Miller and His Old South Quartette

don't fail to hear this cd. "I think that Polk Miller and his wonderful four is about the only thing the country can furnish that is originally and utterly American." — Mark Twain

in 1892 polk miller created a traveling show of banjo tunes, nostalgic dialect stories and a lecture. without resorting to farce or black-face. these recordings are from 1909 and 1928 and must be heard to be believed.

Harry and Jeanie West – Smoky Mountain Ballads

have had a copy of this l.p. for years and i usually listen to music of this type from an earlier era. but these two hit the nail on the head with their renditions of classic old time tunes. they accompany themselves with guitar, banjo and mandolin. the har-



monies are heavenly. this was newly reissued and i feel that it deserved your attention.

FM3 – Buddha Machine 2.0

fm3 have done it again. this is part two of their buddha machine. these are boxes made in china with buddist chants that are used for meditation. fm3 made their own version with loops they created. the new one has nine new loops and a pitch shifter so you can tune it or just make it sound wiggily. only for the curious.

Raphael Saadiq – The Way I See It

this record sounds like it was recorded for motown in the sixties. the production is excellent, and the lyrics are hopeful. this record makes me feel good and it will do the same for you. not many artists can pull off this retro sound but this man has done it. available on l.p. and limited edition 45 box set with an exclusive track.

Neil Hamburger – Sings Country Winners

(DRAG CITY)
few comedians can make the transition from comedian to musical entertainer but neil has managed to do it with his *country winners* l.p. he has hired top session musicians for this project and the quality shows through. unlike the “hip” comic of today, neil actually tells jokes, and is funny. something we need more of in this world.

Sprigs of Time – Various Artists

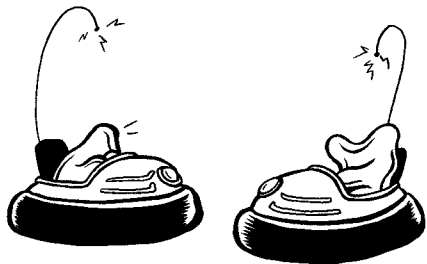
(HONEST JOHN'S)

Animals & Men – Never Bought, Never Sold

(MISSISSIPPI RECORDS)

Mississippi really made a go of making the classics readily available this year, and the Animals & Men reissue serves as the first vinyl reissue of the legendary girl-fronted beat/DIY/post-punk group outta early '80s Somerset, England. (And yes, nerds, the mixes and tracks are different enough that you'll need it in addition to the Hyped2Death CD-R reissues!)

JOHN W. GARCIA

Too soon?

Soft Machine: Alive In Paris 1970 – Directed by Claude Ventura

A vital, stunningly historic issue by one of the greatest versions of one of the greatest improvising rock-jazz ensembles of the late Sixties/early Seventies. It documents a performance by the rare quintet version of the band (Dean/Dobson/Ratledge/Hopper/Wyatt) in peak form, recorded for a then-new half-hour French TV music series. They were the first band featured, and their set was so popular that they aired a second show using the unused footage they shot for the first show. Most of the cameras were onstage and backstage, so some of the angles are unusually intimate and intense. It is only slightly marred by the occasional overdubbed cheers, applause, and drumming [!] that apparently were used to disguise some of the sound editing that needed to be done, and to create an atmosphere of wild abandon. This was unnecessary as the impassioned playing and hyper-kinetic interaction of the participants (particularly Lyn Dobson's Pied Piperesque reeds, harmonica and vocals [!], Robert Wyatt's jet-propelled drumming and cheerfully heartfelt singing, and Mike Ratledge's mesmeric keys) provide all the visceral surge one needs. Hugh Hopper and Elton Dean were pretty great, too. Do delve.

Hampton Grease Band: Plays Music To Eat

The reunion no one expected from a band that few people seemed to care about. Their only album, *Music To Eat*, was released in 1971 and shared the distinction (with Jimmy Giuffre's *Free Fall* [1962]) of being one of the worst selling/fastest deleted albums in Columbia Records history. Of course, this is more of a testament to record label incompetence than to any sort of musical deficiency, as the near-unanimous praise the band's live appearances garnered at the time can attest. Their gruff/heady mixture of country/blues/psych-prog/jazz, often in the same twenty-minute song, inspired favorable comparisons to Beefheart and Zappa (who was a fan) and, in a way, could be seen as a precursor to many an egregious jam band. But, as this 2006 show (prompted by the passing of founding member/co-leader Harold Kelling) shot in their home base of Atlanta, GA demonstrates, their combined forces reveal something altogether more powerful. Glenn Phillips' stuttering vibrato alone is fearsome enough to decimate the Trucks/Anastasios/Haynes/Jer-Bears

of this world (and the next), and his dexterous interplay with subbing guitarist Bill Eley (of the Swimming Pool Q's) is jaw-dropping AND subtle. The superb rhythm section has lost none of its ability to cushion and spur, and while Bruce Hampton's bark lacks some of its former bite, he remains an avuncular and compelling front man.

Roy Buchanan: Live From Austin TX (Austin City Limits) (DVD)

Jeff Beck dedicated a song to him. Robbie Robertson wanted to play like him. Martin Scorsese featured him prominently over the closing credits of *The Departed*. It seems that those in the know always knew, but the sometimes tragic details of Buchanan's life and death would indicate that perhaps he himself never quite knew. One of the great virtuoso guitar poets, he bore considerable renown for his mastery of Telecastery. His armory of techniques, while nearly always employed at the service of the tune, tended to transcend the more basic structures of the country or blues settings he favored and pointed to an avant-blues that he never properly explored. Still, to hear him in his element, fronting a sympathetic, capable band, singing his own songs as he does in this 1976 performance is to bear witness to a matchless talent, a humble innovator, and a hair-raising plecrhist in full bloom.

Revolutionary Ensemble – Beyond The Boundary Of Time (MUTABLE)

This aptly named band was one of the most distinctive, pioneering amalgams in the history of Creative Improvised Music. This 2005 concert recording from Warsaw brought together the violin/bass/drum. Majesty of Leroy Jenkins (whose noble nomenclature has been bastardized by a World Of Warcraft character) and Sirone and Jerome Cooper for the last time, as Mr. Jenkins passed away in 2007. Their instrumental and compositional palette was incredibly wide for such a diminutive formation. They were a chamber group who could swing and they were a jazz group that vigorously executed formal structures. Each member was not only a selfless ensemble player but had also developed very sophisticated solo music. All of this and more is featured in this remarkably moving album featuring compositions from each member, as well as more freely derived musical conclusions. They reunited in 2004 after a 27-year hiatus, and if anything, the vitality of the aggregation had grown more acute during those intervening years. While it is heart-breaking that there will probably be no more recordings and certainly no more performances, they have left behind a legacy of staggering ingenuity, of which this disc was merely the latest chapter.

These are five independent record labels whose output I've found consistently interesting/excellent enough that I'll check out anything they put out.

Fonal

Finland is positively brimming over with amazing and idiosyncratic bands at the moment, and the cream of the crop are generally found on the Finnish label Fonal. From the inside-out psych/folk of Kemiälliset Ystävät, to the Björk-meets-Jandek musings of Finn chanteuse Islaja, to the otherworldly pop transmissions of Paavoharju, it's a rare Fonal release that isn't eerily beautiful and unlike anything else you've ever heard (and nicely packaged, to boot).

Ipecac

If you know who Mike Patton and The Melvins are, chances are you already know how you feel about their general aesthetic (uncompromising, singular, not for the faint of heart, etc.). The other bands on their label, Ipecac (which Patton co-runs), generally share that aesthetic, as well as formidable chops, a penchant for minor keys, and a soft spot for metal, though they're more inclined to cherry-pick aspects of the genre (and for that matter, all genres) than just do it outright. If it comes out on Ipecac, somebody with pleeeeeny of other things to do thought it was worth their time.

Ektro

Like Fonal, Ektro is a Finnish label, and like Ipecac, its bands tend to cherry-pick aspects of metal with a healthy disdain for purity. But Ektro's got a flavor all its own, defined in large part by Finnish kraut/psych/metal/etc. stalwarts Circle, whose records make up the brunt of the label's discography. They've yet to put out an album nearly as transcendent as their live show, but frankly, just about no one has (their live show is pretty goddam transcendent). The records they do put out, however (by Circle, their various and many alter-egos, and such oh-really? bands as Quest For Blood, the only Japanese black-metal band fronted by a free-jazz flautist) are, at the very least, "interesting," often really good, and almost always rockin'.

Tumult

In a perfect world, every label would be like Tumult, an enterprise formed by a guy who loves music, wants certain records to exist, and then makes it happen with nary a regard to such bourgeois concepts as brand consistency or "the marketplace." Admittedly, their predilection for extreme noise and

black metal make it difficult for a milquetoast like me to enjoy every last release, but some of them -- like the shambolic cosmic stoner-rock of Japan's Solar Anus, the staccato ambience of Thuja, and the gloriously crushing art/metal of Harvey Milk -- are fuckin' awesome. Tumult, for better or worse, is never the same old shit.

Young God

Founded almost 20 years ago by Swans mainman Michael Gira as an outlet for his work. Young God also focuses on (according to their website) "highly personalized and emphatically original non-genre-specific songwriting." Generally somewhere between folk and experimental, with innovatively layered arrangements, lyrics that have had some time spent on 'em, and the best consistent cover-art aesthetic since the heyday of 4AD. Again, this doesn't mean that every last release is a hit, but if my experiences seeing Gira perform with the Swans and his excellent current project The Angels of Light are anything to go on, he's the real deal, straight up, and if he finds something "emphatically original," there's probably something to it.

Tip:

If you, like most people, think that this all sounds like a bunch of esoteric bullshit, check out Lyrics Born. That guy cranks out alternate-universe R&B radio pop hits like there's no tomorrow. Japanese eccentric Cornelius and and retro-soulman James Hunter are making some good pop records lately, too. And fans of melancholy (yet by no means maudlin) singer/songwriters should check out the Bill Fay album From The Bottom Of An Old Grandfather Clock. As for up-and-comers, do yourself a favor and keep an eye out for the best live band of '08: the one-woman wunderkind, Tune-Yards.

Dr. Dog – Fate (PARK THEVAN)

Good "old-timey" sounding indie rock. Written and recorded by the band.

Audrey – The Fierce and the Longing (TENDERVERSION)

An all-girl band from Sweden, Audrey makes pleasant "post-rock" songs of the less epic variety (songs clock in at 3-5 minutes), with a cello rocking prominently amid the guitar.

Art Farmer – Farmer's Market (PRESTIGE)

Art Farmer gives Miles Davis a run for his money in this outing. Hank Mobley on tenor sax, Horace Silver on piano, plus a drummer and bassist make for a satisfying hard bop record. Props to Shona for telling me about this record. By the way, go visit her in the

jazz section for more recommendations and to learn about the Flumpet (flugelhorn + trumpet).

MC 900 Ft Jesus – One Step Ahead of the Spider (SONY)

Hauschka – Ferndorf (FATCAT RECORDS) German pianist/composer who records/performs as Hauschka. I'm not quite sure how to describe this release, so I'll quote *Mojo* magazine: "Ferndorf is a sweet and spirited adventure in post-oral (pseudo) glitch that tracks back to Eric Satie and Ralph Vaughn Williams and is exquisitely suggestive of the rainy countryside where Hauschka grew up." A German magazine also compared him to French composer Yann Tiersen, most famous for the *Amélie* soundtrack.

Tip:

Bottom of the Hill is definitely the best place to see live Rock 'n' Roll in SF. There's an outdoor patio for fresh air, good food, tables, and comfy booths in the back.

Demian – Demian (reissue)

(FALLOUT RECORDS)

Two lead guitars, three part vocal harmonies, Corpus Christi classic rock (previously played as Bubble Puppy) — Hells yeah! They hit me first with their "Gathering of Promises" then knocked me out with this stellar album of revved-up and re-worked gem jams. Turn it up!

Tujiko Noriko – Trust

(KURAGE)

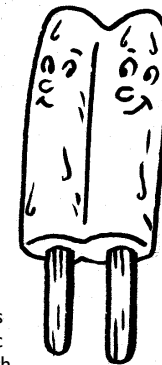
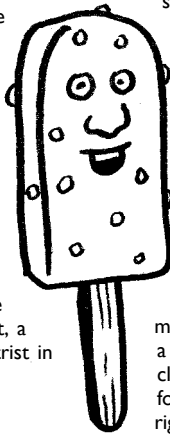
A few unique tracks, mostly bookedend by remixes and re-imaginings. Worth it solely for track 4: a remix of "Saigo no Kiss" by Hideki Ataka that could double for an alternate *Twin Peaks* theme song. In a word: Breathtaking.

Bottle Rocket (Criterion) – Directed by Wes Anderson

Charming, clever, and hilarious. Plus, the climax of this film is punctuated by the utterance of an almost (almost) transparent Guns 'N Roses lyric.

Mishima: A Life in Four Chapters – Directed by Paul Schrader

Everything about this film haunts me. So much so that I cannot really think of anything to say about it that hasn't been said, or that I can say in just a few sentences. Biopics are funny little windows into



multiple worlds of interpretation; this film follows the model at least ten fold, begging the audience to question just how blurry the border between life and art is.

DJ Revolution – King of the Decks

(DUCK DOWN)

Decade-plus “Wake Up Show” DJ deals a fresh hand with his aces sleeved on Boot Camp Klik label Duck Down — which is only coincidentally responsible for three of my five picks. “Deck” is stacked with a bevy of Revolution-produced spinners featuring appearances such as Sean Price, Tash, KRS-One, Guilty Simpson, Bishop Lamont, and a superlative compliment from DJ Premier...basically that Rev cuts like water chestnuts through a woodchipper, son. Bring your own soy sauce.

Special Teamz – Stereotypez

(DUCK DOWN)

Beantown power trio consisting of Edo G (formerly of Edo G & Da Bulldogs), Jaysaun (formerly of the Kreaterz), and Slaine (of La Coka Nostra) mashes out over bangers served up by DJ Premier, Pete Rock, Marco Polo, Jake One and others. Three distinct voices and styles are equally showcased throughout *Stereotypez*, which has more depth than the name alone implies. The title track addresses and refutes racial and cultural stereotypes, while “Race Riot” furthers the point with Edo, Jaysaun, and Slaine recounting their experiences growing up in a racially-segregated Boston (they are Black, Puerto Rican, and White, respectively). Cameos by Ill Bill, Sean Price, Buckshot, and Devin the Dude thicken the stew like cornstarch. Says Slaine, “Damn it Preemo, that's why my fam as we know, it's gully in the streets, yeah we keep it uglier than Janet Reno”...an impressive feat indeed.

John Robinson – I Am Not For

Sale (FAT CITY RECORDINGS)

Sciencz of Life and Sol Uprising emcee, Shaman Work co-proprietor, and general indie mainstay John Robinson delivers his straightforward not-for-sales pitch atop off-kilter knocks tendered by Flying Lotus, J.Rawls, R.Thentic, Jneiro Jarel, et al. Fat City Recordings also houses producer/emcee Wajeed of Platinum Pied Pipers...cop that shit like so many French crullers...or something.

Jake One – White Van Music

(RHYMESAYERS)

Seattle-bred sonic shot-caller Jake One has been furtively lacing everybody from G-Unit to Gift of Gab to De La Soul with impressive aural assists for seasons. He now lands on the roster that says rhymes to run drills on your earlobes with a team that suffers — or benefits — from dissociative identity disorder: M.O.P., Little Brother, Busta Rhymes, and Slug amongst others. You can decode Doom-isms, field idle threats, and find out how many of your favorite emcees are feeling Casual's shit — as they very well should — all on one shiny disc (if you hold it bottom-up toward a light source). A limited quantity of the album has been released with a bonus instrumental version at no additional cost to the customer which is worth seeking out (CD only).

Heltah Skeltah – D.I.R.T.

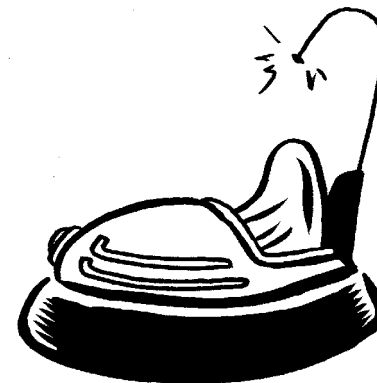
(DUCK DOWN)

Ruckus and Da Rockness Monsta (Sean Price, or Ruck, & Rock respectively) return to their classical fashion — bobbing and weaving furiously atop bits and pieces of Beethoven's “Fur Elise” on the Ill Mind-produced lead single “Everything Is Heltah Skeltah.” Aside from suddenly wanting a “dose of fries,” you may notice a slight change in frequency, both because of the industry's digital zeitgeist and the relative age of our two caped narrators. While *D.I.R.T.* notably lacks the macabre cohesion of *Nocturnal* — which only matters if yer head's up yer ass whilst yer ass is stuck in the '90s — the menacingly charming duo aptly demonstrate through mercilessly ignorant punchlines, hilarious studio outtakes, and one clever acronym why they are in fact Da Incredible Rap Team. The production contributed by Khrysis, Ill Mind, and Marco Polo further animates Ruck & Rock's shenanigans, who appear in high gloss dressed in full superhero regalia on the cover. “Got a mic and my a pimp cup, catch a right from the fist, chump / Leave a non-smoker chokin when lightin this bitch up...” Priceless.

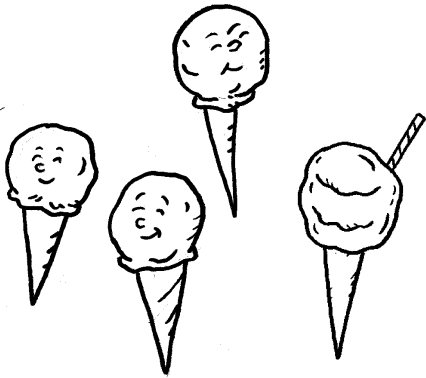

The Devil Came on Horseback – Directed by Ricki Stern/Anne Sundberg

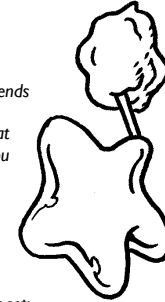

Rudimentary Peni – No More Pain (SOUTHERN)

They're still good and Nick Blinko still draws the most intense cover art I've ever seen. This is relentless. Honestly, the placement of Pachelbel's Canon in "E" at the end of the album is fitting. Every song is no bullshit, yet not exactly topical or determinate. A pretty good formula (or lack thereof) relying heavily on delivery.

The Ovens – ??? (AQUARIUS)

Keep an eye out for this. They are the spokesmen of a generation (which might not be a compliment to either party involved). A pop band (a la Fastbacks, Weezer, Bach) that has the attention span of the Minutemen without sounding like GBV...

Ahousen – Ahousen (PSF)

Although this came out a while ago, it's still worth mentioning. Sounds like the Soft Machine being assassinated while playing live (apparently at a place called the Penguin House)... the 28 minute "Ophelia" would probably be the post mortem track.

Let The Right One In – Directed by Tomas Alfredson

Preserve this incredible story as told through the lens of the Swedes before it is destroyed in the remake directed by Matt Reeves (*Cloverfield*).

This record — now without all of the new wavy metallic glitches and etc — might sound a little stripped down to new millenium punx who first heard hits like "Slave To My Dick" on mom's iMac but I'm confident they will relearn to love it.

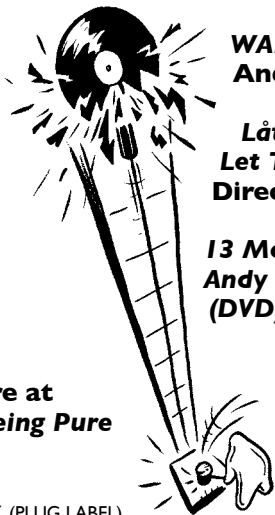

You put this record on and get lifted away by this modern recording which emulates a classic, late '60s soul joint, complete with that buttery analog sound... If it's humorous (break-up song) lyrics don't get you, the nostalgic falsetto harmonies will!

The Long Lost – Woebegone
(NINJA TUNE)

Mysterious 12" single... The Long Lost is actually a duo of LA-based producer Daedelus and his wife Laura Darlington. The original recording is a somber folk ballad which is really lovely... However, throw in two remixes by the infamous FLYING LOTUS and you get overwhelming, melancholy bounce... Pure awesomeness!!!

The Pharcyde – Runnin' (Phillipians RMX)/4 Better Or 4 Worse (DJ Nu-Mark RMX) (DELICIOUS VINYL)

Two of the best remixes I've ever heard... Seriously. The first is a remix of "Runnin'," a classic Jay Dee (aka J-Dilla) production, which stays true to the original bossa nova sample but gets an updated treatment of glitched-out drum punchiness! Nu-Mark gives his remix of "4 Better Or 4 Worse" a completely new beat. Dare I say it surpasses the original? I do! (Hear it for yourself.)

Blu & Mainframe – Johnson & Jonson (TRES)

My pick for BEST HIP-HOP ALBUM OF THE YEAR!!! A big claim? Yes, but well warranted and well deserved. Mainframe kills the beats... Blu kills the rhymes... (nuff said).

Madlib – Beat Konducta Vol. 5-6 A tribute to... (STONESTHROW)

A compilation of the latest two *Beat Konducta* LPs, which were subtitled "The Dil Cosby Suite" & "The Dil Withers Suite." So perhaps from that you can

discern who exactly this collection of beats pays tribute to? None other than the late, great J-Dilla. Any admirers of either of these cats will undoubtedly be geeked!

Harmonic 313 – When Machines Exceed Human Intelligence (WARP)

Electronic producer Mark Pritchard, under the pseudonym Harmonic 313, drops instrumental heaterz with a couple vocal collaborations... Phat Kat & Elzhi (of Slum Village) from Detroit get busy on the banger "Battlestar," and Steve Spacek lends his voice on "Falling Away." Pretty cool stuff.

Tekkonkinkreet – Directed by Michael Arias

This has to be one of my favorites animated films of all time. The cover is deceptively cute... However, this tale is far from wholesome. It's more so a psychological drama concerning two young brothers on the streets an anonymous spread of urban Japan who lose themselves amidst being swept away in a world of territorial rivalries of both familiar and strange origins... A beautiful piece of work.

Kung Fu Panda – Directed by John Stevenson & Mark Osborne

Over the Edge – Directed by Jonathan Kaplan

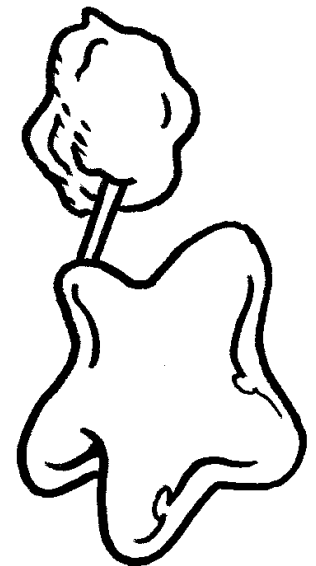
Out of all the teen rebellion films from the '70s (or in general for that fact), this film does it for me, hands down!! This film spoke volumes to me as a kid in the '70s, which actually wasn't hard because teenage angst was never really portrayed with much of any real reality... at least in kids' eyes back then. Every generation has a voice & they want that voice heard... when it's not heard, juvenile hell breaks loose, as in this controversial cult classic that was the talk of every school & town when it came out (most especially mine when I was living in Ohio) — so controversial in fact, that it had a limited run in theatres & drive-ins... but was preserved on cable tv with numerous runs on HBO & Cinemax throughout the '80s to solidify its cultish infection with the youths of the eras. This very fine piece of cinema reveals a problem that still plagues our society to this very day: The "invisible" (and troubled) youth and the price we all pay for it. Culled from a series of actual events that happened in Foster City, California in the early '70s. The story centers on a handful of kids living in a rural suburb named New Granada. The main character, Carl Willard, has been trying to adjust to New Granada ever since his father moved there, much to no avail. Carl's best friend is Ritchie White (played by Matt Dillon in his debut role) the town rebel. To sum up Ritchie, I'll give you a quote from the kid himself in the film: "... I'm an outlaw jack!! Them cops wanna' deal with me, they BEST do it on the street." Ritchie's one of them kids we've all come across sometime or another in our youth that you just gravitated to: the cool bad kid...even though you KNOW the boy's no damn good!...but it's the bad boys everyone wants to be around (it seems). The only place these kids have to hang-out/play is at a local recreation center (remember those, folks?), which makes them an all-too-easy target for New

Granada's pesky police officers. Particularly, Officer Doberman (intresting name, eh?), who seems to be on a tireless crusade busting kids left & right & have them spend some time up "on the hill" (i.e. reform school) if need be. The adults are at wits end & the kids are getting restless and it all culminates into one big explosion. Carl develops a crush on a new girl in town, Cory. She's a spacey, "out there" sort of girl, trying to find her way as well as her voice. Yet, like Carl, she falls in with the wrong crowd. A series of events happen, mostly drinkin', druggin', getting into mischief and eventually getting busted by Doberman. But after Carl and Ritchie's botched "meeting" with the Peppermint Patty-esque local drug dealer at school, Tip, Carl convinces Ritchie to leave New Granada and that's when the REAL drama begins!! Things happen: Carl's on the lamb, his crush on Cory blossoms into a full love relation (kinda' in that "Jack and Diane"/"Don't Stop Believing"-sort of vibe) and the school grounds turn into battlegrounds. A kick-ass soundtrack and a film of "hell yeah!!!" proportions! Ooh child, things are gonna' get easier... We hope.

The Foot Fist Way – Directed by Jody Hill

If you were a kid growing up in the '70s, then you already know how popular martial arts were and the only thing cooler than watching martial arts was actually knowing how to do the moves. So, a plethora of martial arts schools flourished at that time. I personally wanted to learn Kung-Fu, as I've always liked the fluent nature of the art, so, in 1979 my mum took me to a guy who taught Tae Kwon Do. How he hooked her (and myself) in was that he also taught "some Kung-Fu", that was all she wrote!! Signed me up, got my gi (martial arts uniform), my white belt and off I went to learn. As far as the "some Kung-Fu," this guy only taught me some flimsy "crane style" that was pure crap! I never forgot that experience and the people I met and trained with during that experience. This is why *The Foot Fist Way* rings the humorous reality that it portrays... yeah, these type of people actually exist. 4th degree black belt Fred Simmons (played by Danny McBride), a living swagger of exaggerated confidence - runs a Tae Kwon Do studio in a strip mall in Concord, North Carolina. This studio is his life, his love and if he can have it his way, his legacy. So he's the literal king of his castle there. The immediate first impression one would have of Fred is that he's a macho douchebag so full of himself that he probably wakes up & kisses his hand after the morning yawn, but there's a lot more to Fred than what we first see. The film breaks-down segments by using The Tenets Of Tae Kwon Do: Courtesy, Self Control, Perseverance, Integrity, Indomitable Spirit. We eventually learn that we're actually seeing each character's growth and change with each Tenet. Such, Fred's longtime sass-talking wife, rocks Fred overconfident world when she admits she had an affair with her boss (the camera "knock" during that segment was an added nice

touch). It is from there that we see Fred go through the motions that weaken his spirit, thus his "power" and eventually changes him...or does it? Fred's wife weaves in-&-out of his life, thus letting us know what kind of woman she REALLY is. Outside of Fred, two of his students are focused on from time-to-time: Julio, a loveable co-instructor-in-training that has to endure all of Fred's commands and "pissy-fits," and Henry, a meek kid who's the constant punching bag of fellow student (and bully), Rick (speaking of Rick, his extremely brief bout with elderly student Marge is hilariously & unshamefully memorable). When Fred's best friend (and 5th degree black belt), Mike McCallister (played by director Jody Hill) enters the picture, things get even wilder and better. Mike, an enigma of a zoned-out warrior-for-hire, had me laughing for the short period he was in the film. One small scene that stood out was when he presented Fred with a CD copy of his band, Sexual Warriors, a somewhat gothic/noise band that blows Fred away. Fred's hero and sole idol is movie star Chuck "The Truck" Wallace, star of the *7 Rings Of Pain* trilogy. Chuck is probably the biggest douche out of everyone in the film...nuff said, 'cause I don't wanna spill ALL the beans as to why he is such a douchegod. The way the film flows gives a *Spinal Tap*-like vibe to it (the dated look of the film stock they used makes me sort of think that this could even be a period piece, say...from the '80s perhaps?) and the humor comes naturally to McBride, as he plays Fred to the hilt. Everyone in the film actually knows Tae Kwon Do and the procedures they do in the studio/dojo are real, I say this from experience, which only adds to the authenticity of the subject matter. This is actually a feel good film, with some laughably warped parts to it. Kinda this year's *Bad News Bears* in a way. By the end you'll KNOW who's "The King Of the Demo," my friend.....KYUNGNEH!!!



Boom Bip & Doseone – Circle

(MUSH)

Celebrating the tenth (or eleventh, upon printing) anniversary of this great great album, one that I've enjoyed for all ten years on a monthly basis. If you enjoy either artist's other endeavors (say that five times fast) you owe it to yourself to give a listen.

Heartbeat Detector – Directed by Nicolas Klotz

The only movie I've seen that can safely be called a "Corporate Holocaust thriller." If Kafka'd written on a laptop, he might've dreamed up something like this. America's favorite European import Mathieu Amalric (*Diving Bell and the Butterfly*, *Christmas Tale*, *Quantum of Solace*) stars in this French film (original title *La Question humaine*) as a suit and tie cog elected to dig into his company's past, finding (as one might guess) more than he bargained for. Powerful, surprising, alarming, and anything but preachy...truly original! Warning: the ending is not for the faint of heart (no pun intended).

Ken Russell at the BBC 1962-1965 – Directed by Ken Russell

If you like the idea of Ken Russell, but find that his most of his movies are a bit too wacky, frivolous, or just plain cray-zee, then you may enjoy this set which includes the best of what he produced for the BBC before delving into features. These short biopics (usually 70 minutes) about artists and performers (such as pre-Raphaelite painter Dante Rossetti and dancer Isadora Duncan) have all the earmarks of why we like him: innovative visuals, explosive emotions, and Oliver Reed. However, since they were produced quickly for television, Russell can never afford to go too far — creating taut stories that are often more coherent than his later films.

The Super Inframan – Directed by Shan Hua

Out of the immense filmography the legendary Chinese Kung Fu film company, Shaw Brothers, *The Super Inframan* has GOT to be at the top (or next to the top) of their list of martial art oddities. This one's for all those patrons who fanatically shop at Kid Robot, Giant Robot and stores of the like, as well as those who are just into the monster suit-mation films/shows of the era. If you don't know about this film, then you're in the "Phantom Zone," as far as I'm concerned, because this is essential viewing for fans of anything even remotely similar to this. Strange and unexplained disasters are happening on Earth and it turns out to be the sinister doings of the evil 10 million year old Dragon Princess. Her goal is to own the Earth and make all of its citizens her slaves. The Princess summons numerous creatures/mutants to aid her in her destructive goal, all of which have the ability to grow to gigantic size and do equally gigantic trouble/destruction. Rayma, a member of a special forces team, is offered to be a part of a bizarre project that would turn him into a superbeing with special powers called Inframan and stop the evil Princess. What follows is a mixture of martial arts, sci-fi and monster mayhem of the highest cheesy order — but works great in such a film as this. Power Rangers be damned!! Anyone who was into *Mighty Morphin Power Rangers* will be fully, grade A retarded with this film!! This predates ALL that stuff, and while we're at it, check out *Ultraman*, *Spectreman*, *The Space Giants*, and the ultra-rare Japanese *Spider-Man* show: Yep, you heard right, kids, in 1978/79 there was a *Spider-Man* show in Japan that was S-I-C-K!!!! Track it down and check it out. If you dig all the mesugahness that goes on in this film, which was actually normal for a lot of Japanese superhero shows of the early/mid '70s. Lots of somersaults, lots of jumpin' around, lots of explosions — a whole lot of escapist fun to be had for anyone who maintains the kid inside of them. I also recommend checking out the original, undubbed version of this film...more to be had here. A wild ride of a film.

The Cruise – Directed by Bennett Miller

I'm a New York guy (Brooklyn and The Village to be exact). New York City abounds with interestingly twisted spirits and enigmas alike that seem to correlate in double harmony. Timothy "Speed" Levitch I would consider as both a beautifully twisted spirit and loveable enigma all rolled-up in one. Tim likes to cruise New York and loves to show the wonders of what the city has to offer both in history and beauty. Really, what this film's about is beauty, growth, understanding and poetry. Levitch is the star

& New York is the muse — or is it the other way around? The camera angles, coupled with the grainy black and white film stock and Levitch's stream-of-consciousness poetic rantings really brings out the striking gritty and fluent artistry that is New York, a most lovely city. Levitch struggles daily with his job at Grey Line Tours, as he's feeling their corporate anti-cruise noose tightening around his pro-cruising neck. He's in a constant cruise of the city — but it is really of self-understanding. Richard Linklater was so moved and inspired by Levitch after watching this film that he made his cult hit, *Waking Life*, which Levitch was also in. When Timothy explains the terracotta of a building, he exudes so much passion in his description one feels his kindred connection to the city...apart from laughing a little bit at his physical expression. The most intense (& humorous) sequence in the film is when Levitch airs out some personal laundry on the Brooklyn Bridge. When he speaks about his trials with his mother, he speaks with a magma-tipped tongue!! We really see the rage that seethes within him...as well as the love. The viewer actually learns a lot about New York from this film. It is very interesting knowing the people who've passed through this great city over the decades/centuries. Levitch has a brain the size of the city to memorize as much as he has about it. I've had the surprise and pleasure of actually meeting Timothy at, of all places, the Pee Wee Herman in-store here last year. He was with his girlfriend (yes! he has a girlfriend) and was a very charming man (put on a Smiths album, folks). Really great film about a great person in a great city.

The D.L. Chronicles: The Complete First Season – Directed by Quincy Le Near & Deonray Gossett

Ever since J.L King released the highly controversial, tell-all book *On the Down Low* back in 2004, exposing the age-old practice of black men having sex with men while trying to pass as straight in daily life, the term "D.L." has surfaced as a new language in American diction. Honestly, gay education in the black community is nil — couple that with SERIOUS religious overtones that we're brought-up with since birth & you have what you have today. . . a whole helluva lot of confusion in our society about homosexuality/bi-sexuality. This series on the gay exclusive cable network, Here!, explores this subject more visually & slightly more dynamically with four fictionalized men & their bouts with their conflicted lifestyles, all narrated by a journalist examining the issue-at-hand. ALL D.L. men live with secrets . . . secrets that they don't really want to keep, they would much rather come out & live the life they were truly meant to live, but in this society — & ESPECIALLY the black

community — they live under a "don't ask, don't tell" policy. the first reviewed is Wes Thomas — a banker whose wife's troublesome & wisecracking brother, Trent, is staying at their house until he can find a job & get back on his feet. Wes has some issues with Trent . . . but Trent's cruising eye is focused on Wes pretty intensely. One night, Wes has an argument with his wife, then storms off to get drunk in his studio & that provides the perfect opportunity for Trent to express his feelings for Wes. Yes, things happen & now Wes learns new things about himself — but also panics wondering if his wife will find out about what happened. next is Robert Hall — a talent agent who's taking care of his teenage daughter, Rhonda, but slowly begins to build a romantic relationship with Austin, who manages a health supplement store with his HIGHLY annoying employee. Robert tries to keep his relationship a secret from Rhonda, until she by-chance catches them kissing — that's when things get difficult, as the relationship is severely strained by Rhonda trying to find out the truth about her dad. "Boo" — THIS one, to me, was the most hard-hitting of all of them . . . & the most true-to-form as to the reality of all this. Boo is a thuggish brotha' from the hood who runs around having sex with men (on the D.L., of course) & women while posing a front like he's the "alphamale player", but secretly struggles with his sexuality & lifestyle. Jessie Washington — the neighborhood "fag" — is the only person in the story not afraid to be himself (& there's a Jessie Washington in EVERY hood!! whether you wish to believe it or not) . . . but it's definitely not easy being black AND gay in the hood (. . . & out the hood) . . . hence, the hardships of Boo & all men who walk the shadowy path of being d.l. Boo's constantly arguing with his triffin' girlfriend, Kiesha, who, in turn, kicks him out her apartment — forcing him to live with his mother . . . who matter-of-factly can't understand why homosexuals act the way they do . . . yet, another weight in Boo's conflicted life. Many people have dirt under their nails in this, but when Boo learns a shocking fact about someone, it breaks him down & wakes him up...or does it? the only thing I have to say to Boo & just about everyone in there (outside of Jessie) is: www.gmhc.org . . . nuff said. what price "keepin' it real?" Last is Mark Watts, who's just coming out with his partner Dontay — & all goes seemingly well . . . until Mark's "favorite cousin," the homophobic Turrell suddenly shows-up on their front door, fresh from getting kicked out of his girl's crib in L.A. & needs a place to crash while he tries to find a job. Mark reluctantly agrees to let Turrell stay — but doesn't want him to know Dontay & himself are a gay couple . . . or gay, period, so he somehow convinces Dontay to play straight until Turrell leaves . . . which doesn't sit well with Dontay, understandably. As the days go by,

Turrell's spastic, anti-gay nature strains the relationship to the point of detriment . . . but there's a surprise to be had by all in the end. I have to give righteous kudos' to my fellow black queen, Donnell (Jazz/House Music blacktrass at the store) for hippin' me to this series. I hope to see more films & shows pertaining to subjects like this, as we all need to educate ourselves on ourselves & each other, 'cause all of us got a stinkrose in our garden . . . oooooohhhkkkkkaaaaaayyyyyyyyyyy.

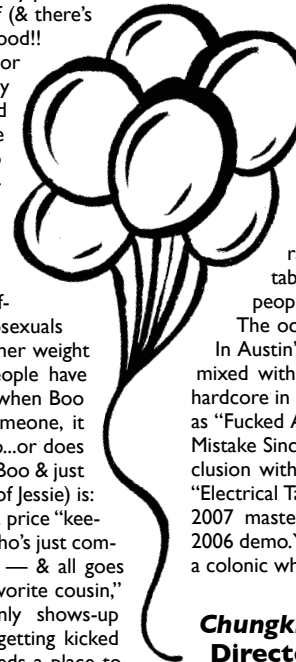
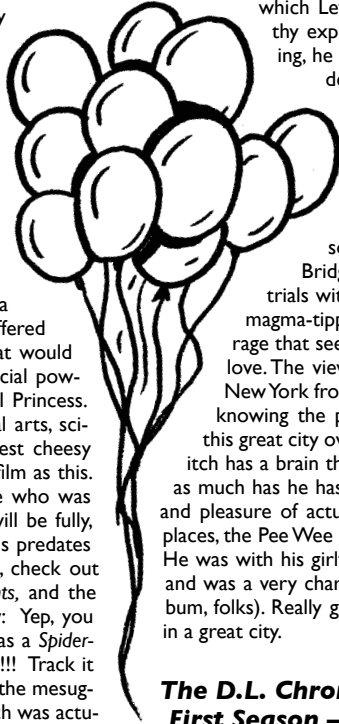
Total Abuse – Total Abuse LP

(DERANGED RECORDS)

A 28 minute musical nightmare from these Austin, TX hardcore degenerates. An astonishing and disturbing debut album brimming with nihilism and fury. After a four minute atonal noise intro the unhinged home invasion rampage "I Can See In The Dark" sets the table for 12 songs about the awful things people do to each other and to themselves. The occasional sludge jam ("Secrets," "Banned In Austin" and the brutally corrosive "Disease") mixed with some of the most intense breakneck hardcore in recent memory (such cheery singalongs as "Fucked And Injured," "Scarred" and "The Same Mistake Since Birth"). The album crashes to its conclusion with the horrifying abduction scenario jam "Electrical Tape." The CD version also includes the 2007 masterpiece SEX PIG 7" and their original 2006 demo. You'll need therapy, a shower and maybe a colonic when yer done listening.

Chungking Express [Blu-Ray] – Directed by Wong Kar-Wai

This 1994 Hong Kong masterpiece is the film that put Wong Kar-Wai on the radar of international cinephiles. Just in time for the New Dark Ages comes this fantastic Blu-Ray deluxe version from the venerable folks at the Criterion Collection. A dizzying blend of the techniques usually utilized in



Hong Kong action films with what are, at heart, two interweaved love stories. Great performances from Brigitte Lin, Takeshi Kaneshiro, Tony Leung and the screen debut of the adorable pop-star Faye Wong highlight this whirlwind mosaic of violence, loneliness, romance and longing.

Sex Vid – Communal Living

(DOMAMERICA)

After unleashing three nosebleed inducing super-limited 7" singles and some even more obscenely rare tapes, these Olympia, WA shit disturbers deliver an eight song 14 minute 12" EP that continues the brutal maelstrom of hardcore they honed on the excellent NESTS 7" and TANIA 7" from a couple years back. One of the few modern punk bands who can incorporate feedback ala the mighty D.C. legends Void while still bringing the neck breaking hardcore reminiscent of the brilliant Deep Wound, Jerry's Kids and SS Decontrol. Passionate, harrowing and essential.

The Fresh & Onlys – The Fresh & Onlys

(CHUFFED)

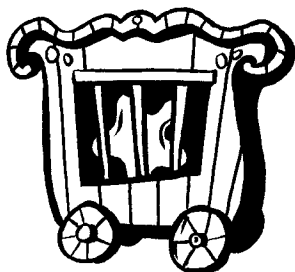
Ya know all those great undiscovered bands on those killer Messthetics comps? Well imagine if they were informed by doo-wop and girl group jams, had an understanding of the solid song structure of rocksteady and were steeped in the best qualities of mid-'90s boozey lo-fi (92-95 GBV, Strapping Fieldhands and Thomas Jefferson Slave Apartments). Well yer almost there. Kinda like the musical equivalent of a stew you keep adding things to and reducing down to get to something essential that is more than the sum of its parts. Consider it "makes you clean yer plate" jams.

Neil Young – Sugar Mountain: Live At Canterbury House 1968

(REPRISE)

Fresh from extricating himself from Buffalo Springfield baby Neil had just released his debut solo album and here at the college ministry at the University of Michigan, he delivers tremulous versions of Springfield tunes and new solo jams. Goofy and obviously stoned raps between songs and the uncertainty and vulnerability in this early performance add to it's charm. It's interesting to compare this to the already released 1971 Massey Hall Toronto solo performance and to see how in 3 short years he went from a timid performer to one of absolute assurance and command. A beautiful "Nowadays Clancy Can't Even Sing" (a Neil song that the Springfield didn't even let Neil sing in its studio incarnation because they said his voice wasn't good enough) and a heartbreaking "The Old Laughing Lady" highlight this early look at the only singer/songwriter who can come close to being included in the conversation with Bob Dylan.

Tip: I miss the fuck out of Mark Weagant, Ken "Spiderman" Hamilton & Anthony Marin.

Yeah they do! I been asking around and a lot of people didn't even know this was out. Is it lack of airplay and promotion, or are folks not checkin' this classic duo anymore? Whatever the reason, here is a solid example of the some of the Golden Era's finest still making noise.

Estelle – Shine

(ATLANTIC)

This is a great summertime at Mission Rock, dancing outside with ur lady or man, spreading the love, good vibe for all, wonderlific type joint. Look at it this way: a lot of people know the single "American Boy" with Kanye, which isn't even one of the better tracks on here! If you liked that, chances are you'll love the whole album.

Lalo Schifrin – Enter The Dragon

(soundtrack) (WARNER BROTHERS)

It's hard to live up to the stuff Tip put out as a part of Tribe. When you've been at the top of the hill, the only way to go is down right? While it's definitely not a reunion record for the group, there are successful

guest appearances galore, including Raphael Saadiq, Norah Jones, D'Angelo (What?!), and production by the late J Dilla. Besides these greats, Tip is pretty much on his own again after a long, long hiatus. He rhymes, sings, and produces on this record... and overall it's not too bad. In fact, it's the vitamin deficiency supplement a lot of us have been waiting for.

This Sacto band has been around for years, but this self-released, self-titled LP, recorded by Steve Albini, is their masterpiece. Pure claustrophobic hatecore. All ragged knuckles and jagged teeth. It is an iron shield against the inhumanity of the world. If it

counts for anything, I listened to this record every-day while I walked to work during the holidays. Take Born Against, speed it up, slap it around a bit, and substitute the politics with absolute derision, and you've got this record.

Sabertooth Zombie – Everything

(12 GAUGE)

Too many releases to pick just one. Imagine early Metallica doing Black Flag covers in the parking lot of a Parliament Funkadelic show and you may have the slightest idea of this band's essence. They have gathered the sounds of every band to call Norcal home, from CCR to Blatz to Exodus, and have created a most perfect hardcore cacophony. No other band has so diligently bore the burden of punk rawkish progression as the Zombie.

Ceremony – Still Nothing Moves

You (BRIDGE 9)

Have you ever been a teenager walking home from a woeful day at a cut-rate public high school on an overcast afternoon with nothing more on your mind than seeing the next morning come without dragging a blade across your throat because you are ugly and your parents are monsters and nobody wants to hang out with you? This album is the soundtrack to that disposition. These are the jams of a wretched adolescence.

Never Healed – Discography

(STRENGTH BY STRENGTH)

This band is an unappreciated gem in the murky waters of Norcal hardcore. Take the mammoth bombast of Neurosis and slather it with the caustic chemicals of Die Kreuzen and then nestle the whole thing into the rotten cradle of the East Bay's darker punk rock and you will have this band in a nutshell. A really fucked up nutshell.

Don't Trip – The Root Of All Evil

(SELF-RELEASED)

A new band on the scene, rising from the foggy depths of the Peninsula, that combines '80s East Coast greats like Token Entry and Leeway with newer Bay Area bands like Lights Out and Nerve Agents. They are good now, as this release proves, but greatness is just around the corner. One to watch, for sure.

Skin Like Iron – Skin Like Iron

(HUMAN WATERFALL RECORDS)

A rogue wave of dissonant noise. Dark as hell itself, this band combines the brooding contempt of Deadguy with the dystopian abandon of Leviathan, and when spiced with a dash of the static, lyrical depression of Joy Division, the results are overwhelming. Their releases and appearances are fleeting and mysterious, so you will have to dig deep into the foul soil to find this treasure. But find it. For your own good, find it.

Lifelong Tragedy – Runaways

(DEATHWISH)

This is a rare thing. The anthemic hardcore of Sick Of It All with the slit-wrist desperation of American Nightmare. This great band broke up this year, but this album is a wonderful testament to their honest depiction of suburban wasteland angst. All the great parts of hardcore boiled down into a single, potent, and disturbing spirit.

Scott Joseph Walker, MD, PHD,

Mad Men - Season One – Created by Matthew Weiner

There is a reason everyone is talking about this show. There is a reason everyone should watch this series. The attention to detail is exhaustive. Each character and episode is well-written, acted, and costumed. Eyes candy with plenty of healthy, good old-fashioned nostalgia for almost any age. AMC delivers and HBO-esque low story arc, with an ensemble cast that has few (if any) weak links. The commentaries are insightful (in many cases two per show) and warrant repeated viewings. *Season Two* is cut from the same cloth.

Roman Polanski: Wanted and Desired – Directed by Marina Zenovich

Roman Polanski doc, *Wanted and Desired*. Copious quality archive '70s footage & current interviews pull together this brutal portrait of a crazy genius. Good commentaries. Nice extras. Worth the \$20.

Wild Combination: A Portrait of Arthur Russell – Directed by Matt Wolf

An amazing portrait of a good Iowa kid rubbing shoulders with Philip Glass and Sonic Youth, then becoming Mr. Cocaine Disco Kid in the '80s. His parents and lover bookend this brilliant documentary with good performance footage. Listen to the cassette he sent his parents from here in S.F. in the '70s on bonus features.

The Rockford Files: Season Six / The Streets of San Francisco: Season Two (Vol. 1-2)

The final season of *Rockford Files* and the most recent collection of *The Streets of San Francisco* are high quality '70s TV at its best: chock full of brilliant character actors, well-written, time capsules of dime phone calls. Guests include: Tom Selleck, Lauren Bacall, Nick Nolte, Lola Falana, and Leslie Nielsen. If you haven't seen previous seasons of either—get on it—they are well-worth your time.

Bass lurk w/keyboards meets armies of violins and dungeons, skulls, all that. Pets love it and curl up near the speakers. Incredibly blissful and disturbing.

Prizehog – Alive & Well

(SELF-RELEASED)

The first squirt from the loudest band I've ever seen. I say shit like that all the time, but I think they compete, easy. Listen to this the night before and after you go see them lobotomize some dive, and you'll know. People talk about cavemen beating woolly mammoths in slow motion all the time, but this band actually does it, without bragging even.

Family Fodder – More Great Hits!

(FREUD-JUNGLE FULL)

Tried not to include reissues, but this is special. Sparks, Beefheart, and Lee Perry all squished together with a French female vocalist. All demographics, creeds, alignments, backgrounds, sects, please apply.

TARIN

I like my music like I like my coffee... strong, smokey, with one lump of sugar and a hint of spice! BAM!... You know what I mean.

Ray LaMontagne – Gossip in the Grain

(RCA)

I discovered Ray LaMontagne when I was listening to Pandora radio at work. I had it on just for some background music while I typed away, but when I heard the song "Barfly" I was hooked, and knew I had to hear more. Ray's sensual smokey voice paired with folk guitar riffs and country lyrics gives your heart a sense of calm and warmth. *Gossip in the Grain* is Ray's latest album, and though

a bit brighter than his past albums it doesn't lack in soul and it's full of old world charm. Also check out *Trouble* and *Till the Sun Turns Black*. His sound is compared to Damien Rice, Nick Drake, Amos Lee and Ryan Adams.

Johnny Cash – At Folsom Prison Legacy Edition

(COLUMBIA)

I traveled to Germany to celebrate my grandfather's 70th birthday last December, and while sitting in a house full with the sound of an unfamiliar language, one familiar voice sang in the background. My grandpa had put on Johnny Cash's 1968 album *At Folsom Prison*. Once I realized what I was hearing I said, "Papa?! ... Did you just put on Johnny Cash?" And he just smiled and said, "I am 70 years old today and if I want to listen to American country then I think I should be able to!" I smiled, gave him a kiss, and applauded him for his choice. My peanut butter loving, Heinz 57, American Grandfather has lived in Germany for almost 20 years now and though he may be far away, listening to Johnny Cash always makes feel close to him. *At Folsom Prison* is an American classic, and should be respected and cherished just like a grandfather. This is one Johnny Cash album that should be in everyone's collection.

Taj Mahal – Maestro

(HEAR MUSIC)

Taj Mahal's blues legacy is right up there with B.B. King and John Lee Hooker, and just like any great artist, Taj has brought his own personal sound to the genre. His roots influences and optimistic undertone have really changed the way blues is stereotyped. *Maestro* is his first domestic release in five years, and it includes the voices of Ben Harper, Jack Johnson, Ziggy Marley and many more. I'm also madly in love with his 1968 self-titled album *Taj Mahal*; it brings me back to my childhood... Ahhh. Also check out *The Real Thing* and *Phantom Blues*.

John Legend – Evolver

(COLUMBIA)

Five years ago, I was working for the evil empire that is Starbucks when John's first studio album *Get Lifted* came out. After we closed the store one night, I was putting the album out on the floor for the next day's release when my coworker noticed one of the albums had water damage on the cover. So, my manager gave it to me to take home... at first I thought, why the hell would I want this busted ass CD? But after we left the store I put it on in my car while driving home, and I was immediately hooked. I've been following his music career since then and each one of his albums has such a different sound, but they are all equally amazing. *Evolver* is John Legend's latest album, and again, I'm not disappointed. John's incredible voice mixed with R&B beats makes his music something to love. FYI, I still have that copy of *Get Lifted* with the damaged cover and I will never let it go.



Sex and the City: The Movie – Directed by Michael Patrick King

These collections take you back to the days when Oakland's 7th Street swung 24/7 to the sounds of Juke Boy Bonner, Johnny Fuller, LeeVernon & His Motley Crew, and Jimmy McCracklin, with many more crowding the bandstands up and down the street. Not as well known as Chicago's Chess crowd, but just as deserving of your ears, like Jimmy McCracklin urges — "Take a chance!" It's worth it.

Vincent Price – Master Of

The Macabre (EL CHERRY RED RECORDS)

CD issue of three vintage Vincent radio performances from the classic program SUSPENSE! From 1944 and 1957, including the Edgar Allan Poe story Price would star in the motion picture, *The Pit And The Pendulum*. SUSPENSE! was the perfect blend of hard boiled crime & noir-ish horror, with the highest production values on radio at the time, and the biggest names in Hollywood guesting each week, and Vincent Price goes for the jugular in these three radio shockers!

Night Gallery: Season Two

The final season Rod Serling's showplace of the erie and the disturbing, with scripts by Mr. Serling, adaptations of H.P. Lovecraft, August Derleth, Robert Bloch, Clark Ashton Smith, and A.E. van Vogt. Bonuses on this set include an interview with Tom Wright, painter of all of those fantastic works of art that made up that place of all places, the *Night Gallery*.

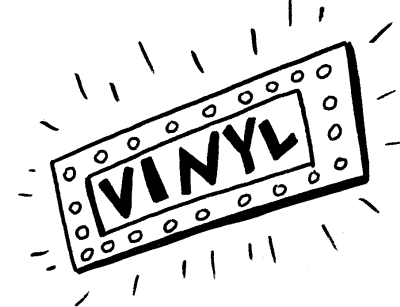

One of the best dub reissues in a long time. It's EXACTLY what you want in '70s reggae dub: raw, gritty, spacey and very very heavy. Top shelf stuff.

Motown Flies Jamaica Vol. 2 – Various Artists (JAMAICAN AIRLINES)

Yes, this is as good as it sounds. The long and short of this is that someone took original Motown a capellas and put them together with rock-steady, and reggae rhythms that are amazingly NOT cheesy. It sounds pretty authentic overall, even though the nature of this release is somewhat dubious. *Part I* is also great, but kind of tough to find nowadays.

East New York Ensemble De Music – *At the Helm* (IKEF)

Originally released on Folkways in the mid-'70s, this is an outstanding fusion of jazz and Middle Eastern with touches of avant garde. Hypnotic melodies, heavy bass lines, top notch playing; you get the idea... An incredible album that, unfortunately, is not available on vinyl, so the CD will have to do for now. If you like this, pick up Yusef Lateef's *Eastern Sounds* as well.

Gangsters Dedications Vol. 1 – Various Artists (SOUL STRIVERS)

Fantastic collection of rare lowrider oldies. This is exactly what you wanna be listening to when you are either a) BBQing in the park with family and friends on a Sunday afternoon, b) cruisin' the strip on a Sunday afternoon, and c) wishing it was a Sunday afternoon. Nice sound quality too!

Amanaz – *Africa* (SHADOKS)

Incredible (and pricey) reissue of African psychedelic rock. Very heavy and hypnotic. A must for both fans of African soul and psych rock. Yellow 180 gram vinyl. Deluxe packaging. No CD (to my knowledge). Grab this while it's around.

ZACK

James Brown – *The Singles Volume 6: 1969-1970* (HIP-O-SELECT)

Thus continues the saga of the greatest story ever told! Having found volumes one through five (except for 2, help!) I was thrilled to see number six come out of this utterly remarkable collection. Let's assume everybody already knows the merits of The

Godfather of Soul, Soul Brother Number One, Mr. Dynamite, The Hardest Working Man in Show Business, The Man With More Nick Names Than Your Entire Family Line Son! If you don't know, ya better ask somebody. Charting in the fifties and continuing relentlessly into the eighties (and beyond when you consider the frenzy of JB samples), James Brown is arguably the greatest thing of all time. That said, there have certainly been no shortage of JB collections. But the singles baby, the singles! This cat was pumping out 45s at a frantic rate, every one a solid sender of classic rhythm and blues like only one man can do. Each one of these singles collections comes with two CDs, totalling roughly forty songs, include extensive liner notes with track by track commentary, and fascinating graphics. And they are LIMITED EDITION!!! No? Yes! Get them while you can, this goes beyond music and music history, this is history itself. Get in where ya fit in!

The Tip Top Trio – *The Tip Top Trio: Ripped Open and Torn Apart*

Following on the heels of their 2008 release *The Tip Top Trio*, these guys are offering a new DVD of their explosive live rockabilly mayhem. Rockabilly? Rockabilly!!!!!! Sun Records style offerings cook with a liquored up intensity that shake, that hum, that stay tight as a drum. Check out the ludicrously virtuosic upright bass slapping, with the runaway train acoustic rhythm guitar, and tangy more than Scotty Moore lead lines. Add three part harmony and balls to the wall hellbound fury and, well... ya might wanna pick this up! Dig?

Bob Wills & His Texas Playboys – *The Tiffany Transcriptions*

(COLLECTOR'S CHOICE MUSIC)

Probably my favorite group that most people my age have never heard anything about, Bob Wills & His Texas Playboys not only originated the western swing genre as we know it, but on these recordings took the art form to a state of hot swingin', bare-knuckled perfection. Not that their regular releases weren't sublime in and of themselves, they were Jack. But these here gems were radio transcriptions (recorded right here in San Francisco matter of fact) where the boys didn't have to sweat cutting a perfect take to sell records with (which they did with astounding ease for the record, shmyeah!) and instead simply cut loose with the swing thing know what I mean? Like a beautifully recorded live show, The Playboys are laying it down here raw and real. Somebody please buy this for me. Don't burn it, I need the liner notes. Choice!

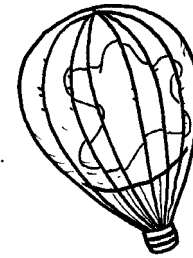

The revitalized SC bring with them a batch of incendiary anthems of protest, channeled suffering schrei, and impassioned celebration of "the life." Highly Recommended for fans of UK punk of the Huggy Bear ilk.

Cult of Youth – *A Stick To Bind, A Seed To Grow* (DAIS RECORDS)

Dais Records is on a roll with just their third release! Cult of Youth has all the signifiers but none of the current staleness of the Neofolk genre! FRESH FRESH FRESH! Sean Ragon's vocals have an untrained almost Punkish quality that give Cult of Youth a sense of urgency and passion lacking in many new Neofolk acts, and help make make this album an instant classic of the genre. HIGHLY RECOMMENDED, especially to early Death in June and Strength Through Joy fans.



Happy-Go-Lucky – *Directed by Mike Leigh*

On Import DVD. Sally Hawkins was robbed of an Oscar nomination for her performance in this film. It's one of 2008's ten best performances in one of the year's ten best films. It is also one of Mike Leigh's finest moments. VERY funny and poignant!

Long Way Round (Collectors Edition Box Set) – Featuring Ewan McGregor & Charley Boorman

Ewan McGregor & Charley Boorman travel the world on motorcycles. Waaaaaaay better than it initially sounds. The first series made me want to pack my bags immediately. Totally addictive, high quality fun! This box set features the second series *Long Way Down* and Charlie Boorman's solo venture series *Race to Dakar*. All series are quality! Something I learned watching *Long Way Round*: Ewan McGregor is totally the dude you want to find yourself stranded with in Middle-of-Fucking-Nowhere, Eastern Europe when the Mobster shows up with automatic weapons and a guitar!

Dead Luke – *Running Scared* (SWEET ROT RECORDS)

More tunes from my favorite bedroom troubadour in Madison, Wisconsin. Catchy, Lo-fi, ghostly goodness. This is the third 7" of dark yet poppy Bedroom New Wave from Dead Luke. Luke, unfortunately, has

already announced the retirement of this particular moniker to focus his time on his other projects, Absinth Minds and playing in/with Zola Jesus (another current favorite of mine). Fear not though, he'll have two LP's worth of material out in the next year on both Sacred Bones Records and Floridas Dying and various other cassette and 7" releases. Dead Luke is Dead! Long Live Dead Luke!

Wolves in the Throne Room – Malevolent Grain (SOUTHERN LORD)

I've been told Wolves in The Throne Room make Black Metal for people who don't like Black Metal, and I'm just fine with that. This band never fail to impress me and *Malevolent Grain* is no exception. Brutally beautiful.

The Joy Formidable – “Cradle” b/w “The Last Drop”

(TRY HARDER RECORDS)

“Cradle” sounds like a lost classic from MTV's *120 Minutes* circa the late '80s/early '90s. In the vein of Throwing Muses, Pixies, The Breeders or Belly. In other words, a heavy Kim Deal/Tanya Donnelly vibe/influence here, with good lumps of The Charlottes and early-era The Primitives. Poppy, lush & lovely. Catchy as all get-out!

Julian Cope – Black Sheep

(HEAD HERITAGE)

Psychedelic Folky Pop peppered with tough bits of Garage Punk gristle. Lyrical meditations on world affairs, anthems against Monotheism, and, as always, odes to the Earth. The best work Mr. Cope has done since 1993's CLASSIC *Jehovahkill*. Includes the instant sing-along “All The Blowing-Themselves-Up-Motherfuckers (Will Realize The Minute They Die That They Themselves Were Suckers).” CD available now with a LP version soon to be released! Yay!

Kiss Napoleon Goodbye – Directed by Babeth Mondini-Vanloo, featuring Lydia Lunch

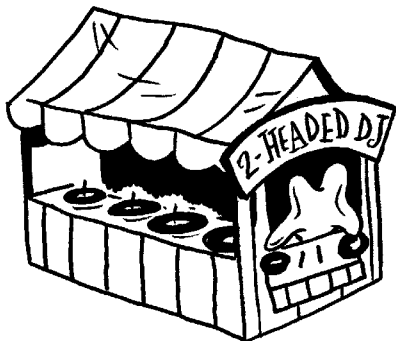
This long, long, long whispered about short film is finally on DVD. It is legendary for its (rumored real) sex scene between Lydia Lunch and Henry Rollins. No one can explain to me why this film exists. Apparently it was commissioned by some Art Historian and was publicly shown only twice — once in The Netherlands and once in Berlin. The quality of the transfer on this DVD is not that great (really? no one had a better copy?), but then again the film seems to have been made with a home video camera. It's a half hour of barely audible dialogue, lovely shots of Lydia and Hank's mugs, Lydia in various states of undress, novelist/spoken word artist Don Bajema bashing out windows with a hammer, lots of Hank and Lydia licking each other's faces before bumping uglies explicitly, and weird non sequitur shots of (what I assume is) Napoleonic-era sex in a horse carriage. Total

trainwreck. It's friggin' awesome. I loved every minute of it. Plus the DVD is stacked with bonus content better than the main feature — various Lydia Lunch concert footage, spoken word performances and an interview.

Buy everything *Dais Records* puts out, it is all quality!

Yeah, I know... I put her in my last list, but she played two shows in LA after that and I didn't see you at either of them so here she is again. The songs are good but see her live.

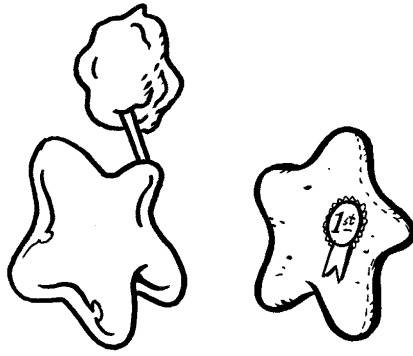
Vicky Cristina Barcelona – Directed by Woody Allen

Glasvegas – Glasvegas (COLUMBIA)
Combine the anthemic epics of Manic Street Preachers — sung in the thickest of Scottish accents — with a hearty helping of Phil Spector's Wall of Sound, a touch of The Jesus and Mary Chain's shoegazer drone, and some '60s-girl group and doo-wop sounds for good measure, and you get the amazing self-titled debut album by Glasvegas. Despite the plethora of influences, this Glaswegian band sounds uniquely their own, a fresh burst of brutally honest lyrics and dynamic songcraft. From the devastating album opener "Flowers & Football Tops" (written about the murder of Scottish teenager Kriss Donald), Glasvegas work their magic into one of the most drop-dead heartbreaking moments ever recorded onto tape. Gently segueing into the catchy and kind-hearted single "Geraldine," the broken and guilt-ridden voice of "It's My Own Cheating Heart That Makes Me Cry," the stomping fightsong anthem "Go Square Go," the emotional '60s-girl group rocker "Daddy's Gone," and the infinitely-building walls of sound of somber closer "Ice Cream Van," each one of the album's ten tracks is a definite highlight. Glasvegas is one of the most promising new bands in rock music today, and Glasvegas gets my vote as my favorite album of the year.

Available as an import-only from the UK is a special edition 2-CD set featuring the original 10-track Glasvegas album, plus a newly-recorded Christmas-themed mini-album, titled *A Snowflake Fell (And It Felt Like A Kiss)*. Recorded over ten days in a cathedral-turned-studio in Transylvania and two days in New York, *A Snowflake Fell* features the blistering tell-off "Fuck You, It's Over," the touching centerpiece "Cruel Moon," the wall of guitars, bells and strings in single "Please Come Back Home," and a haunting version of "Silent Night" (subtitled "Noapte De Vis") featuring the Concentus Choir of Brasov, Romania. While the songs are linked to that special time of the season, the mini-album stands proudly next to the band's full-length LP as prime Glasvegas, whether it's the dead of winter or the burning peak of summertime.

Mark Kozelek – The Finally LP (CALDO VERDE)
Mark Kozelek's *The Finally LP* is a collection of unreleased tracks and cover songs previously featured on various artist compilations, gathered into one concise, digestible package. Bookended by two original instrumental tracks, the remaining eight songs offer some insight into the influences of slowcore pioneer Kozelek, as well as evidence of how Koz can take any song and make it uniquely his own. From Will Oldham's "New Partner," to a country-rock version of "Lazy" by fellow slowcore comrades Low, and a [nother] version of AC/DC's "If You Want Blood," Kozelek's gently finger-picked guitar and sorrowful vocals aim straight for the jugular. The album's definite highlight and centerpiece is his cover of punk band Husker Dü's seminal classic "Celebrated Summer," whose lyrics perfectly mirror Kozelek's own sentiments of lost youth and faded memories.

White Lies – To Lose My Life... (FICTION)
To Lose My Life... (a.k.a. *To Lose My Life* or *Lose My Love*) is the debut album from British post-punk band White Lies, a band from a long line of recent '80s-inspired dark-disco-revivalists. Lead singer Harry McVeigh is the pivotal focus, with his yelps like Brandon Flowers (The Killers) or David Byrne (Talking Heads), down to his somber and droney baritone à la Ian Curtis (Joy Division) or Ian McCulloch (Echo and the Bunnymen). Sure, the band warrants the numerous undeniable comparisons to the forefathers of gloom-and-doom post-punk, but White Lies have crafted a consistent and powerful set of songs that rival not only their peers (Editors, Interpol), but stands strong next to their influences (Depeche Mode, Morrissey, The Cure, the aforementioned Joy Division and Bunnymen). The band's strengths truly surge on the unrelenting lead single "To Lose My Life," the cold "Unfinished Business," the driving opener "Death," and the bleak-becomes-soaring "Nothing to Give." *To Lose My Life*... is a miserably dark but exceptionally good

debut from a gifted new band, right down to the morbidly-obsessed lyrics and the eerily haunting album cover.

I've been a music lover all my life, and the existence of music constantly reaffirms my faith in humanity. Thank heavens I can work in an environment permeated by music and surrounded by those who share my passion. Salut!

Romantic Residues
Music by Alec Roth; Benjamin Britten; Howard Skempton; Gabriel Faure; Maurice Ravel; Andre Caplet; Camille Saint-Saens; Marcel Tournier
Featuring James Gilchrist (tenor); Alison Nicholls (harp); Jaime Martin (flute)
As tenor recitals go, *Romantic Residues* is very unusual, and not only because it features several world premiere recordings; the novelty here is that instead of the usual piano accompaniment, tenor James Gilchrist is supported by solo harp (and in some tracks

also by flute). Gilchrist's voice is like silk, and the selections chosen for the recital couldn't match his sweet tone better. In particular, the haunting "From California," a new piece by Alec Roth that opens the disc, stays with the listener for quite some time—not only for the beautiful sonorities of Roth's music, but also for Vikram Seth's gorgeous poetry. The rest of the pieces are well chosen. Some are familiar, some are not, but combined they make a terrific effect. In short, this is one of the most original and mesmerizing song recitals to appear on the scene in quite some time.

Orchestral Music
Music by William Alwyn
Featuring Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra; David Lloyd-Jones (conductor)

While English composer William Alwyn might be best known for his larger-scaled works and film scores, it is in these little orchestral miniatures that the true charm of his music is revealed. There's nothing heavy-handed here (as can sometimes be found in his symphonies), and the general sense one gets when listening to them is of a genius at play. There are seven gems on this delightful CD which range from the rollicking ("Overture to a Masque") to the sublimely pastoral ("Pastoral Fantasia" for viola & strings) to the hauntingly pensive ("Tragic Interlude" — inspired by the 1st world war). David Lloyd-Jones obviously loves this music, and the Royal Liverpool Phil play it for all it's worth. 68 minutes of magic.

Christus, der ist mein Leben
Music by J.S. Bach
Featuring Collegium Vocale Gent ; Philippe Herreweghe (conductor)
Herreweghe's survey of Bach's vast output of sacred cantatas continues with this latest volume, which includes BWV 27, 84, 95, and 161. None of these are particularly well known, but Herreweghe finds the hidden beauties in these scores like no one else, making each cantata shine like a mini-masterpiece. And why shouldn't they? It boggles the mind that Bach, who had to write one of these every Sunday of the church year, so rarely penned anything unmemorable, with the result that each cantata contains something richly rewarding. As usual the instrumentalists and soloists are top rate, the recorded sound perfect, and the presentation flawless. Do not hesitate to add this to your Bach collection.

Mission Road
Music by Juan Bautista Sancho; Manuel de Sumaya; anonymous
Featuring Chanticleer
Much of the music sung in the California missions during the Spanish colonial period was not imported from Europe, but written by local composers who lived and worked in the missions themselves. As a genre, this music has been almost entirely for-

gotten — the San Francisco choral group, Chanticleer, revive it on this CD & DVD package with wonderful success. Who knew that such glorious sounds existed here right in our own backyard, buried in archives, just waiting to be rediscovered? The works that Chanticleer has chosen for the album obviously represent the best of the lot — and these are truly works of genius. Hardly second-rate scribbles produced in a cultural outpost, these pieces rank up there with some of the most glorious liturgical music being produced in the old world at that time, and the native influence gives them their own individual style and sound. The companion DVD included in the set provides interviews which elucidate the history of the music, as well as live performances of some of it, shot before the beautiful background of California's missions. This is a must-have for choral fans.

Memory Takes My Hand
Music by Craig Armstrong
Clio Gould (violin); Lucy Crowe (soprano); Apollo Voices; BBC Symphony Orchestra; Garry Walker (conductor)
Craig Armstrong is best known as a film composer, but the pieces on this disc reveal that he's very successful in the concert hall as well. "Immer," the first work on the disc, is a concerto for violin and orchestra, which begins with a long, flowing, singing line on the violin which remains seemingly static for most of the piece, but which, in actuality, gradually mutates and changes, as its embryonic elements are full born. "One Minute" is a devilishly clever exercise — 15 works for orchestra, all one minute in length. That each of these is also highly memorable is a great credit to the composer. *Memory Takes My Hand* is an intricate work for soprano, choir and orchestra which, once heard, is not easily forgotten. As a whole, the soloists, choir, orchestra and conductor couldn't make a better case for this fascinating music than they do here. Recommended for those who want to expand their musical horizons.

Explorers Club – Freedom Wind (DEAD OCEANS)
These guys won't win any awards for originality, but they capture the magic of the Beach Boys pretty convincingly.

Black Moth Super Rainbow — Dandelion Gum (GRAVEFACE)
Tripped-out melodic phreakery, very psychedelic while avoiding obvious genre earmarks. Delightfully

woozy and synthy. Their other releases are very worthy of exploration as well.

The Millennium – Begin (SUNDAZED MUSIC)
Classic late sixties pop-psych opus finally available again as a stand-alone CD and non-bootleg LP. Lush harmonies, gorgeous songs, and spacey sonics.

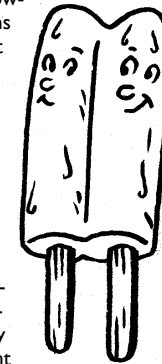
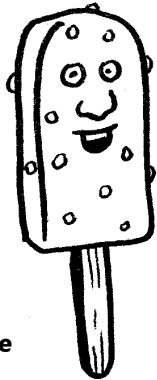
Phosphorescent – To Willie (DEAD OCEANS)

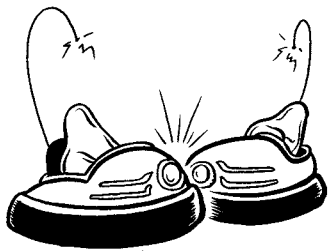
Bonnie "Prince" Billy – Is It The Sea? (DOMINO)

The original issues never did these records any justice. Too American sounding to be considered "shoegazer" and too British to be grunge. Swervedriver landed somewhere in the middle. Fans of *Priest Driven* Flaming Lips and Nirvana will dig these records.





COURTNEY

The Dark Knight – Directed by Christopher Nolan

Beautifully shot and organized. A captivating and dynamic movie, reminiscent of the Batman movies from the '80s, but with better special effects. I'm pretty sure everyone's seen this by now, and there's a reason.

Ladies and Gentlemen, the Fabulous Stains – Directed by Lou Adler

Finally! Finally! Finally! No more crappy bootlegs.... After you watch this movie, you'll realize where the White Stripes got their name and their look (it wasn't even a little original). Diane Lane's (Corryne Burns') teenage punk rock attitude is awesomely portrayed, making you want to join her band (gang), kick every grown-up's ass, and punch every dude. Not only do the Stains illustrate the ultimate rise/fall/rise to the top, but this movie even rivals the movie *Foxes* to me. With an uncanny Go-Go's portrayal of a chick band, I highly recommend this cult movie favorite to anyone who likes music.

Satyricon – The Age of Nero

(ROADRUNNER)
The Stabbin Cabin has not been able to shake this album...not only is it Black Metal, but it's got every other type of metal and hard rock elements ground into it. Don't judge a Black Metal band by its cover! You could be passing by an awesome metal album. Catchy hooks, riffs, vocals, and lyrics, all make for a quality album from Satyricon.

Ancestors – Neptune With Fire

(TEE PEE)
Only because Robbie from *Pitchfork* said it so well: "The album consists of just two songs — 'Orcus Avarice' is over 16 minutes, the title track is more than 20 — and both serve as launching pads for extended jams. But the soloing is supported by some serious riffs. 'Orcus Avarice' evokes CoC, with an urgency that brings to mind 'Heaven's Not Over-flowing' and a pace reminiscent of 'Albatross.' It's the kind of lumbering meganess that easily turns on a dime. So by the time the drums have reeled in, and

the guitars ascend into outer-space, it's hard to recall the tumult that came only moments before. Ancestors, able to do more than whip up a simple fervor, spend a good six minutes inspecting the same guitar scale and a slippery blues bassline that gradually builds to climax, like createine Pink Floyd." — Robbie Mackey, October 7, 2008

Iron Man – Directed by Jon Favreau

I like Robert Downey Jr. I have liked him since he had that crusty mouth in *Less Than Zero*. Now that he's cleaned up, well, I didn't think I'd like him, but he rules! *Iron Man* is full of action, not too much mushy stuff, and the effects are amazing. All hail Jon Favreau! (you had me at *Elf*.)

Tip: Don't knock it 'til you've tried it.

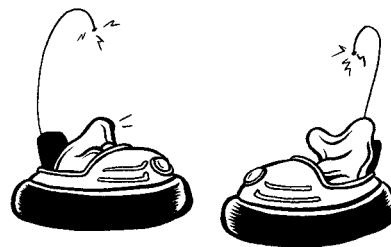
(TRUTH & SOUL)

MAG All Stars – The Best Peruvian Orchestras Of The '50s & '60s

This is a compilation of artists from the MAG label from Peru in the '50s and '60s. The artists tried to emulate the Cuban artists that were popular at the time (Sonora Mantancera, Perez Prado and Tito Puente) but it came out raw and a little out. This is one of the reasons I like this comp so much. Twenty of the illest Mambos, Descargas, Cha Cha Cha's and Boogaloes you have ever heard. All the tracks have deep soul. Even though you might have heard the songs that they covered a million times, The MAG artist brings something new to each song. The artists of the MAG roster (Lucho Macedo, Coco Lagos, The Swing Maker Band and Melcochita y su Karamanduca) aren't household names outside of Peru, but they should be.

Monte Carlo 76 – Marisela

(EAST L.A. AFTER DARK)
Monte Carlo 76's second release, *Marisela*, merges



the sweet sounds of West Coast soul with the vivid stories of barrio life. From love to gentrification, the album weaves together the harsh and beautiful tales that form the experience of living in the barrio. *Marisela's* songs are so intimate, you will feel like you are riding shotgun with the band through the streets of East L.A. Don't sleep on this one!

Chancha Via Circuito – Rodante

(ZZK)
Chancha Via Circuito is the epitome of the Digital Cumbia sound. They take from both Techno and Cumbia Villera, Argentina's barrio style of Cumbia, and lead it to where it's never been before. It's where Kraftwerk meets Andres Landero, Damas Gratis meets Dub and it's where street Cumbia goes into outer space. A must for fans of the ZZK *Cumbia Digital Vol. 1* compilation.

La Excelencia – Mi Tumbao Social

(HANDLE WITH CARE)
Ever heard the expression, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it?" Somewhere during the eighties, Salsa took a turn for the worst. Salsa Romantica became the favorite of sappy Salsa fans and Merengue, Bachata and Reggaeton became more popular than Salsa. Many of the old timers died, retired or got stuck in the Latin Jazz scene. La Excelencia lives by that expression. They smash their way through the complacent sounds of the genre. This is no "Baja Fresh" fare, this is Hard Salsa at its finest, done with an almost punk attitude that guys like Willie Colon, Hector Lavoe and Ruben Blades once had. There are no Reggaeton remixes, ballads or guest vocal spots to bog this release down. It's all sweat and balls that will leave even the most experienced dancers out of breathe.

John Tejada – Fabric 44

(FABRIC)
Fabric 44 is a heavily edited mix from Tejada, who is renowned for his studio prowess. Says the DJ, "I did edit the tracks quite a bit... to take it one step above of what you might hear when a DJ plays out. I wanted the whole track selection to turn into one piece of music: a techno-classical piece that has movements and moods from start to finish, similar to a conductor with a classical piece of music." The symphony will contain a host of tunes from Tejada's own Palette label, as well as two tunes from Hardwax in and among the rest. By the track number 15 he brings the mix to its major shift: the tracks get more stripped down and classic-sounding, right in line with the Orbital pick: M-Core's "Be Gene," Spooky's "Candy," and at the end, "Huba (Plaid's 15 Years Lost Remix)" by LJ Kruger. This last one is a revealing choice: it has the four-four stomp you expect, but instead of sprinting to the finish line, it instead gives the mix's ending a meandering flavor — it drifts to an end rather than cruising. Sometimes you want to finish dancing by walking in the sun.

Sputnik I – Various Artists

(PRO-TEZ)
First CD compilation from Russian/American label Pro-Tez. Deep and Stunning! Very Limited Edition! Hurry up and get your hands on this audio rarity. Most highly recommended!! Classy, deep and trend-setting CD!! Must have !!

Efdemin – Carry On, Pretend We're Not In The Room

(CURL)
This is an astounding mix from Efdemin, particularly in such a tough medium, and his wide-ranging taste is unleashed expertly over 70 minutes. *Carry On* is educating, entertaining and essential. TIP!!

Carl Craig & Moritz von Oswald – ReComposed

(DEUTSCHE GRAMMOPHON)
Craig and von Oswald's recomposing Maurice Ravel and Modest Mussorgsky and is simply mesmerizing. The texture and flow throughout is a highlight that more than makes up for the poor start even though the 40 odd minutes that follow the wasteful "Bolero" prologue are rarely dance floor material, as many might be hungry for. But the album does have passages that range from dubby electro to sweeping ambient and even a short run of brash minimal disco at the three quarter mark. While not likely to be as enduring or impactful as the originals, Craig and von Oswald's recompositions still make a fascinating and satisfying listen. Awesome!!

Swayzak – Snowboarding in

Argentina (SWAYZAK)

Re-edited, re-mastered and re-released over ten years on from its first foray into retail outlets, Swayzak's *Snowboarding In Argentina* album makes a welcome return. Legend has it that the production duo set about making the record so as to fund their dream holiday on the Argentinean slopes. What they came up with remains a hugely impressive clicks+cuts-inspired take on microhouse, pre-dating the similarly deep, dub-infused minimalism of Luomo. Originally this album arrived in two different versions, one for the UK and one for the US, so there's never really been anything that might have been described as a definitive edition. MUST HAVE !!

Eqd – Eqd#2 (EQUALIZED)

The first 12" from the mysterious Equalised crew outta Berlin caused much speculation as to the identity of the unnamed producer of such a killer 12". Dub chords stretching out into the distance and a deadly DJ Sneak-cum-Maurizio skank and skip pattern that you'll have a problem sitting still to. Second release is an utterly badass and massively recommended dance starter. TIP!

Stalker – Directed by Andrei Tarkovsky

Everyone needs to see this!! It will blow your mind!!

Russian Ark – Directed by Aleksandr Sokurov

One shot no edits! Masterpiece about Russian art and history and relations with Europe! Unbelievable. The one and only disciple of Andrei Tarkovsky.

Come and See – Directed by Elem Klimov

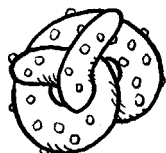

But if I had heard it back then, I think the music would have blown my tiny little mind so much that I would have spit it out. So it must be the gods looking over me that it's now being re-released when I would be able to fully appreciate it.

The Found Footage Festival Vol. 1-3 – Directed by Joe Pickett, Nick Prueher, Geoff Haas

I tend to find real life much funnier than the movies which could mean bad news for me someday when I laugh at someone who could beat me up... which is everybody really. So it pleases me that these DVDs exist so I can laugh at people from the comfort (and safety) of my own home! *The Found Footage Festival* is a live show that showcases the best in public access, training videos, or even home videos found at thrift stores, garage sales, and the like. It's hysterical, absurd, and downright surreal. And where else will you find Orco from He-Man telling children with divorced parents, "There's nothing you can do to bring your parents back together."

The Wire Complete Series – Directed by David Simon and Ed Burns

I wish I was smart enough to talk about how good *The Wire* is. But, uh, I'm not. This show is so good that whenever I try to vocalize how much I love it, the only thing that comes out of my mouth is either, "Awesome!" or some sort of excitable gibberish. But luckily for us, the people who made *The Wire* are much smarter than me and have crafted quite possibly the greatest show ever. So great in fact that you've probably already seen it.

Encounters At The End Of The World – Directed by Werner Herzog

Encounters At The End Of The World is a fascinating documentary by legendary German filmmaker Werner Herzog. In the documentary Herzog travels to Antarctica to film a small population of scientists and eccentrics that live there, and to explore the surrounding frozen wilderness. Herzog is not your conventional documentary filmmaker; he often incorporates many different filmmaking styles into his work and this film is equal parts nature documentary, comedy, tragedy, philosophical essay, and science-fiction film. Herzog has an uncanny talent for capturing images that appear to be bizarre, hilarious, and foreign to the viewer, while at the same time seeming somehow familiar, honest and beautiful. It's like cinematic poetry. This is beautifully captured in the film when the trainees are walking blind through the snow with buckets on their heads, or when the tiny organisms float by in the underwater ice cathedrals. My favorite sequence is one with an insane penguin, Herzog's quintessential mad hero of rebellion who breaks away from the pack and travels into the unknown, an impossible journey that will certainly take his life. It's somehow hilarious, heartbreaking, and profoundly mystifying: pure Herzog. *Encounters At The End Of The World* is one of Herzog's grandest statements, and the most entertaining thing about the film is how he makes that statement. Watch this film and then go watch all of Herzog's other films; they just might send you on a mad journey of your own.

Mister Lonely – Directed by Harmony Korine

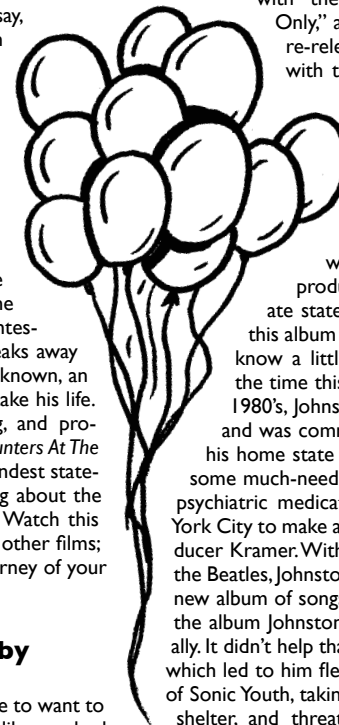
"I don't know if you know what it is like to want to be someone else? To not want to look like you look, to go completely unnoticed. I have always wanted to be someone else..." *Mister Lonely* is a film about wanting to become the person you secretly want to be, the person you see in other people and want to be like, your fantasy you. The lead character in *Mister Lonely* is a Michael Jackson impersonator. At the beginning of the film he is living in Paris and performing on the streets and in nursing homes for the elderly. He feels utterly lost and alone in his life until a chance encounter with a Marilyn Monroe impersonator sends him on a journey to a commune for celebrity impersonators located in the Scottish Highlands. The rest of the plot is ineffably strange and beautiful. What I loved about this film was that its characters are so innocently naïve and hopeful. They

are misfits that have been relegated to the fringe of society. But through faith and perseverance they have bonded together to create a loving surrogate family where everyone is accepted for who they are. It's incredibly touching the way the filmmaker reveals in his characters the longing that we all feel inside ourselves to become someone else, the person we really are inside, and to be fully accepted for whoever that might be. It takes incredible faith to believe that such things are possible, but as Werner Herzog's character in the film says, "a little faith can take us a long way," and this film is overflowing with it.

Daniel Johnston – High Wire Music

Hermann Hesse prefaced his novel *Steppenwolf* with the declaration "For Madmen Only," and Daniel Johnston's recently re-released album 1990 should come with the same warning. There's really nothing else like this in Daniel Johnston's catalog and it makes me wonder what brought this on and where did this record come from? How could a man who was known for writing playful, naïve love songs produce such a broken and desperate statement? To get an idea of how this album came about, it is necessary to know a little bit about Johnston's life at the time this album was made. In the mid 1980's, Johnston had a mental breakdown and was committed to a mental hospital in his home state of West Virginia. After getting some much-needed help and the right dose of psychiatric medication, he was invited to New York City to make an album with indie music producer Kramer. With hopes of becoming as big as the Beatles, Johnston headed to NYC to record a new album of songs. But during the recording of the album Johnston started to unravel emotionally. It didn't help that he stopped taking his meds, which led to him fleeing the concerned members of Sonic Youth, taking up residence in a homeless shelter, and threatening those who suggested calling his parents. But over the course of his short time in NYC, Johnston probably produced the most beautifully moving songs and performances of his career. 1990 comes off like a dark night of the soul. In this album Johnston is dealing with some extremely heavy issues.

The album can be seen as a kind of journey. In it Johnston tells us of his ambition to become a famous musician and how this hunger for fame lead him off the path of God and down the path of the Devil. As each song unfolds it's as though Johnston is traveling further and further into Hell. At the start of the album he is reflecting on his life as he slowly descends into the underworld. The first song is



"Devil's Town." In it Johnston seems to be haunted by memories of how he unknowingly entered into the Devil's realm, befriended the vampires that lived there, and soon became a vampire himself. The next song, "Spirit World Rising," with its pulsating droning drums and guitar, feels like a descent into a deep dark cavern. By the third song, he's reflecting on his past actions, and in one of the saddest, most heart-breaking moments on the album Johnston calls out to his lost one true love, Laura, and confesses that he has "held the hand of the Devil." In almost every song feelings of guilt, temptation, and betrayal appear to be torturing Johnston almost to the point of hopelessness. Throughout the album Johnston describes a world where devils torment him, memories haunt him, and darkness surrounds him. But he also manages to send out prayers into the darkness, asking for strength, guidance, and redemption. In the hymnal "Lord Give Me Hope," Johnston sings "Lord, hear my prayer/ for I've fallen by the way/ I know that I was wrong/ and I'm scared." In "Something's Last A Long Time" Johnston is haunted by insane memory. In one of his most beautiful piano melodies, Johnston sings to the picture of a lost love about how time comes and goes and yet she remains in his mind. This is a song about

how memories linger and how we cling to these memories, as devastating as they can be. After explaining that "it's funny, but it's true / and it's true, but it's not funny," Johnston concludes that some things unfortunately "last a lifetime." In "Don't Play Cards With Satan" Johnston confronts Satan himself. In a stark and chilling live performance Johnston sings of being lured into the woods to play a forsaken game of cards with Satan. This is truly the scariest moment on the album as Johnston seems possessed in his performance, screaming "SATAN" at the top of his lungs over and over again at the song's unraveling end. But from the darkness comes the dawn and Johnston's dark night of the soul is brightened by the weary hopefulness of "True Love Will Find You In The End." The beautiful yet delicate melody supports a simple poetic lyric, giving the song an almost hymn-like quality. This is a true song about love and faith, and Johnston sings it with a soothing optimism. A spirited cover of the Beatles "Got To Get You Into My Life" continues "True Love's" optimism with some added determination, but the final three songs of the album return to Johnston's bleak state of mind. They are the final act and can be seen as a summation of his spiritual outlook on his life. In "Careless Soul," Johnston sings of death and how careless souls should "heed the warning" for they could be called by God at any moment. Halfway through the song he breaks down crying,



meditating on how sad it is to face the judgment of God. Johnston ends his journey in the "Funeral Home." He's descended into Hell, confronted the Devil, overcome him, and made it out alive. But he hasn't made it all the way back to the land of the living. Johnston is stranded at the funeral home, a purgatory-like location where he exuberantly sings about how he's "got a coffin shiny and black/ I'm going to the funeral and I'm never coming back!" The last song on the album plays as a coda, the Christian hymn "Softly and Tenderly." Sung by Johnston's local church parish the recording has an impromptu lo-fi quality that gives the song a distant and dreamlike quality. The voices are coming from some celestial perch, delicately comforting and calling the weary sinners home; "softly and tenderly Jesus is calling, calling for you and for me, softly and tenderly Jesus is calling, calling oh sinner come home, you who are weary come home."

1990 is available again on CD and has recently been remastered with new liner notes from the producer Kramer, along with five additional bonus demo tracks. The remastering sounds great and the liner notes and bonus tracks give an added insight into the making of the album. It's currently available now at Amoeba Music... For Madmen Only.

Patti Smith and Kevin Shields – The Coral Sea (TBC)

The Coral Sea is a poem Smith wrote for a close friend that passed away. She performs it live here with Kevin Shields of My Bloody Valentine. Playing an assortment of instruments, Shields creates a dense dream-scape for Smith's hallucinatory, moving verse. It really is mesmerizing, especially the final track "Litany." Check it out.

Paranoid Park – Directed by Gus Van Sant

I really loved this Gus Van Sant film. It's about a young teen who wants to hangout at the local skate park, but in doing so he experiences a life changing accident. This is another one of Van Sant's dreamy, meditative character studies, like his previous films *Last Days* and *Elephant*. In this film he captures that middle school state of mind like no other director has. Watch this movie and let it cast its spell on you.

Bee Gees – Odessa [Deluxe Edition] (REPRISE)

The Bee Gees' music from the 1960s is amazing and this is by far their best album from that period. I'd say this album's their "Mt. Everest," it's epic, sweeping, gorgeous, and it has recently been re-mastered and re-released in a three disc set. Forget what you know of the Bee Gees of the disco '70s, and have your mind blown by this psychedelic, symphonic masterpiece.

The New World - The Extended Cut – Directed by Terrence Malick

The extended cut of Terrence Malick's 2005 film has an extra 30 minutes of footage that only adds to the films depth and beauty. No one makes films the way Terrence Malick does. Buy this film and let yourself get lost in his world.

Let The Right One In – Directed by Tomas Alfredson

Summer Heights High – Directed by Stuart McDonald

This mockumentary series about life at an Australian high school stars comedian, Chris Lilley. Chris portrays three different characters: Ja'mie King, a privileged private school transfer student; Jonah, a troubled and disobedient teen; and Mr. G, the Drama teacher. Lilley is so adept and hilarious at his portrayal of these characters, you forget it's him. Warning: This series will have you singing "she's a naughty girl with a bad habit, bad habit for drugs" and tagging "dicktation."

Dan Auerbach – Keep It Hid (NONESUCH RECORDS)

A soulful, more subdued effort from the singer/guitar player of The Black Keys. Does not disappoint!

Endless Boogie – Focus Level

(NO QUARTER)

Take a bunch of Rolling Stones, mix it with some Led Zeppelin and some Pink Floyd, then throw in some heavy psych and some Spacemen 3 and even a dash of ZZ Top and you get Endless Boogie. No 3 minute radio songs here, just a great album to listen to and really dig your teeth into.

Bison B.C. – Quiet Earth

(METAL BLADE)

Wow, hard and heavy just like I like it. Great playing, not your typical Sabbath type songs that you would expect from the name. Lots of change ups within the songs and it harkens back to some good old thrash metal mixed with a good amount of doom and gloom. This will raise your jaded eyebrows.

Lucifer's Friend – Lucifer's Friend

(SPV)

A reissue you just need to own if you are a fan of Deep Purple, Uriah Heep, and heavy metal in general. This is a classic album, a forerunner of what would turn into early heavy metal. Released in 1973, this German band featured a British singer, John Lawton, who does some amazing wailing vocals on this. Heavy organ drives this masterpiece. Krautrock at its best.

Zero Boys – Vicious Circle

(SECRETLY CANADIAN)

Reissue of a truly great American punk album, long out of print. This whole album is classic punk mixed with hardcore. Though Indianapolis may not be remembered for much when it comes to music, it produced the Zero Boys. Recorded in just 2 days and released in 1982 originally this album just smokes. A requirement for any punk rock collection, one of the best Midwest punk releases ever.

Dust – Hard Attack

(REPERTOIRE)

American prog psych proto metal. This was the second and final album from Dust; they would later merge with another band on their same label to form Stories. Another forerunner of heavy metal this album was originally released in 1972. Features Frazetta artwork. Dust was made up of Marc Bell (who would go on to Richard Hell and the Voidoids and then the Ramones), Richie Wise, and Kenny Aaronson (who would later go on to HSAS and Stories as well as playing with Rick Derringer, Foghat, and many others). This is classic American hard psych, for fans of Mountain, Deep Purple, and Cream.

Janelle Monae – *Metropolis: The Chase Suite (Special Edition)*

(BAD BOY / WONDALAND)

Whoa, where even to begin with this one! O.K., I haven't been this excited by a new artist in probably four years! *The Chase Suite* has a theatrical feel to it, with choral, string, and horn arrangements that sometimes do make the songs sound as if they are from a musical. And songs are based on the story of Cindi Mayweather, an android who has fallen in love with a human and is now being hunted down by others in her society who feel she must be disassembled for this malfunction. And though robot characters have been used so often before to show how society can be cold and dehumanizing, (according to Allmusic, the album's title is a reference to the 1920s Fritz Lang film) Ms. Monae uses the robot/alien metaphor to great effect to address the many levels of inequality and cold heartedness that one can find in the world. AND with her cleverness, strong positive personality, and songbird's voice that is a delight to listen to, she makes thinking FUN, even about uncomfortable topics. She's been compared to Andre 3000 (Big Boi of OutKast was an early fan of hers when she was performing in Atlanta), and you can hear why on the album's first 2 songs. They have a simple "Hey Ya" rock beat, some Farfisa organ adding a 1960s/1980s sound, and the giddy feel of a hit top-forty song that can't be stopped cause it's so catchy. The next full song uses a stripped down arrangement of only Shirley Bassey "Goldfinger" style dramatic horn riff, some resolved, strong Odetta-ish "Lord have mercys," plus a jazzy bass line as the song's anchor, asking "are we really living or just walking dead?" when people turn to drug abuse and material possessions for their source of happiness. Then the song "Mr. President" begins with a smooth 70s soul sound, simple horns and warm bright guitar. This song reminds me a bit of Harold Melvin and the Blue Notes' "Wake Up Everybody." (Whoa, in the previous song, she even says, "Daydreamers, wake up.") Ms. Monae very respectfully asks the president to please remember the problems we are facing: war & the lack of funding for education, the A.I.D.S. pandemic, and a failing economy, and to lead the U.S. "with your heart & not your pride." Remember, this song was written addressing ex-President Bush, so the lack of frustration and anger from Ms. Monae shows an inspiring optimism. I'd say the over-riding message of this CD is a reminder for us: "Be courageous — love no matter what."



P.S. Be sure to look up her video to "Many Moons" on YouTube. Again, it will remind you of the "Hey Ya" video. Ms. Monae plays many characters in the video, all the same "9000" model of android, she has a great sharp/quirky sense of style (cute saddle oxfords!) and there's those English horseback riding/jockey inspired costumes. Oh, also, if you buy the vinyl, it's red and you get 1 extra track, a different mix of "Violet Stars Happy Hunting!!!" + a CD copy.

Eagle Nebula – *Cosmic*

Headphones (EPISTROPHIK PEACH SOUND)

"Some call it strange, some call it spiritual," Georgia Ann Muldrow raps on her new album, *Cosmic Headphones*. Well, yes, but what's strange is that this is a Hip-Hop recording brimming with good vibes and even better intentions. For too long, I'm afraid, Hip-Hop has been used to carry the message, "I'm making bank, so f-y'all!" Ms. Muldrow's album is the antidote to all that foolishness. She leads by example, explaining how she sees each day as a fresh start on the song "Daily Debut." In her easygoing realm of Hip-Hop, the accomplishments she boasts and fantasizes about are putting a stop to war by making soldiers hug one another and finding a cure for A.I.D.S. And the music is FUNKY with buzzy programmed basslines, handclaps, and sunny, bell or organ-like keyboard sounds. Her music is laid back, a slow and swaying groove that always reminds me of Funkadelic. She also pays tribute to the genre of Hip-hop by writing a song about how important the music form is to her and how it will always be around. Her lyrics are SO positive and uplifting that they caused my rather sour roommate to open my door last night and complain, "What are you DOING listening to socially conscious Hip-Hop at 2:00 in the morning?" Well, I say, any help I can get to be a lighthearted yet compassionate person I will gladly listen to! And she does open the album with the down to earth acknowledgement "Do you sometimes find life hard and unbearable?" Her lyrics aren't escapist or preachy, just some solid advice and reminders on how to keep going. She uses a great sense of humor and creative (and polite) choice of words to keep her outlook determinedly lighthearted. There are a couple of songs about more trivial current trends too, like "Celebrity Stylist" and "Ether Cash," about starting an eBay store. She and band co-member, the fabulous Dudley Perkins, have the most natural way of transcribing the thoughts in their minds into uncensored communication with the rest of us, very free and honest, we know their fears, pains, joys, and silliness. After listening to their records you really feel like you have made a new friend. Thanks, Eagle Nebula, for being so playful and profound.

Galt MacDermot/Gerome Ragni/James Rado – *Hair [O.C.R. Broadway Deluxe Collector's Edition]*

(RCA)

Here's my "one from the vaults" recommendation. I never bothered to listen to this album, having de-

cidated that I don't care for musicals and that I knew the ubiquitous songs already: "Aquarius," "Hair," and "Let the Sunshine In." And having decided that once a production makes it to Broadway, there can't be much counter-culture left in it. I can't believe all the good songs I was missing: "Ain't Got No," "Where Do I Go," the protest songs, "Air" and "Dead End," the truly funny teen rebel song, "Going Down," comparing being expelled from high school to Lucifer's fall from heaven, the stately and beautiful, "Easy to Be Hard," and the hilarious flag-waver parody, "Don't Put It Down." And the wistful "Frank Mills," a song any girl in love and missing her man can relate to. My earlier bias against the play being an outsider's imitation of hippie lifestyle started to fade away, as I found myself connecting strongly to the lyrics. The characters seem so real to me, I started picturing what Claude, Sheila, Berger and the others looked like. I knew what they were going through. Then I read up on the musical, and it turns out that the two creators, Gerome Ragni and James Rado, were in their 20s and were actors in the play themselves; they wanted to make a performance explaining their own East Village hippie youth culture. They envisioned the play as loosely structured, more of a spontaneous "happening" as new songs and scenes were written, and old ones left out. But you can read all about it too, if you get this great deluxe edition two disc set, with the essential addition (remember some songs were dropped or added for the Broadway play) of the 1967 off-Broadway production as a whole bonus disc, along with an interview with the inspiring and innovative Canadian composer, Mr. Galt MacDermot. He wanted to make the music sound less like the guitar rock that was on the radio, but still have a youthful, soulful feel that would work with teenagers singing it. He started describing the music as, "no it's not rock'n'roll, it's funk," years before funk became a recognized style. Just last summer, for its 40th anniversary, *Hair* was revived by the New York Shakespeare Festival, the original producers of the play. It enjoyed a successful and extended run, with the possibility of the production traveling to other cities. The lasting greatness of this play is that it does allow one to travel back and get a feel for the late 1960s, all the innovations and conflicts, and realize we're still dealing with a lot of the same difficult issues addressed in *Hair*. And its not just a play about hippies, but about anyone becoming an adult in America.

P.S. If you check the vinyl in the Soundtrack section of the store, you may well come across the off-Broadway version of *Hair*. The cool cover has Mr. Ragni and Mr. Rado posing with 1880s photos of Native Americans, and this record will be priced at \$1.00!



Neil Young – *Sugar Mountain: Live at Canterbury House 1968*

(REPRISE)

O.K., I am admittedly a huge fan, so I've got to explain how this collection of songs taken from a two night booking at a small club is something special that you NEED to hear. Simply, it's the setting in time and space: a college town solo acoustic show after the recent dissolution of Mr. Young's success with his rock band Buffalo Springfield. He seems relieved to not have to be a top-forty pop star, but also a bit stunned at not having the success he worked hard for and perks that went along with it, things he thought he always wanted. He has a self-deprecating sense of humor; apologizing for not combing his hair and for not having any lighthearted songs, labelling all of his as "downers." He wants to come across as easygoing, but his between song stories reveal a busy, restless mind, full of bright questions and observations as well as the self-consciousness of a sensitive young man, only 23. He's just too nervous and hardworking to be a starry eyed flower child. Dissatisfied with his selection of songs he declares, "I'm going to go home and just work on new songs for a month!" Although his frankness, nervousness and thick, kinda nerdy Canadian accent add even more to an already endearing demeanor. So, we find Mr. Young at the crossroads, a place where stories begin. Incredibly, once he starts playing, all sense of self-doubt and awkwardness disappear as he really goes into the song, feeling right at home with the difficult emotions of longing, sadness, and loneliness. He seems able to forget about the audience while he's performing. Never have his remarkable, archetype-invoking lyrics sounded more powerful than on this CD. I'm thinking specifically of the songs, "Old Laughing Lady," "The Loner," "Last Trip to Tulsa," (a song which in the past I've considered too meander-y), "If I Could Have Her Tonight" and of course "Sugar Mountain." This CD points the way to Mr. Young's oncoming success, an intimate document of a young genius at work and undeniably on his way.

Obsession – Various Artists (BULLY)

This is a psychedelic compilation of music primarily from Brazil, but includes bands from Argentina, Uruguay, and Peru as well as three Turkish bands and one from India. Recording dates are from 1967-1973, falling into the range of my personal golden age of music timeline. There are some wild, fuzzed out numbers here, along with sweeter stuff featuring dreamy harmonies. You'll also hear some amazing beats. A majority of the bands are little known today, so this collection of freaked-out, funky gems is itself a treasure. It comes with easy-to-read, informative liner notes featuring the album art or band photo above a song's description. If you like Tropicalia artists, Santana, El Chicano, and/or Middle Eastern Rock, or Madlib, chances are you need this CD. Brought to you by Mike Davis of Academy records and DJ Signify out of NYC.

Have you looked at your television lately? What's going on? Why did television get so darn good in the '00s? Bush? Thatcher made British comics good, it stands to reason Bush could do the same to TV. There does seem to be a bit of a dark undercurrent to all the shows I've listed here. Actually, they're all almost relentlessly, shamefully dark.

Also, they're all available on majestic DVD, upstairs on the majestic MEZZANINE right here at MAJESTIC AMOEBA HOLLYWOOD!

Mad Men

How many critics need to tell you to watch this show before you actually sit down and do it? Yeah, it's a little slow, but slow things pay off. Like a spaghetti western. Or graduate school. It's light on overt plot development and heavy on mood and subtext, but that mood and subtext are an effective, biting indictment of the misogynist, capitalist era it's focused upon (an era in which, some would argue, we still live). The acting is mostly presence, but most of the actors have the type of burning presence you just plum don't see anymore. Also, I want Don Draper to be my boyfriend. Yeah, I know he's married and I know he has other mistresses and he can be a little cold sometimes and I know we're both heterosexual and I'm a record store clerk and he's a fictional character and yadda yadda yadda. All I know is that when I'm in his arms I feel safe.

The Wire

Going from a show that is nearly all mood and not much plot to a show that's plot is so thick you could choke to death on it, *The Wire* has an absolute lock on the over-saturated crime-show genre. The plot has the delicate grace of a ballet, with extra care put in to highlight the mercurial, fragile nature of the pursuit of justice in an unjust universe. As complicated as the plot is, it never seems to get lost in the shuffle of the surprisingly large number of characters and believable emotional lives that the writers juggle every episode. It's tailor made for the DVD format, as you'll find yourself popping in disc after disc in marathon sessions of made-for-HBO crime drama goodness. Also, I want Stringer Bell to be my boyfriend.

Battlestar Galactica

"Dude, you should totally be watching *Battlestar Galactica*. It's a really smart show." "Of course it's smart, it's for nerds." "What? No, it's not for nerds! It's got

everything. Melodrama, humor, sex, political intrigue, topical metaphor, betrayal, space, explosions, robots...the acting is great, the dialogue is realistic, the special effects are really impressive and the writing is perfect. The plot goes places you don't expect it to and they can explore moral and political questions that other shows won't, because people think it's just nerd stuff for nerds and they don't pay attention to what the writers are actually saying. Besides, I love it and I'm not a nerd." "How much money did you spend on comic books last month?" "About two hundred dollars. Oops, my nose is bleeding."

The Marvelous Misadventures of Flapjack

What is wrong with kids these days? Either the age of information has permanently fried their minds and they're all completely and hopelessly insane, or they all have amazing senses of humor. As long as I get to watch their cartoons, however, I couldn't care less. Flapjack is a prospective adventurer, apprenticed to a grizzled, blue seaman/candy addict named K'nuckles who is searching for a sort of sailor's paradise named "Candied Island." The harbor in which they live is populated by a cast of ruthless, ugly sailors. It's an ugly show. Flapjack is the only character not animated to highlight his worst features. He's the sole innocent in a cast full of bastards and his naivete reminds me of a certain character from a novel by Voltaire ("CANDIED Island" sounds a lot like "CANDIDE Island")...The animation reminds me of the Ren & Stimpy close-ups; it's all eye crust and dandruff and cellulite and pores and body hair. It should make you a little queasy at first and I don't recommend it on a shaky stomach, but the writing and voice acting are so hilarious, you'll forget all about Spongebob Squarepants soon enough.

House

I love this show. It's a formula exercise, but a good one. A person freaks out, health-wise, then goes to see House. House thinks it's one thing and starts treatment. The treatment helps for a second, then the patient gets worse. Omar Epps thinks it's lupus, House rules it out. Cuddy yells at House. House says something rude but funny to Cuddy. Repeat step two. House has a revelation while speaking to Wilson about an unrelated matter. The day is saved. So, formula, yeah, but House is so damn charming it makes you forget that you kind of already know what's going to happen, because you never know what rogue-ishy rude thing House is going to say next. That's why you tune in. He's hilarious. You know, I'm kind of like House. Except I'm not a genius doctor. Or that charming. But I am rude, sometimes. Probably too often. I should work on that. I don't want to offend anyone.

Tip: Stay with your wife.



COOPER

(I have a twin sister so if you think it's me it's probably not!) I am the country and metal music lovin', whisky swillin', pajama wearin', sometimes smokin', always cookin' cooper aka coops or coopy.

Neko Case – Middle Cyclone (ANTI)
Another gem from Neko Case. I'll be listening on the porch drinkin' some Wild Turkey. Wanna join me?

Foot Village – Anti-Magic (UPSET DA RHYTHM/TOME/TOO PURE)
Four Drummers. Don't think tribal. Think drum shredding. Think punk. Don't think. Just buy it and, more importantly, see them live. Josh, Grace, Dan and Brian will totally rule your world. (If you go see them live be sure to bring a drum key. They're always losing them on the road!)

Paul McCartney – Amoeba's Secret (HEAR MUSIC)
Why? Cause I was there. And it was fuckin' amazing. And he kissed me.

Blancmange – Mange Tout (EDSEL RECORDS UK)
This was one of my favorite records from the eighties. It sounds like it too. But that's a good thing. "See the Train" and "The Day Before You Came" are sublime.

Love is All – A Hundred Things Keep Me Up At Night (WHAT'S YOUR RUPTURE?)
This CD reminds me of the time I crashed this party in the '80s, there was a huge line to the keg and these girls got up and started singing and playing. They were jumping around and kicking shit over and I loved them. I jumped around and moshed so much I got shin splints and a fat lip, just like what happened when I listened to this record. Love is All are from Sweden which makes me like them more. Cause who doesn't like Sweden? (The Danish of course! But screw the Danish.)

Alela Diane – The Pirate's Gospel (NAMES)

This CD is for the hammock and kissing. It's chill folk music with a beautiful female singer. It's an older release but I just found it. It's hard to keep track.

Cool Kids – Bake Sale (CHOCOLATE INDUSTRIES)
Phat beats and super old skool sound. It won't leave my CD player. For realzzz.

Tip: So you've come to Amoeba and you're a bit overwhelmed. This is understandable. There are thousands and thousands of CD's released per year; how do you make sense of it all? My tips for finding music you like:
1. Pay attention to record labels. The artists you already have are on labels that hopefully have a good roster of stuff you might also like. So look for them when digging around.
2. Find a source that reviews the music you listen to. It might be a blog, a magazine, a newspaper or a website like Amoeba.com. What's important is that the source reviews music you actually listen to. They'll include stuff of the same character.
3. Ask your friends and if you hear something, ask! Most people are flattered that you want to check out something they're listening to.
4. GO TO SHOWS. Go to shows and invest in your music community. PAY THE COVER. DON'T BE A BABY. Seriously, music gets better when it is supported.

David Byrne & Brian Eno – Everything That Happens Will Happen Today (TODO MUNDO)
First off, let me tell you that this album is nothing like Byrne & Eno's previous collaborative release *My Life in the Bush of Ghosts* [a nice recording though, some 20 years ago]. I hate to put it to you this way but I would have to say that *Everything That Happens Will Happen Today* lives more in the world of, dare I say, "adult contemporary wonder pop." I would also like to make the disclaimer that the world of adult contemporary music is something I shy away from whereas this album I warm up to frequently and is one of the best things I heard in the whole of last year! It is simple, spiritual, strange and subtle. Layered with acoustics, electrics and Byrne's signature soft-toned wail. All the things that make my musi-

cal aura glow with an intense repetitive blinking of “beep, beep, beep” [and that’s before any Chai intake]. To punctuate my adoration of this album further I must tell you that I attended a concert for this album’s tour at the Greek Theater on October 3, Frazetta 2008. In a word, “amazing.” In two words, “really amazing.” It had to be in the top five concert going experiences of my life. As a matter of fact I would refer to it as more of a performance than a concert. Everyone dressed in white from head to toe, Byrne, backup singers, band, all of them, pretty as a picket fence. They play, they sing. We like it. Two songs in, still liking it. Third song of the evening hits our senses and the modern dancers hit the stage. Two girls, one boy, all modern, very dancery. And yes, they too were adhering to the white dress code. By the end of the number not just the dancers in all their modernity were cutting a rug. Now Byrne, backup singers and dancers were all joined in the execution of a greater choreography [a performance] by songs end. There I was taking all of this delight in when nothing short of happy gratitude shot through me for having been present. Apparently, I was not the only one grateful for this moment because no sooner had the song ended than the entire audience simultaneously jumped to their feet and gave a very energetic standing ovation. Byrne, pleased by this response, smiled and thanked us. However, the applause didn’t stop there. We kept “ovating.” Thanks to the giant video screens to the left and right of the stage we could see the look on Byrne’s face as mild bewilderment struck him. He mentioned something in surprise about “L.A. being jaded.” Clearly we were showing him the counter example. It’s nice to know that someone as seasoned as David Byrne can still be taken by surprise by a sea of fans at this point in his career. So I guess both Byrne and L.A. are not “so jaded.” Pretty much we were glued to him with audio adhesive for the rest of the evening. Byrne, in turn, surprised us with no less than three encores. Each one greeted with as much warmth as the one before it. The tour didn’t just encompass this newest release it covered multiple Byrne & Eno co-authored materials spanning solo endeavors and select works from the Talking Heads catalog as well. Also released this year from David Byrne was *Big Love Hymnal*. This is a soundtrack recording to the television series *Big Love*. Apparently D.B. referenced the subject matter of the show and made “fake hymns” to work this album out. Kinda nutty, kinda neat. I’d attend The First Church Of Byrne [F.C.B.] for sure.

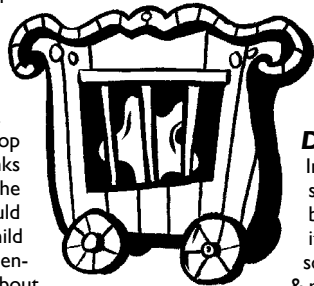

Erik Rico – Double Feature

Informed by the snares falling down stairs clatter of West London’s bruk beat mosse, Erik Rico yapple dapples it with a singer’s soul that the Brits sometimes miss. Full of mellow keys & melodies, the squishy slap of reverbed bap, it’s bedecked in the retro tech of pre-Colombian cosmonauts, a rocket crafted from feathers and stone on “Welcome to the Space Age” and “Children of the Light,” or the 8 track boomin’ from the *Chariot of the Gods* on the spirit-salving “Peace of Mind,” like Stevie’s & Herbie’s forward facing Prophets from the seventies.

Dungen – Bandhagen (KEMADO)

Though much of Gustav Ejstes’ (he who is and does Dungen) may evoke soundvisions of frolicking trollkin and Tolkienian bacchanals, buskin beclad ribaldry and dervishly whirling, flaxen haired frost giants’ daughters, pagan and prelapsarian, flutes and lutes and endlessly delayed guitar, his first forays at beatery were Hip-Hop based. And though Bandhagen may not bear the sharp snap and bap of Diamond’s drums or the ding of Premo’s bells (though there’s the wisty “ting” of what sounds like a gnomesize xylophone), maybe this the sound of rap de-Afronated, dilapidated, a weaving, shambling shambolic wooze, consciousness sludged, flowing like sizurp’d, betwixt the limbic regions of the day, before it shudders and starts fraying, each instrument drifting slowly into the infinite.

Frankmusik – 3 Little Words

A virulently viral infectious confection, a vector infecting with a replicating meme, spreading an insidious signal that supplants logic circuits and subverts critical thoughts. Draped in syn/linn drums and tinny stabs it’s a lite brite i.e.d. w.m.d, but scraped of all its glitzy gear, as with the “black gardenia” mix, it sits revealed as a sharp, plain paean to pain that shimmys between want and get.

DJ KO – Picture This (SHAMAN WORKS)

DJ KO, repping Street Smartz, from whence banged out the late ‘90s burner “Metal Thangs” (as bumped on Premo’s NY Reality Check), keeps heads and dittys boppin with a “golden age” all stars massive (Diamond, OC [who killed it somethin lovely on the “Metal Thangs” refix], Masta Ace, Kweli, Wordsworth, John Robinson) and newer jacks (Skyyoo, Torae, Phonte, 9th Wonder, Black Milk, Elzhi) rocking it like the Y2K bug’s still somethin to get you shook. Though it may take til the twenty tens revival to manifest what we can salvage from the epoch of the born cipher, bumps like “Ladder of Success,” all celestial voices smudged into sweet noise, and “Someday,” flipping classic don Donny vocal for a treatise on the inchoate promise of endless possibility, almost make you miss that blurry, undefined time before the Bush 2 era of terror when the only thing blowin up was your motorola pager and gitmo was just a strategy for stackin paper.

Pharcyde – “Runnin’” (Phillipians Mix) (DELICIOUS VINYL)

Word is bond, you will not improve on Dilla’s reflation of Getz’ & Bonfa’s “Saudade vem Correndo” for “Runnin’” (“correndo,” “runnin,” get it!), perfectly calibrated, saudade intact and impactful, longing left lengthy, the majorest minor bars of the whole cut, bobbing drums with the lagging kick, but the Phillipians mix appends a nice little stoney interlude to the end whilst underpinning Tre’s verse with some loopy bleeps that somehow still maintain the anomie.

The Passions – I’m In Love With A German Film Star (CHERRY RED)

This is not a sound that could spring from a sun-drenched land. Avid Mediterranean melancholaholics and studied Angeleno miserabilists, well-versed though they may be in the ways of the weepy, are geo-genetically incapable of connecting with the frigid, fog blown, seasonally affectively disordered core from whence wells The Passions’ *I’m In Love with a German Film Star*. Guitar swathed in shimmering sheets of delay, bass thick and throbby, sung with an android’s sangfroid, it’s like Metropolis’ robot Maria coolly swooning for Rotwang, free of the heart’s machinations, circuits programmed for bloodless love.

Afta-I – Time In Between

(MELTING POT MUSIC)

We live in the AD (After Dilla) years. Stumbling beat, warm, furry lumbering bass, sputtering high hats, the feel of the finger on the pad, these are the forever echoes of his human, boomin system. Flying Lotus & the Brainfeeder mob, Hudson Mohawke, Super Smoky Soul, Jniero Jarel, & on & on til the break of dawn, fellow traficante of that thick, stawy sound labor under the long shadow of the long gone. (RHINESTONE/GONER)

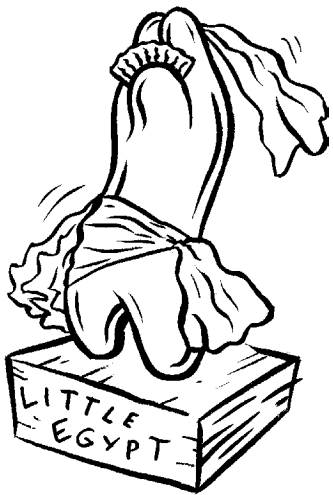

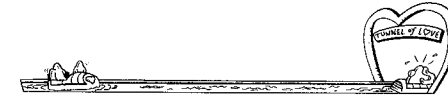

The Earrings of Madame De... – Directed by Max Ophuls

Max Ophuls is easily one of the most eloquent and inventive storytellers to choose film as his medium and *The Earrings of Madame De...* is one of the finest examples of his brilliance. He moves his camera like no other director before or since and he is one of the few directors whose work Kubrick greatly admired.

Vengeance Is Mine – Directed by Shohei Imamura

This is the strangest story of a serial killer that I have ever seen. In fact I hesitate to call it a serial killer movie for the associations that you are undoubtedly making at the reference. Yes, there are scenes of brutal murder. No, they are not depicted in a manner intended to shock you (this isn't Argento), nor are they depicted from a clinical distance that invites you to hate yourself for watching (this isn't Kubrick). Murder just happens. Our killer gets a thrill out of it (most of the time), on par with getting laid, but the emphasis of this movie is on his relationships, how his lifestyle both affects them and is a response to them. Yeah, the killer is kind of an asshole, but what would you do if your wife and your dad were constantly fighting the urge to get it on?

The Films of Budd Boetticher [Box Set] – Directed by Budd Boetticher

This is a great set of westerns that should have been on DVD long ago but somehow never made it. This set chronicles the bulk of Boetticher's collaborations with Randolph Scott and their pairing is among the all time western greats (think Ford & Wayne and Mann & Stewart). The set includes a great documen-

tary featuring the brash antics of Boetticher and many of his big name Hollywood fans gushing over his work (Tarantino, Eastwood, Schrader, Towne, Bogdanovich, Scorsese...). Films Included: *Tall T*, *Decision at Sundown*, *Buchanan Rides Alone*, *Ride Lonesome*, *Comanche Station*.

Wall•E – Directed by Andrew Stanton

It is hard to discuss this film for many without qualifying it by saying, "for a kids movie..." but I might suggest that what is truly remarkable about this movie is that it is a major release from a major Hollywood studio, and one that, yes, specializes in family fare. The last film that had a such a pessimistic, yet grounded vision of the future, *Idiocracy*, was completely buried upon its release and has yet to really find the audience it deserves. Common sense tells us that Hollywood doesn't want to tell its audience that they are an ignorant, over-consumptive waste of space destined for a disaster of their own making (the message seems in conflict with, "don't forget to hit the concession stand for more raw cookie dough balls and cola!"). *Wall•E* however brings the message to the masses. Though your average *Shrek* fan found it hella boring (they don't even talk for the first 20 minutes!) the Pixar feature with its heavy-weight marketing push will find its way into many a home over the years and be a jagged pill to swallow for unsuspecting "consumers." There's also an excellent love story between the two lead robots that occurs almost completely without the use of dialog. Awesome.

TV On The Radio – Dear Science (INTERSCOPE)

Mad Men: Season 1 – Directed by Matthew Weiner

I don't have cable so, like the rest of you who still maneuver rabbit ears for the best picture, I need to wait until shows like this make it to DVD to experience what everyone has been talking about. Believe the hype! This show is fantastic and exceptionally cinematic. Not only is it exceedingly well written, but the acting is top notch and the art direction and cinematography place it in a class by itself. Nothing else on television is as rich or well made as *Mad Men*. I remember first assuming that it was an HBO show before seeing the AMC logo (it seems HBO passed on it...). After watching a couple of episodes my mistake was clearer — nothing on HBO has ever looked this good. *Season 2* is not available on DVD at the time of this writing, but I can't wait to get my hands on it.

A.R. Rahman – Slumdog Millionaire [Soundtrack] (INTERSCOPE)

This movie totally blew me away! Wow! The cinematography — the acting — the storyline — yes, I'm a sucker for a good old-fashioned love & overcoming all obstacles story — I absolutely loved every minute of it. We were sitting there watching the opening sequence & thinking, "you know what would be perfect right here? Some M.I.A." And just like magic, M.I.A.'s genre-bending sound fills our ears, fitting this story just like a glove. Her music perfectly captures the spirit of these kids — from the streets, doing whatever they have to do to make it — and these are not pitiable characters — they hustle like pros from a young age & they've got the swagger to match. These kids are exactly who M.I.A. makes her music for & about. This soundtrack has made A.R. Rahman my new favorite producer. Just like Cory Booker, A.R. Rahman likes to luxuriate in all the cultural deliciousness, blending that Indian percussion style that I love with everything else in the kitchen — electronic, hip hop, pop, hell, there's even some Spanish in there. A successful soundtrack should conjure up all the mental pictures & capture all the moods from the film, just like this. Break out yer notebooks y'all, class is in session!

Kanye West – 808s & Heartbreak (ROC-A-FELLA RECORDS)

Never in my life did I think I'd be positively reviewing a Kanye album. But this just goes to show you, good music can come from anywhere, so keep your mind open. The messenger doesn't have to be perfect for the message to be perfect. He seems to be coming straight from the heart on this one & I think that's why it resonates. There are lots of things being said on his latest album, most of them about love and loneliness, but if they are going to be carried along by a lazy river as beautiful as the music here offers, I say, “just keep talking.” This album is also offered in a 10” box that includes a triple 10”, double CD and tote bag. The extras include an album of various musical fans covering his songs and another disc of electronic remixes that work surprisingly well.

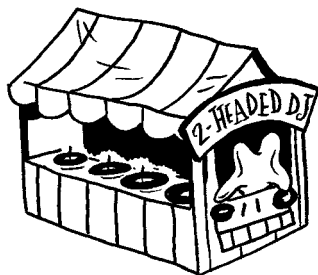
Mount Eerie w/Julie Doiron & Fred Squire – Lost Wisdom

Together, they have made a string-heavy and haunting collection of melodic meditations: Swedish & medieval traditionals, an American blues and an original or two.

Antony & The Johnsons – The Crying Light (SECRETLY CANADIAN)

Here is the thing about Antony Hegarty: you either hate his voice and music or you love it. I’m of the latter. After a series of covers on soundtracks [*I’m Not There*, *Leonard Cohen: I’m Your Man*] and appearances on some of his contemporaries’ records [*Volta* by Björk, the self-titled *Hercules And Love Affair* record] Antony released the *Another World EP*, a wonderful five song precursor to his third studio album *The Crying Light*. While his 2005 highly lauded Mercury Prize winning album *I Am A Bird Now* dealt with introspection and finding one’s own voice, *The Crying*

Light deals with themes of life and death, the present and future, and Mother Nature. Antony’s Nina Simone-esque trembling vibrato soars over beautiful piano melodies and lush string arrangements throughout *The Crying Light*. Opener “Her Eyes Are Underneath The Ground” tells us of someone at one with themselves and nature (“In the garden, with my mother/I stole a flower/With my mother, in her power”). Elsewhere, on the earnest “Another World” the themes of life and death appear (“Still have too many dreams/Never seen the light/ I need another world/ A place where I can go”). Subsequently, on the beautiful melancholic closer “Everglade” we’re met with a sense of acceptance for the natural world (“I’m home, my heart sobs in my veins/ But brains they play the softest games”). Even though it clocks in at less than forty-three minutes and leaves you wanting more, *The Crying Light* is a beautiful welcomed progression in the career of Antony & The Johnsons.

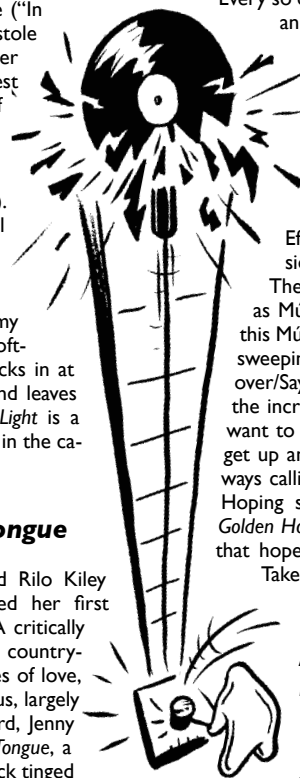
Jenny Lewis – Acid Tongue (WARNER BROS.)

In 2006, indie rock darling and Rilo Kiley songstress Jenny Lewis released her first solo endeavor *Rabbit Fur Coat*. A critically acclaimed album full of soulful, country-tinged songs dealing with themes of love, and loss. After a brief solo-hiatus, largely due to a new Rilo Kiley record, Jenny Lewis has returned with *Acid Tongue*, a more mature soulful-country/rock tinged album than its predecessor. While there are similarities in sound, there are several differences that set them apart. For one, gone are the bluegrass harmonies of the Watson Twins, replaced with a rich soulful/rock sound that is the product of the live band setting in which the album was recorded. That’s not all. Another significant difference between them is the more confident vocal delivery & songwriting of Jenny Lewis on this record. Not to mention, the several appearances made by friends and family on this new record. Everyone from Elvis Costello, Chris Robinson, Johnathan Rice, She & Him, as well as her father and sister lend their musical talents. *Acid Tongue* is filled with eclectic songs like the album opener “Black Sand” with its wistful lyrics (“Who’s going to love you buried underground?”), the eight-minute barroom-stomper “Next Messiah” with its back-and-forth between Lewis and Rice (“I want to tell you I love you/I’m going to go out for a walk”), the gorgeously raw title track “Acid Tongue” with its introspective lyrics (“We were unlucky in love, but I’d do it all again”), and the poignant closer “Sing A Song For Them.” Each song illustrates a wide array of musical influences and makes *Acid Tongue* a solid

sophomore solo-effort from Rilo Kiley front woman Jenny Lewis.

Golden Holy – Golden Holy (ROME PLOW)

Every so often, a band comes out of nowhere with an album that leaves an immediate impression on you. Golden Holy is one of those bands. Released at the tail end of 2008, *Golden Holy* is the debut album from the Portland, Oregon residents of the same name. *Golden Holy* is an album full of indie-rock and indie-pop gems. From album opener “Stop Telling Ghost Stories” with its Efterklang-esque indie-pop (“We all sat beside you/We all sat beside you”) to “Maybe The Books Were Wrong” which starts of as Mum-esque song, but quickly morphs into this Mum-Arcade Fire lovechild of a song with a sweeping chorus (“Aging and ashes scattered all over/Say goodbye to all you know”). Elsewhere, the incredible “Sons Of Dreams” will make you want to tap your feet, shake your hips, and well, get up and dance. (“Waiting by your bedside/Al-ways calling your way/Looking out your window/Hoping someone sees you.”) Plain and simple, *Golden Holy* is a superb debut album from a band that hopefully we’ll see and hear a lot more of. Take notice world.



Animal Collective – Merriweather Post Pavilion (DOMINO)

After 2007’s *Strawberry Jam*, and the 2008 *Water Curses EP*, Animal Collective return with the highly-anticipated and hyped *Merriweather Post Pavilion*. Both of these are within reason though, because this record does not disappoint in the least. *Merriweather Post Pavilion* is their most accessible and least convoluted album. Not to mention their best album, as well. The songs, as a whole, are more straightforward and less cut-and-paste than in previous albums. Each of the songs on *Merriweather Post Pavilion* contain divine harmonies, arty-guitars, pulsing bass lines, and some really cryptic lyrics. Quite simply, their music has been described as psychedelic Beach Boys, or the Beach Boys on acid. Same difference, I guess. Seriously though, this record is pretty amazing, and so worthy of the hype. Best record of 2009? It’s still early to say, but it just might end up being true.

Ryan Adams & The Cardinals – Cardinology (LOST HIGHWAY)

Extremely prolific singer-songwriter Ryan Adams returns with his band the Cardinals to release *Cardinology*, an album which teeters between alt-country-rock songs, and stadium rock songs à la U2. Its themes vary from love, lost relationships, and well, substance abuse. The latter, being something that

Ryan Adams has successfully curbed since *Easy Tiger*. This, in turn, has made him a more focused singer-songwriter than in past efforts. Not only that, but Adams and the Cardinals have never sounded as cohesive and good than on *Cardinology*. Opener "Born Into A Light" is an alt-country introspective song on being sober ("Be patient on the past is just a memory and heal/Heal your vines you'll heal inside eventually"). Whereas on "Magick," Adams channels the stadium rock of U2 ("So turn the radio up loud and get down/Let your body move/Let your body sway/ Listen to the music play/It's magick"). Elsewhere, on the beautiful "Cobwebs" Adams begs the question, "If I'm sorry, sorry enough/ If I fall will you pity me!/Will you confuse my love for the cobwebs." All in all, this is another excellent addition to an already extensive catalog by prolific singer-songwriter Ryan Adams.

Tip: Check these people out on MySpace: "These Orphaned Eyes" — An amazing post-rock group from Los Angeles. Sounds like *Explosions In The Sky* mixed with *My Bloody Valentine*. Also, check out these independent labels: "Great Minds" [formerly, Number 3 records] and "Track Number Records" for quality independent releases.

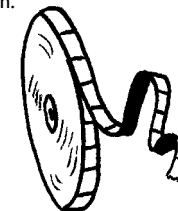

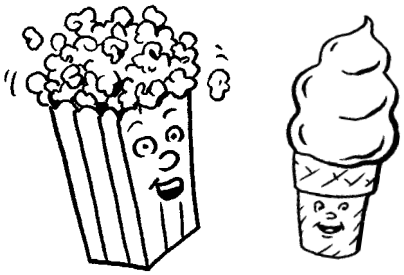
Heltah Skeltah – D.I.R.T. (Da Incredible Rap Team) (DUCK DOWN MUSIC)
Superfluous acronyms aside, Da rap team of Ruck (aka Sean Price) & Rock (aka Count Rockula) are back, and dirty as ever. Keepin' it gutter grimy with thick, dingy samples, crackin' drums, and two of the most dynamic flows in Hip-Hop today, they remind you of why you loved 'em so much in the mid-nineties. "Planet of the apes I'll blam the cannon in your face..."

Girl Talk – Feed the Animals (ILLEGAL ARTS)

Thas' right! The mash-upper of mash-uppers returns with a cd full of dirty south swagger, and whiplash fast up-tempo mixes as Girl Talk takes the remix to the next-next level piling on song upon sample upon song. Sure my electronic pick incorporates lots o' hip-hop, but in the able hands of Girl Talk it becomes something new. Feed me!!

Amy Macdonald – This is the Life (MELODRAMATIC/DECCA/UNIVERSAL)
I know, one of these things doesn't look like the other, but when I saw this young lass on fellow scot Craig Ferguson's late night talk show, I was instantly smitten. Unafraid of her Scottish accent, she lets it sneak right out, putting a folksy quality to her songs of opportunity missed. This isn't all accent and guitar though, as she is backed by a band who pump good energy into her strumming. (As of this writing we had a few in the used rock section...)

Alborosie – Soul Pirate (FORWARD RECORDINGS)
I work here and even I am impressed by Amoeba! I caught a little of Italian-rasta Albo's (Rosie's?) standout track "Herbablist," in a curious little shop in Venice, IT and couldn't forget it. I looked through that city's twisted alleys, and trekked all over Rome with no luck. Imagine my joy when I returned to work and there *Soul Pirate* was! Yeah, he's from Italy, transplanted to Jamaica, and yeah, he's white. Doesn't matter. This is the best Reggae album you've heard this year.



N.A.S.A. – Spirit of Apollo (ANTI)

The combined forces of Squeak E. Clean (LA, CA) and DJ Zegon (Brazil) are N.A.S.A. (North America South America) This collaboration is more than the two of these producers, with their sound anchored by Zegon's Brazilian roots, as they get a ton of musical guests making for some interesting combinations. These pairings include indie darling Lykke Li & Kanye West, the decidedly punk rock ODB (on his last known recorded verse) and raw and rugged Karen O. Perhaps the most suiting team-up, if hard to imagine, is the cosmic freak out "Spacious Thoughts," with alien mastermind Kool Keith and Tom Waits.

PPP – Abundance (UBIQUITY)

Triple P (formerly Platinum Pied Pipers) return with a second album and a new sound. Using live instrumentation, whether played or looped, PPP has taken their sound to the next level. With a wink to the past and an eye on the future, PPP imagines funky soul ala Sly & The Family Stone for the 21st Century. Dig it!

The Mised Children –

...Meet Odean Pope (PORTER RECORDS)
I really can't get enough of the Clutchy Hopkins/Mised Children sound. The organic, analog source material they play and loop, provides for a "warm fuzzy" of a soulful, hip-hop experience. Matched with Horn player Odean Pope's (Max Roach Trio) playing and arranging, The Mised Children create a fantastic journey into a new sound for all the heads. With Pope's entrancing, bending notes, referencing Ethiopian jazz, the Children's funky beat chugs and churns beneath, creating a sound both new and familiar, and always dope.

(Sean Price Presents) Ruste Juxx – Indestructible (DUCK DOWN MUSIC)

This album may be something of a guilty pleasure, yet I find myself returning to listen to the gravelly bark of mister Ruste Juxx. Hailing from Crown Heights Brooklyn ("When the East is in the house..."), Ruste Juxx has delivered an album that has a little something for everyone, yet his passion shines through his flow, keeping the sound from being "watered down." I really haven't heard this sort of catchy, sing-song, hook driven, yet street, songwriting since a half-dollar became millions. Cop it one the real.

Hamlet 2 – Directed by Andrew Fleming

I am not one of those europhile Steve Coogan initiates, but I must say, there hasn't been a movie that had me laughing this hard since *Yellowbeard*. As dumb or as smart as you want it to be, this movie works on all levels of funny!

Burn After Reading – Directed by Ethan & Joel Coen

Burn After Reading is built around the ever popular "perfect plan goes wrong," premise. Where many of these movies often go wrong is that they take themselves too seriously. Thankfully, the directors Joel and Ethan Coen are good enough to take their film just serious enough, allowing you to laugh at the characters' tragi-comic flaws. A little more intellectual than my previous pick, it still has enough gaffs for easy laughs! Chuckle up!

Kid Cudi vs Crookers – Day 'N Night Remix

An electro remix of MC Kid Cudi's first single from his forthcoming debut album. The original song is good too, but this remix makes me want to dance. Can't wait to hear the full studio album.

Healmonster & Tarsier – Cupcake Cave

LA's own Healmonster & Tarsier return with another beautiful, haunting electronic album. It's hard to find something NOT to like about this album.

Kanye West – 808s & Heartbreak

(ROC-A-FELLA RECORDS)

I realize that Kanye doesn't need my help promoting this record, but I really liked it. Instead of talking about how much money he has or how talented he is, Kanye sings (yes, sings!) about his sadness, emptiness and loss, despite having money and success. A.R. Rahman – Slumdog Millionaire (Soundtrack)

(INTERSCOPE)

This is the perfect soundtrack for a beautiful film. Go see this movie and then go buy the soundtrack. The soundtrack features a new M.I.A. track, "O...Saya." It is one of my favorite examples of world music, electronica, and Hip-Hop blending together successfully. The track starts slowly, with drums and male vocals, and then explodes into M.I.A.'s female voice and powerful delivery.

Animal Collective – Merriweather Post Pavilion

(DOMINO)

I am new to the Animal Collective train, I'll admit that. My understanding is that this album is more accessible than some of their previous records, and that might be why I liked it so much. I really loved this album (sorry Annie!), especially the song "My Girls." The song "Bluish" gets a special mention for the line "I'm getting lost in your curls." Lily Allen – It's Not Me, It's You

(CAPITOL)

Let the Right One In – Directed by Tomas Alfredson

Unlike the uptight mormon vision of sexually repressed vampires in *Twilight*, this quietly poignant coming of age film has a touching depiction of first love. It also has a cold, uneasy yet realistic quality (not unlike *Silence of the Lambs*) with plenty of Vampiric Lore and a blood lust *Twilight* also lacks. This movie creeps up on you and lingers in your thoughts.

Big Love: Season Three

The first two seasons of *Big Love* are as near perfect as you can get. It seemed like a religious themed show about polygamy would fall on either side of preachy or exploitation but surprisingly, polygamy adds to the drama threefold because the sister wives must work out problems with one another & deal with the bigger picture of huge families and differing beliefs within the community. You can identify with having a "family secret" if not three moms. The very best actors & writers on television today pull off campy character driven humor and sensitive family

issues with ease. No show since *Twin Peaks* has had such a great cast of characters (Chloë Sevigny, Bill Paxton, Grace Zabriskie, Harry Dean Stanton, Bruce Dern, Matt Ross). I want to gay marry Bill Henrickson and join these kooky cultists in big love.

Battlestar Galactica: Season 4.0

Television's Sci-fi *Star Wars* knock off is rebuilt as a dark drama with political intrigue that parallels the bleak W. Bush era. A post-apocalyptic dystopian society on the run from robotic superiors in search of utopia (Earth). Real world psychological & social problems plague the crew infiltrated by hybrid cy-lon/human clones. There are no good guys & bad guys. As we delve deeper into this series we see the evil man & his technologies can bring without the morality of reason. Plus it is god damned frakin' fun to watch.

Europa: Criterion Collection – Directed by Lars von Trier

Before Lars von Trier began experimenting with styles and rules of film making, he did the *Europa* trilogy (*The Element of Crime*, *Epidemic*). His flash as director recalls Fritz Lang, Welles or Hitchcock while the abundant creativity is awash in bleak Kafka expressionism. Leopold Kessler is Germany's post-war Zentropa train line sleeping car conductor in 1945. Leopold tries to stay neutral while the allied forces and a German terrorist group battle. Hypnotic and well crafted if not depressing.

Synecdoche, New York – Directed by Charlie Kaufman

Theater director Caden Cotard (Philip Seymour Hoffman) mounts a new play so much about his real life that it takes him over and becomes his life until it passes him by. Now, is that so hard? I guess for the thousands of critics whose reviews litter the magazines, TV, Newspapers, internet blogs, it was hard to review without a stab at understanding a movie about a man falling apart mentally. It must drive them crazy writing critiques filled with phrases like "defies description" or "overwhelming." You don't have to feel dumb if you see something you don't understand, maybe you aren't suppose to. Like Donnie Darko, this character is seeing things which aren't real and logic slips away here too. My only advice to Charlie Kaufman is to keep the laughs at a steady pace. The first hour is filled with absurdities but as Ceden's life gets more awful the humor vanishes from this antihero movie by the last reel.

Tip: Buy now or pay later. Living in poverty my whole life prepared me for the not so great depression. Depression prepared me to have my hopes squashed at every turn. No credit cards, no cell phone and the greedy have assured I'll be one of 1 million homeless scrapping for aluminum cans in your garbage sooner than expected. Kayhan Kalhour & Brooklyn Rider – Silent City (WORLD VILLAGE)

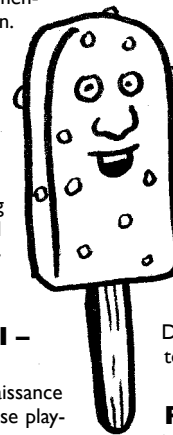
Kalhour bows the kamancheh, a little Persian fiddle. The string quartet blooms beauty with percussion to boot. Intense and serene, very NOW.

Hector Zazou & Swara – In The House Of Mirrors (CRAMMED)
Processed east Indian and north African instros. Hector pads the nest of the instruments with nominal noodling. Scrumptious oud loops the somnolent violin. Smoke this.

John Tavener – Piano Music (NAXOS)
At once harmonically dense and sparsely regal treks to joy and pain. Big orchestras in one instrument. Angel's flights to within us.

Ishu Kayoko/Singers Three – Go-Go Scat (KING JAPAN)
No, it's scat singing in Japanese from the later mid century, with that A&M Records vibe. Evocative swing with a small-group thing. Go-Go get a copy.

Johann Johannsson – Fordlandia (4AD)
A collection of heavy heartwrench. Sweeping strings of sad silhouette. Dark patterns shine on lighted hope. Affective.

Tip: Get a third speaker for your stereo. Hook up the wire to the left and right positive speaker terminals of your amplifier or receiver, leaving the other speakers wired in. Place the third speaker at a distance from your stereo speakers. Marvel at all the wonderful reverby out-of-phase sound that you never knew was in the recording. Move the speaker around for the best perspective.

Noted Broadway singer Kim Kriswell joins the orchestra in the vocal pieces.

Testament has issued a broadcast recording of Bruckner's Seventh Symphony conducted by the great Bruno Walter and the New York Philharmonic from a December 1954 broadcast in excellent mono sound. Walter recorded the work later on but this interpretation is much more vigorous. Also included is Gluck's "Iphigenie in Aulide Overture" new to Walter's discography.

Fantasia Contrappuntistica Music by Busoni
Featuring Milne

Pianist Hamish Milne on Hyperion takes on Ferruccio Busoni's incredibly difficult *Fantasia Contrappuntistica* which is Busoni's attempt to complete Bach's unfinished "Art of the Fugue." Challenging and fascinating listening.

Henry Clay People – For Cheap Or For Free (AUTUMNTONE)

Raucous, (somehow hilarious) swaggering Stones-ish rock fronted by the charismatically geeky younger brother of Stephen Malkmus. They're getting bigger and better — get in on the ground floor!

The Spires – Look!

This will be nearly impossible to find — it's a home-made CD-R. But I bet if you transact with The Spires via MySpace they will gladly mail you some of their releases, including this latest EP, which is reminiscent of The Velvet Underground but a bit more upbeat, a bit more domestic. Also check to see if they're playing near you — they live just north of L.A.!

The Nerves – One Way Ticket

(ALIVE)

Great, tight songs with the right amount of bite. Side two gives an interesting perspective with demos and live recordings. Paul Collins is now playing music with members of the power pop group The Records. Awesome!

Milk 'N' Cookies – Milk 'N'

Cookies (RADIO HEARTBEAT RECORDS)

An obscure Pansy Rock record gets the royal reissue treatment!

Fools Gold – Surprise Hotel b/w Night Dancing

(BLACK IRIS MUSIC)

This is the funnest live band in Los Angeles. Don't bring your shoes! Here's Luke from Fools Gold: "Our influences are all over the place! But if you are looking for specific countries I'd say, to name a few: Ethiopia, Eritrea, Niger, Mali, South Africa...and of course the USA and UK! I don't know how best to categorize it but we typically fall into the world music/afropop genres. Though many more words come to mind: dance, soul, punk, tropical..."

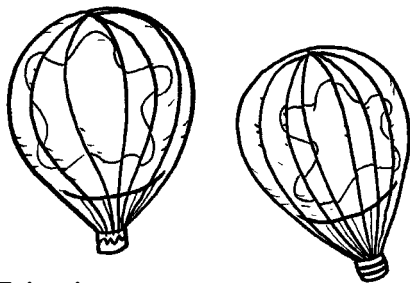

For those planning to go to Coachella, those not sure if they want to go, or those that just use the Coachella line up to discover new music each year, I'm going to use this edition of "Music We Like" to highlight "Music I Like" that will be playing/or already played (depending on when you read this) at Coachella Music and Arts Festival 2009.

White Lies – To Lose My Life...

(FICTION RECORDS)

One part Joy Division, one part Muse, one part Interpol; a fresh face in the '00s post-punk alternative clubhouse. Lead single "Death" has been responsible for some near car accidents while listening to this song, due to some extremely zealous steering wheel drumming on my part! "Death"'s intro blasts you into another world and evokes anticipation and excitement in the same fashion as the opening chords to Joy Division's "Love Will Tear Us Apart." The churn-

ing atmosphere of melodies is bombarded by blasts of drums that can only be described as the sound of canons firing on the '00s Post-Punk Revival battlefield. And in a sentiment that would make Shakespeare proud, the chorus of title track "To Lose My Life" makes one of the greatest proclamations in the history of love songs, "Let's grow old together, and die at the same time."

No Age – Nouns

(SUB POP)

A lo-fi fuzz/art rock duo. One on guitar, one on drums. But don't expect the White Stripes...more like Sonic Youth. If you want to be able to say to the kids, "...I was there when (insert legendary band and time/place) happened..." buy this album now and go see them play live...anywhere!

MSTRKRFT (master-kraft) – Fist of God

In 2006 Daft Punk landed their spaceship and claimed sovereignty over the Coachella "Dance Tent." In 2008 Justice closed the weekend with one of best dj/electronic sets I've ever seen. Sprouting from the same branch of the family tree as the previous two, MSTRKRFT is set to follow suit in 2009 at Coachella and beyond.

Thenewno2 – You Are Here

Paul McCartney is not going to be the only one with Beatle blood at this year's Coachella. Dhani Harrison, son of the late great George Harrison, and Oliver Hecks comprise the creative mind of Thenewno2. The result is an accomplished debut that sounds like one would expect if post-Beatles George joined Radiohead.

Shepard Fairey (aka DJ Diabetic)

You'll probably never recognize him on the street, but if you don't recognize his work, I don't think you've been alive for the past year and a half. Shepard is the man behind the "Obey Giant" street art phenomenon, the infamous Barack Obama "Hope" poster, and some just plain and simple cool DJ sets at the hippest events around Los Angeles.

The Gaslight Anthem – The '59 Sound

A Place To Bury Strangers – A Place To Bury Strangers

The *Washington Post* described this trio out of New York and their debut album as, "the most ear-shatteringly loud garage/shoegaze band you'll ever hear" ... I'll leave it at that!

Friendly Fires – Friendly Fires

(XL RECORDINGS)



My Bloody Valentine – Loveless

(CREATION RECORDS)

Originally released in 1991, what can be said about this indie rock/shoegaze masterpiece that hasn't already been said? This album is the indie rock musical equivalent of a 74 page Master's Thesis. Wait ... maybe that's because I just uncovered an actual 74 page Master's Thesis by a Florida State University Graduate Student analyzing *Loveless*. While that might give you an idea of the complexity of *Loveless*, it's more than just an academic composition, it's the *Pet Sounds* for the college-rock generation. It's an album with unprecedented experimentation, approach, technique and manifestation, yet it doesn't ever forget its pop foundation and timeless emotion. The album opens with one of the most abrasive, yet beautiful anti-guitar riffs of all time, and at the height of its tension, drops into a verse so aesthetically soothing you can almost feel physical weight being lifted off your shoulders, foreshadowing an emotion felt by myself and (I believe) our collective society on Presidential Inauguration Day this past January. You don't know what's waiting just around the corner, but you know you feel good. The handful of shows performed since MBV's 2007 reunion have received outstanding reviews, which will make their Coachella performance one not to miss. Besides a trio of shows in Santa Monica and NYC late last year, the upcoming performance at Coachella will be their triumphant return to the West Coast and the American music scene since dropping out of sight in the early '90s. MBV's live shows are legendary for their ear-drum shattering volume output (two decibals over the threshold for pain and eardrum damage) and *LA Weekly* writer, Randall Roberts, described it best when he said, "To truly appreciate what MBV is doing, you actually have to damage yourself!" At Coachella we'll see if we can get any closer to answering Roberts' question, "Why must something so pretty be so dangerous?"

I know there's lots of great new music coming out, but I've been having fun going back and re-discovering some reissues lately...dig, if you will, the picture...

Swervedriver – Raise and Mezcral Head

I seriously dug these guys back in the early '90s, but I could never quite figure out why they got lumped in with the so-called 'shoegazer' scene in the U.K., other than playing with some of the bands in that scene. Where the other bands wanted to strum their guitars, look at their effects pedals and mumble into the microphone, Swervedriver always seemed like they would rather run you over, throw you in the backseat, and take you for a long drive in the desert someplace. Raise had a lot of good songs, and had that "Hey Kids, we're making a record!" energy to it, but I thought the band really hit their stride on *Mezcral Head*. They took the post-Stooges fury of the first album and stretched it out into songs that stick in your head for years to come. After hearing "Blowin' Cool" off of *Mezcral Head* again, I realized it still runs through my head every once in a while, all these years later. Both albums got remastered and have added extra tracks, and are well worth checking out.

Loop – Heaven's End and Fade Out

Again, another band I was heavily into in the '90s. These guys were and are unique in their own weird way, combining heavy, psychedelic guitars with the motorik rhythms of Can and Neu and coming up with something that is equal parts cathartic and hypnotic (at least for me). These reissues sound great and include some cool extra live tracks and radio sessions. I remember seeing them live back then and having bruised neck muscles for a day or two from banging and twisting my head around. Turn these reissues up loud enough to make the floor shake, and you'll get an idea of the soundworld I was in. (I'm going to wait until my neighbors are gone one day, and then I'll do the same.)

New Order – Movement and Power, Corruption, and Lies

Back when I still loved New Order. These sound great and it's great to hear the b-sides included with them. My friends Tom Pixley and John Darnielle and I got to see New Order on their first tour in the United States, (in '83? '82? I dunno...), at Billy Barty's Roller Disco in Fullerton. Being the Joy Division/New

Order dorks that we were, we decided to get down to the venue at around 5 in the evening to make sure we could get a good position up front, and found we were the first ones there. One of the roadies had left a side door open, and we got to sneak in and see and hear NEW ORDER SOUND-CHECKING AND PRACTICING! We stayed in the shadows for probably about 45 minutes until Peter Hook noticed us, and told us to "Secrete ourselves elsewhere." The fact that I remember all of this shows what a big impression it made on my little music-mad mind, and these album reissues bring it all back.

Tip: *Ok, that's all I got for now. I promise I'll dig up some new stuff for the next booklet.*

I know things are rough right now, but as tough as things are, there is more optimism in the air than I can remember in a long time. November 4 was the beginning of the 21st Century, so let's try to truly band together and make ourselves the people we deserve to be. Music is the Message, Love is the Reason, Let's Kick Out The Jams, MF!

Titan: It's All Pop! – Various

Artists (NUMERO GROUP)

Unearthed rarities from the Midwest. Kansas City to be exact, better known for its barbecue and humidity. This collection makes K.C. seem like the land of a thousand Raspberries, and that's a good thing. You might not be bowled over at first but don't give up. Like Dwight Twilley or 20/20, the songs grow on you with each listen and you start to imagine your own top 40 in 1975. The Boys are at the top of it sounding like a punky-hayseed Hello, all glammed up and nowhere to go. The rest of it is a bunch of Badfinger wannabe's ripping through pseudo-hits with flares, flying V's and bad haircuts. Fantastic stuff. Power-Pop!

The Nerves – One Way Ticket

(ALIVE!)

All cranked up on San Francisco beatnik speed and trying to sound like the Beatles at the Cavern, the Nerves basically perfected Power-Pop. Jack Lee, Paul Collins and Peter Case, their names are legendary. They moved to L.A. and put it on the map as a force to be reckoned with, putting on shows at the 'PUNK PALACE' on Sunset and Gower in the mid-seventies. They were DIY to the extreme, booking their own tours and putting out their own EP. Don't be put off by the fact that Blondie bled one of their songs of all of its neurotic energy and made it a hit. Jack Lee said, "We didn't want to be in the scene, we wanted to BE the scene." They were, are, and always will be. Power-Pop.

Milk 'N' Cookies –

Milk 'N' Cookies (RADIO HEARTBEAT)

Double Vinyl gatefold reissue of the highest quality with great photos and even something to hang on your bedroom wall next to your Sweet and Slade posters. Ramones quality rock disguised as teen fluff, Milk 'N' Cookies were too cool to try too hard. The songs are pulsing hymns to high school chicks and rock and roll. Find out where the Go-Go's discovered the sound of "We Got The Beat." Find out what happens when the Sparks and the Bay City Rollers meet for a drink in a dive bar and they both get roofed by the New York Dolls while the Hollywood Brats look on unamused. Like cigarettes dipped in maple syrup, Milk 'N' Cookies are tasty and addictive. Power-Pop.

La Dusseldorf – La Dusseldorf and Viva

(4 MEN WITH BEARDS)
180 gram vinyl reissues of post-NEU! sublime krautrock new-wave perfection. The NEU! beat remains intact, but the rest of the music bounces along with a warm, organic, fuzzy, synth hum (I guess I can overlook the hippie-ish sentiment of *Viva* because it's foreign and out there). Stadium rock from deep outer space as produced by "Shadow" Morton or Spector. Perfect for driving through the desert at dusk. The future IS calling and the future is these LPs from the past. Kraut-pop.

Nick Lowe – Jesus Of Cool and Pure Pop For Now People

(YEP ROC)

I think the title pretty much sums this one up. Actually both titles are pretty genius. It's a record with something for damn near everyone. Leave that Animal Collective record in the bin and take this one instead (it has a better jacket). Pretend it just came out last week and play it for your friends and enjoy the 'retro' feel of authentic British pop rock with intelligence and wit.

Groundhogs – Blues Obituary

(SUNDAZED)

The anti-Cream. The broke-ass Blue Cheer. They don't waste their time being heavy, they skitter along like a wounded cockroach. Tony McPhee plays what you wouldn't expect always. The drum sound is as crude as oil straight from the ground. The songs are strange and raw. This is the true sound of British Blues. It's a new sound, not a rehash of the American blues, a different beast altogether. *Blues Obituary* is primal, brutish and garagey more than it's bluesy. It's unclassifiable like that *Kapt. Kopter* record that Randy California made that someone should reissue. I'll bet this record pisses off Clapton and that's good enough for me.

Tip: *R.I.P. Ron Asheton. Your guitar playing on the first two Stooges records perfectly sums up midwestern frustration, boredom, isolation, and alienation. Every single person in a rock band since 1970 owes you something and Iggy owes you the most.*

The Dead Science – Villainaire

(CONSTELLATION)

This is a band I always try to see whenever they come out to LA from their dwelling in Seattle. Dark and romantic! They're the boys you'd like to take home for dinner. Your grandparents would love them; their old fashion threads, manners, divinely handsome sex appeal...Aye Caramba! Sam Mickens with his voice reminiscent of Nina Simone and David Bowie's potential love child, it's impossible not to be swooned! Upright/standard bass from Ribbons' Jherek Bischoff & abstract jazz influenced drums of Nick Tamburro. The best band from Seattle, and yes, quote me on that! The album also features Celebration's Katrina Ford & Craig Wedren of Shudder To Think. (Myspace.com/TheDeadScience)

Dalmacio Von Diamond – The Other Side Of Darkness

(ALBINO CROW)

This band is out of control. Features members of Holy Curtain, SWFT Wings, Jesus Makes The Shotgun Sound, Lion Fever & countless others. Released on the Albino Crow label, it's far from the Smell's noisy party-scene-sound that's been saturating the wood-works like raging rain drops. Recorded by Moribund Descuzi (JMTSS), the album is bound to have a moody, intimate feel reminiscent of Nick Cave, Pulp & Scott Walker. While still simple pop songs, there's an intensity not heard in many of LA's currently creeping genius. It's music for tormented lovers, introverted and corrupt. (Myspace.com/ASilentHistory)

The Kinks – Picture Book (Boxed Set)

Yeah, yeah. I know you're sick of hearing about it but, The Kinks are forever my favorite band! Ray Davies' Kinks have been a huge influence and companion in my lifetime. The record I would undoubtedly take with me if ever I were stuck solo on an island is *The Kinks Are The Village Green Preservation Society* (which is where the set's title comes from), 1968. It's chock full of his memorial visions of youth, innocence &

sprinkled with humorous songs of poverty and class wars. Interestingly enough, as I dove farther into The Kinks catalog, I was happy to find that these were recurring themes for Ray — themes that we can still relate to today.

This is a punk compilation, The Kinks were the first punk band — EVER! Don't even think about arguing with me. First band to sing about sticking it to the man on a regular basis and to sing of real life issues. I wonder if Ray even believed in flower power. Because, in a time when everyone was holding hands and singing songs about love, Ray was singing songs about you, me, gas prices, poverty, wealth, love, hate, government, religion and freedom — all of this before The Beatles had the chance to drop acid and dress like gurus in drag.

Ray Davies himself helped in compiling this incredible collection! Over 100 tracks, over 6 CDs (more than 1/3 of which were unreleased or new to CD). 60-page booklet with intro by Ray. Contains interviews with all band members, rare photos & other memorabilia surprises.

gris gris – Live @ The Creamery (BIRDMAN)

It's terribly important to allow yourself the freedom to fall in love with this band, especially if you're a fan of lo-fi, reverb & psych(o)edelia. This is the final release from the band that Oakland lost. Recorded in brainchild Greg Ashley's warehouse-residence for your creamery dreamery. A poet & dreamer from the farthest dimensions, once lost to triumph, now regained through a hazy memory perpetually caught up in the flashing reds and blues & lots and lots of smoke. (Myspace.com/thegrisgris)

Roman Polanski: Wanted And Desired – Directed by Marina Zenovich

I plucked this DVD from my personal long list of interesting and exciting releases because I am such a fan of Roman's work. Anything relating to his complex history or devastating life is of great intrigue to me. This film focuses on Roman's being banned from the U.S. due to (ahem) sex with a minor. The focus is mainly directed towards our own government's systems for dealing with such issues. It's a fascinating documentary that will leave you to make your own resolutions.

David Byrne & Brian Eno – Everything That Happens Will Happen Today

This cd is the perfect combination of layers. Gloom pop at its finest. Hooray David Byrne!

Flux of Pink Indians – Not So Brave (OVERGROUND RECORDS)

Post punk at its best. Someone told Flux that angry dancers are the best dancers. They were right. Hooray for danceable anarcho punk.

Des Jeunes Gens Modernes – Various Artists (BORN BAD RECORDS)

This is a French compilation of the post punk/electro/dance scene from 78-83. It's track after track of electric mayhem, and I like it. Hooray for dancing.

Rodriguez – Cold Fact (LIGHT IN THE ATTIC)

I must admit that I heard this CD in another record store but it jolted me out of the world music section towards the cashier: I had to know who this guy was... I was vaguely reminded of the first time I heard Bob Dylan. A song-writer from Detroit, socially conscious lyrics ("Rich Folks Hoax...") - though his style is hard to categorize or explain. Yes, it's an old recording but totally not dated.

Rokia Traore – Tchamantche (NONESUCH)

Rokia Traore lives in Europe and Africa, and her music reflects that. She relies on subtlety and emotion, creating a fusion of traditional and contemporary

elements, always more experimental than other African artists. This new album has a very lush yet delicate sound, and it was well worth the wait!

Mahmoud Ahmed – The Best of Mahmoud Ahmed (AIT)

Best known from the Ethiopiques series or even that old “Ere Mela Mela” classic on *CRAMMED* (also on this CD), this fairly recent recording on a domestic Ethiopian label shows that this singer, who won the BBC world music award in 2007, has not lost it. In fact he still outdoes most younger singers in his country (check videos...); his voice is still more soulful and seductive over the loping rhythm — imagine the dancing to “Derra” ... Cheaper than a ticket to Addis Ababa.

Franco & Le Tpok Jazz – Francophonie: Africa’s Greatest – A Retrospective Vol. 1 (1953-80)

(STERNS)
Franco was the most popular African artist ever —unfortunately not known in the west, except to a few world music fans. This collection may set the record straight and share with us some of his hits that were famous not just in the Congo, a country which still has a wealth of rhythms to introduce if there’s ever a way. See the video “Jupiter’s Dance” about more of that.

Whimsical soundscapes and minimal electronic environments, from a true outsider. Uninfluenced by any clique or movement of creators — closest comparison might be some BBC Radiophonic stuff. Sounds from inside Space Mountain?

The Wicked Witch – Chaos 1978-1986 (EM RECORDS [JAPAN])

Totally dazzling reissue. Sounds like Suicide playing DC Go-Go. The most non-offensive slap-bass ever, slightly askew vocals that recall Gary Wilson — an



overall icy Certain Ratio brand of funk. The Death Comet Crew stuff with Rammellzee is a good point of reference.

No-Neck Blues Band – Clomeim (LOCUST MUSIC)

Less motorik & Kraut-inspired than Qvaris, this is a slight return to NNCK’s more acoustic earlier clatter. Scary music box sounds that would work awesome in a Bava film, and some disorienting Master Musicians of Jajouka horns.

Akira Ishikawa & Count Buffalo – Uganda – Afurikan

Rokku no Yoake (TILQUILA [JAPAN])
Japanese psychedelic loners experiment with African music in ‘72. Prog organ, hand drums, Mbira thumb piano, and some sub-Mahavishnu guitar shredding. Pretty unique.

Karel Velebny – SHQ (ESP-DISK)

Velebny & Hampel are two crucial European free improv documents from early in the “fire music” era (1964-66), reissued from the original ESP-Disk Catalog. For fans of Brotzmann, Evan Parker, and FMP/Company scenes.

Gunter Hampel Group – Music From Europe (ESP-DISK)

Mother of Tears – Directed by Dario Argento

Better than I’d imagined. Granted, the production value of the title/credits sequence looks like 1970s cable-access, this one’s got tasteful CGI, a nice attempt to tie into the narrative of the *3 Mothers Trilogy*, another Asia Argento shower scene directed by her Dad, and Udo Kier(!). Not as shocking as early Argento, but a great later piece of sleazy euro-horror.

Jandek – Ready For The House

(CORWOOD/JACKPOT)
If you want to explore Jandek, there’s no better place to start than at birth (...or *Chair Beside A Window*). I’ve snagged some Corwood vinyl, but never the first! Too bad they didn’t reproduce the original Units cover. Fascinating as all get out.

I like shiny things.

The Duchess – Directed by Saul Dibb

I am sucker for costume dramas, but just watch this one for Ralph Fiennes. He takes what could have been a one-dimensional, hate-able villain and shows you his underlying helplessness — he simply doesn’t know how to be anything else — and thereby turns evil into tragedy.

I’ve Loved You So Long – Directed by Philippe Claudel

Yet another French film where the actors are allowed to act, and viewers are allowed to watch and wait and draw their own conclusions. Kristin Scott Thomas does an amazing job as a woman returning to life after 15 years in prison for a terrible crime — and in French!

Man On Wire – Directed by James Marsh

This documentary about Philippe Petit’s wire walk between the Twin Towers will have your palms sweating just thinking about it. Marsh seamlessly integrates reenactments, archival footage and interviews from the irrepressible Petit and crew.

Happy-Go-Lucky – Directed by Mike Leigh

It’s nice to see a film about an optimist.

Let The Right One In – Directed by Tomas Alfredson

A vampire movie that’s really about loneliness and desperation. A gorgeous example of how less is more (when it comes to effects and gore), it’s a classic, begging the question, why is Hollywood bothering with a remake?

Man On Wire

documentary about the famous wirewalk between the two towers of the world trade center. poignant and emotionally layered---brings up questions of passion and relationships and risks; as well as bravery or stupidity (and how often that wire is so....precarious). well worth it. you will love it.

Trouble The Water

first hand document of KATRINA and her devastation. an amazing film. nominated for an academy award. the power of the hurricane was rivaled by the power of the individual people featured. true independent and unique spirits who weren’t gonna be drowned (or drowned out). their voices are HEARD in this film.

Frozen River

softly revealing the lives of quiet desperation. the writing and the acting in this small film are so good, you get lost in the moments and forget that you are watching a movie.

I’ve Loved You So Long

just an exquisite performance. kristin scott thomas makes this film a deep revelation. her performance is so rich with nuance and honesty. the movie is completely compelling. i sat riveted by her face and her slow evolution. no explosions. no gimmicks, no CGI graphics or car chases—just sheer exposed humanity.

Let The Right One In

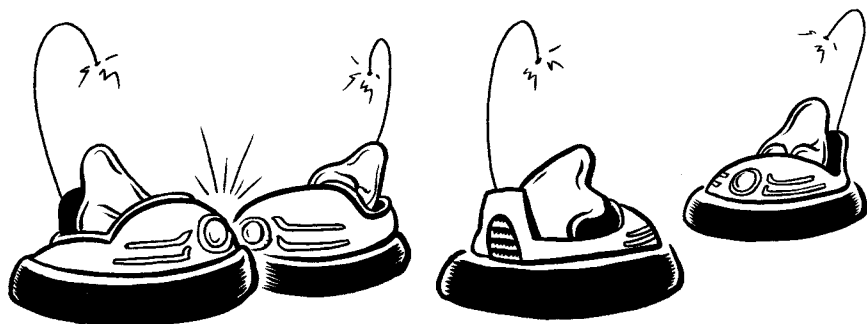

....and now to my soulful, introspective, melancholy music list (with a few dance numbers thrown in for good measure):

William Elliott Whitmore – Animals In The Dark

every record he has done has made it onto my lists. i love his voice and his gritty earthiness. his voice sounds like it has been scarred by life and pain and cigarette smoke. like ray lamontagne, only not as



sweet. more like a whiskey-drenched tom waits. he sounds like an appalachian otis redding. and his ballads are as soulful. "there's hope for you, yes, there is hope for you....but it's much too late for me" banjo and cello and a slight touch of hammond b-3 make this record sparse and beautiful and as real as it gets ...

Ane Brun – Changing Of The Seasons

this delicate voiced singer-songwriter from norway has a forlorn and wistful sound without being overly sentimental. she delivers her quirky songs without apology. quite refreshing.

Los Campesinos! – Hold On Now, Youngster....

i LOVE LOVE LOVE this band. high energy, toe-tapping shenanigans. "broken heartbeats sound like breakbeats" these guys are so much fun. fer reals. put it on—i dare you not to dance.

K'naan – Troubadour

giving hip-hop an infusion. and a transfusion.

Alice Russell – Pot Of Gold

more "blue eyed soul" from england? yeah, but this record is BURSTING with soul, and the rich production enhances it instead of drowning it. her voice is lush and smoldering as well as downright funky. her version of "crazy" is.....somethin' else. gotta hear it.

Anthony Hamilton – The Point Of It All

this guy is just so smooth. his voice melts like butter through the nooks and crannies of your soul.

Antony And The Johnsons – The Crying Light

i waited a long time for this. antony's voice feels like....glowing streetlamps on a misty new orleans morning. a bath of moonlight on a silent bayou. awash with sadness and tenderness and....whatever your own particular version of heaven is. his voice is translucent and transcendent.

Fucked Up – Chemistry Of Common Life

FUCK YEAH!!!

Zakarya – The True Story Concerning Martin Behaim

new from the tzadik label: radical jewish culture. this is klezmer punk rock!! creative, complex, soothing, intelligent, thoughtful. this is a concept album: an imaginary film score about the life of the 15th century thinker who was the first to represent the world as a sphere. thick like black bean chili.

Jason Isbell & The 400 Unit – Jason Isbell & The 400 Unit

a new discovery. this guy has a true southern feel. earthy and moody. i'm always skeptical of these young kids who claim the blues — but he seems to really have 'em. country blues, that is. recorded at muscle shoals studio, he and his crew seem to be genuinely channeling the early artists of those days (wilson pickett, staple singers, you know....) instrumentation of slide guitar and accordion and mouth harp. his voice is the gravelly anti-antony as ethereal as antony is; jason isbell is OF the earth.

Neko Case – Middle Cyclone

her voice is like.....ummmm.....well.....like.....nuthin' i can think of to describe it. i've loved her voice since the new pornographers---sort of part coyote, part patsy cline. she wails and sails with her lyrics. this follow up to the dark and thoughtful "fox confessor brings the flood" seems more pop solid. but she's still a mystery.

Morrissey – Years of Refusal

stop arguing about it. just put it on and D-A-N-C-E !!

Loney Dear – Dear John

the album jacket describes it as "soulful, indie folk" which is pretty spot on. more uplifting than melancholy, this record is filled with sweet pop harmonies and interesting rhythms to keep it from getting too sticky.

Elvis Perkins – Elvis Perkins In Dearland

inspired by a new orleans second line fusion of grief and celebration, this is a multi-textured record with a lot of spirit. gets better with each listen.

Fred Frith – To Sail, To Sail

solo acoustic guitar from the experimental music master. classical and free form, bluesy and filled with soul. this is a beautiful record which pulls you in if you let it. so spare and so full.

Arve Henriksen – Cartography

a seriously beautiful and interesting record. echoes await. listen deeply. it is well worth it.

Sonny Stitt – Sits In With The Oscar Peterson Trio

one of the fresh batch of verve reissues from the late '50s and early '60s. (other notable releases in the "originals" series are some grimy jams from jimmy smith and classic albums by gato barbieri, roy ayers, et al....) this is another testament to that label and the icons of the "verve era". one of the more amazing and soulful alto players (along with johnny hodes, paul desmond, sonny criss, and occasional forays from sonny rollins), sonny stitt echoes parker and hodes but brings his own wistful swingin' style. fast fingers and moanful melodies make him forever soaring above the rest. oscar peterson is one of the most fluid and inspirational masters of the keys. and his trio of ray brown on bass and ed thigpen on drums, is one of the funkier jazz trios ever. recorded in paris in 1959, the easy funky vibe of the session makes you feel like you are sitting in the room with them. hanging on the couch while they ooze and groove their late night mellow....

Keith Jarrett/Gary Peacock/Jack DeJohnette – Yesterdays

live recordings of this incomparable trio from 2001. what more is there to say?

Auburn Lull – Begin Civil Twilight

my ambient friend chris gave me this and it is really beautiful. sensuous and dreamy.

John Scofield – Piety Street

gospel tinged, soul-infused, blues-dipped funk. righteous!

India.Arie – Testimony: Vol. 2 — Love & Politics

groovy. filled with more hope than heartbreak this time.

Jazmine Sullivan – Fearless

a deep canyon voice with infectious beats.

NASA – The Spirit Of Apollo

despite many cooks in this kitchen (a who's who of hip-hop and alternative rock icons), this is a funky cold medina of tight rhythms and juicy surprises.

Ben Kweller – Changing Horses

pedal steel, harmonies, and twang . . . what more could you ask for?

Lisa Hannigan – Sea Sew

whisper-quiet to bell clear, her voice is tender and sweet.

Andrew Bird – Noble Beast

another sweet and tender voice. a vividly musical album. try it.

Also worth exploring:

healmonster & tarsier – *cupcake cave*; freshly watered sidewalks – *this contract limits our liability*; vetiver – *tight knit*; m. ward – *hold time*; abe vigoda – *reviver EP*; parson red heads – *owl and timber*; ray ricky rivera – *neighborhood fame*; dark was the night – *red hot compilation*; beirut – *march of the zapotec*; dan auerbach (from the black keys) – *keep it hid*; buddy and julie miller – *written in chalk*; bela fleck – *throw down your heart*

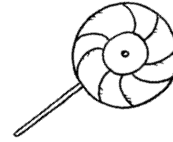
hot-tip:
